The Convention. EVENING SESSION.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIFTH DAY.

CAPITOL, AUSTIN, TEXAS,
February 8, 1869.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment; roll called; quorum present.

Mr. Kirk rose to a question of privilege, and asked that a substitute proposed by him to the Judiciary Report be inserted in the minutes.

It was ordered.
The following is the substitute.
The Supreme Court shall consist of five Judges, to be elected by the qualified voters of the State, and shall hold their office for a term of eight years. They shall have power to select from their body a presiding officer.

If a vacancy shall occur, such vacancy shall be filled by the Governor, until the next General State elections, when said vacancy shall be filled by election as aforesaid.

Mr. McCormick asked leave of absence for Messrs. Slaughter, Wilson of Milan and Phillips of Wharton.

Leave granted.
Mr. Scott introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, the appropriation made by this convention to pay for the publication of the engrossed Constitution, is not sufficient, therefore

Be it resolved, that an additional sum of one hundred dollars be appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the editor of the Texas Vindicator for the publication of 5000 copies of the engrossed Constitution.

Mr. Scott moved a suspension of the rules to take up the resolution.

Rules suspended.
The question recurred upon the adoption of the resolution.

It was adopted.
Mr. Scott moved a further suspension of the rules to put the resolution on its passage.

Rules suspended.
The question recurred upon the passage of the resolution.

It was read a third time and passed.

The President caused the following communication to be read:

HEADQUARTERS FIFTH MILITARY DISTRICT,

Austin, Texas, February 4th, 1869.

SPECIAL ORDER No. 26.
VII. In accordance with paragraph 1, Special order No. 100, dated, Headquarters 5th Military District, Austin, Texas, Dec. 15, 1868, at an election held in the District composed of Burnett and Williamson counties, Texas, to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of J. W. Talbot, Richard E. Talbot having received a plurality of the votes cast for delegate to a convention, as fixed and apportioned among counties, is hereby announced as elected to fill said vacancy.

Mr. Degener moved the rules be suspended to take up the following resolution:

Resolved, that Mr. Talbot be entitled to his per diem since last Friday.

Rules suspended.
The question recurred upon the adoption of the resolution.

It was adopted.
Mr. Scott moved the further suspension of the rules to put the resolution on its passage.

Rules suspended.
Resolution read a third time and passed.

Mr. Schutze moved a suspension of the rules to take up the following resolution:

Resolved, That the publishers of the San Antonio Free Press, the Galveston Union and the Houston Texas Staats Zeitung, be invited to offer proposals for the printing in the German language of ten thousand copies of the constitution and declarations passed by this Convention, including the cost of a correct translation; that such proposals shall be made to the President of the convention on or before the 1st day of 1869, and he shall be authorized to order the said number of copies to be printed by the publisher who offers to perform the work for the lowest sum.

The convention refused to suspend the rules.
Mr. Armstrong of Jasper offered the following as an additional section

tion to Section 7 of the constitution: Section . . . Every person who is prohibited by Section 3d of Article 14th of the Constitution of the United States from being a Senator or Representative in Congress, or an officer civil or military under the United States or under any State, is hereby declared a qualified elector of this State on his taking on oath of allegiance to the Government of the United States.

The question recurred upon the adoption of the proposed new section; upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 32. Nays 29.
Mr. Varnell moved that this vote be taken by commencing at the foot of the roll and calling upward.

So the new section was adopted.
Mr. Evans of Titus moved to reconsider the vote by which the substitute was adopted.

Mr. Patten moved to lay the motion on the table; upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 26. Nays 35.
So the convention refused to lay on the table.

The question recurred upon the motion to reconsider the vote adopting the additional section.

The convention agreed to reconsider.
Mr. Mills moved to lay the additional section on the table, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 38. Nays 24.
So the section was laid on the table.

The President announced the business in order was the section offered by Mr. Gray this morning.

Mr. Patten moved to lay the section on the table.

Mr. Burnett moved a suspension of the rules to put the Constitution as a whole upon its final passage.

Rules suspended.
The question recurred upon the passage of the section reported from the committee on revision as a whole and passed to engrossment.

The section was adopted.
The President announced the business next in order was the sections introduced by Mr. Phillips of Wharton.

Mr. Wright moved to lay the sections on the table.

Carried.
Mr. Burnett offered additional sections.

By leave the sections were withdrawn.
The President announced the business next in order was the declarations submitting the Constitution to the people of the State.

Mr. Hamilton of Bastrop moved to reject the declaration.

It was rejected.
Mr. Gray offered the following declaration and ordinance providing for the submission of the Constitution to the registered voters, and for the re-establishment of civil government in Texas:

Sec. 4. Be it ordained by the delegates of the people in convention assembled, that the General commanding the 5th Military District be, and he is hereby requested to submit the Constitution framed by this convention for ratification or rejection, to the registered voters of the State of Texas, in the manner provided by the acts of Congress, "for efficient government of the rebel States," at an election to be held on or before the 2d Monday in June 1869; also to cause polls to be opened at the same time for the election of all the officers, County, State and Federal, whose election is authorized by the proposed constitution and the laws of this State.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, That the returns of the election hereinafter authorized be made to the Commanding General, who is requested to count the votes and award certificates of election.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, That the Governor and members of the Legislature shall, within—days after the acceptance of the constitution by the people, convene at the capitol in the city of Austin and organize according to law.

Mr. Board moved the rejection of the declaration, upon which the yeas and nays were demanded, and resulted thus:

Yeas 23. Nays 39.
So the convention refused to reject.

Mr. Board offered the following resolution:

Resolved that in as much as this convention has been in session over one hundred days, and has not as yet made anything like a constitution

under which the people can live; therefore be it

Resolved, That this convention do adjourn on Thursday, the 4th day of February, 1869, at 12 o'clock noon, and that this adjournment be sine die, never to assemble again.

The question recurred upon the adoption of the resolution upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 17. Nays 45.
So the convention refused to adopt.

Mr. Patten introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That this convention do adjourn (without delay) on Thursday, Feb. 4, at 10 o'clock, p. m. subject to be reassembled (if found necessary) by the Commanding General, or the President of the Convention.

Upon which the yeas and nays were demanded and resulted thus:

Yeas 20. Nays 42.
So the convention refused to adjourn.

On motion, the Convention adjourned till the usual hour to-morrow morning.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[PUBLIC-NO. 1.]
An act providing for the sale of the lands, tenements, and water privileges belonging to the United States at and near Harper's Ferry, in the county of Jefferson, West Virginia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of War be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to make sale at public auction of the lands, tenements, and water privileges belonging to the United States at and near Harper's Ferry, in the county of Jefferson, West Virginia, except as hereinafter provided, in such parcels as shall, in his opinion, be best adapted to secure the greatest amount of money therefor, on a credit of one and two years, taking bond and security from the purchaser or purchasers for the payment of the purchase money; and that the proceeds of such sale shall be applied by him as follows: Provided, That no such sale shall be made until the time, terms, and place thereof shall have been published in one of the principal newspapers in each of the cities of Washington, New York, and Cincinnati for sixty days prior to the day of sale:

First, in defraying the expenses of making said sale.

Second, in refunding to the United States the principal purchase money paid for said lands, tenements, and water privileges by the United States, and for the erection of buildings thereon.

Third, if any surplus remain, he shall deliver the same to such agent as the legislature of the State of West Virginia shall appoint to receive the same; but upon condition that such surplus shall be received by the State of West Virginia, to be set apart, held, invested, used, and applied as a part of the school fund of that State, under and by virtue of, and in manner and form as provided in section first of the tenth article of the constitution of West Virginia, and for no other purpose. And on making such sale of the said lands, tenements, and water privileges, or any part thereof, the said Secretary of War is hereby empowered and required, on receiving the purchase money in full, to execute all necessary deeds therefor to the purchaser or purchasers thereof, on behalf of the United States.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of War be authorized and directed to convey by deed to Stoner College, an institution of learning chartered by the State of West Virginia, all those certain portions of the aforesaid property, namely: the buildings, with the lots on which they stand, numbered thirty, thirty-one, and thirty-two, and also building numbered twenty-five, with enough of the lot on which it stands to give a breadth of ten rods on high street, otherwise known as Washington street, all of said buildings and lots being situated at Harper's Ferry aforesaid, being the same which have heretofore been assigned by the War Department to the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands, for educational purposes; and also to convey by deed to the proper persons all such other lands and buildings, portions of the aforesaid property, as have heretofore been set apart by the proper authority for religious, charitable, and town purposes.

Approved, December 15, 1868.

[PUBLIC-NO. 2.]
An act to amend an act entitled "An act imposing taxes on distilled spirits and tobacco and for other purposes," approved July twentieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the seventh-eighth section of "An act imposing taxes on distilled spirits and tobacco, and for other purposes," approved July twentieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, be, and the same is hereby, amended by striking out the words "first day of January," wherever they occur in said section; and inserting in lieu thereof the words "fifteenth day of February."

Approved, December 22, 1868.

[PUBLIC-NO. 3.]
An act authorizing the admission in evidence of copies of certain papers, documents, and entries.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That copies of all official papers and documents belonging to and held on retainer in the office of any consul, vice-consul, or commercial agent of the United States, and of all official entries in the books or records of any such office, shall, when certified under the hand and official seal of the proper consul, vice-consul, or commercial agent, be admissible in evidence in all the courts of the United States.

Approved January 8, 1869.

[PUBLIC-NO. 4.]
An act to repeal certain provisions of section six of an act entitled "An act making appropriations for the support of the army for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and for other purposes," approved March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, so far as the same is applicable to the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Alabama, and Louisiana, is hereby repealed.

Approved, January 14, 1869.

[PUBLIC-NO. 5.]
An act amendatory of an act entitled "An act relating to habeas corpus and regulating judicial proceedings in certain cases."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of an act entitled "An act relating to habeas corpus, and regulating judicial proceedings in certain cases," approved March third, eighteen hundred and sixty-three; so far as the same is hereby declared to extend to any suit or action at law or prosecution, civil or criminal, which has been or shall be commenced in any State court against the owner or owners of any ship or vessel, or of any railway, or of any line of transportation, firm, or corporation engaged in business as common carriers where such loss or damage shall have been occasioned by the acts of those engaged in hostility to the government of the United States during the late rebellion, or where such loss or damage shall have been occasioned by any of the forces of the United States, or by any officer in command of such forces: Provided, That this act shall not be construed to affect any contract of insurance for war risks which may have been made with reference to any goods, wares, or merchandise, which shall have been so destroyed.

Approved, January 22, 1869.

[PUBLIC-NO. 6.]
An act to amend an act entitled "An act to prescribe the mode of obtaining evidence in cases of contested elections," approved February nineteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-one.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any register in bankruptcy or notary public, resident in a congressional district the right to represent which is contested, is hereby authorized to take the testimony and to perform any of the other acts which a judge of any court of the United States is authorized to do by the third section of an act entitled "An act to prescribe the mode of obtaining evidence in cases of contested elections," approved February nineteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-one.

Approved, January 23, 1869.

House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That copies of all official papers and documents belonging to and held on retainer in the office of any consul, vice-consul, or commercial agent of the United States, and of all official entries in the books or records of any such office, shall, when certified under the hand and official seal of the proper consul, vice-consul, or commercial agent, be admissible in evidence in all the courts of the United States.

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Approved, January 23, 1869.

The Supreme Court in the Texas Convention.

We have presented to us the anomaly of the Supreme Court of this State, trying to make an organic law for the government of the people of Texas. We say Supreme, because we find a majority of that court piously (!) seated in that body.

First, we shall notice "Colossal Jack," the great modern Texas Bonaparte, than whom we recognize no greater orator in our State. "Colossal Jack" is the recognized leader of this Supreme Triumvirate, and he evidently feels that his brethren of the bench look upon him as the embodiment of legal and political perfection.

When heavily laden with "Austin whisky," Jack is rather "Quixotic," and sometimes in his hallucinations he takes up the idea that he, Jack, is the republican party of Texas, and this leads him to suppose that inasmuch as he pitches into his past record, he is demolishing the republican party. If Jack does not make as great an ass of himself as "Don Quixote" in his famous attack on the wind-mill, he is at least like him in one thing—he makes use of an immense quantity of wind. If "Colossal Jack" could be induced to leave Austin long enough to forget the influence of "Austin whisky," no doubt he would be himself again.

Judge Lindsey is an able jurist, but he is a stale politician, far be-

hind the progress of the age. Judge Lindsey worries himself hunting up precedents and technicalities and thrusting them upon the Convention; and the "solons" of that body, though they become restless and impatient under these terrible inflictions, are compelled by force of circumstances to submit; whilst the Judge, thinking that three are a majority and should rule the court, thinks he has but to write out his opinion and it becomes law, "Colossal Jack" and C. Caldwell concurring.

Judge Colbert Caldwell, the other member of the Supreme in the Convention, is perhaps the most spy, cunning, political trickster in the "Lone Star" domain; and of all men calculated to bring into contempt any party to which he may profess to belong, providing that party remains quietly passive to his use, Judge Caldwell is certainly best qualified. If we have said that Jack is sometimes "Quixotic," we might also say that Judge Caldwell is a real "Sancho Panza" in his relation to Jack; indeed, no plebeian ever acknowledged the superiority of his master with a more ridiculous grace than he. Judge Caldwell reckons himself, next to Jack, not only the most important man in Texas, but effects to believe that whatever of virtue, patriotism or vitality belongs to the republican party of Texas, not embodied in "Colossal Jack," belongs to himself as Jack's "Squire." Judge Caldwell is possessed of one virtue at least. It is that virtue which attaches to Andy Johnson, and like Andy he possesses this one virtue in an extraordinary degree. Now, we never object to ambitious men; in fact we like to see a man aspire to be something, but we do object to any one rising to position or place by pandering intrigue or running hypocrisy.

Judge Caldwell so often contradicts himself or misrepresents others that he must frequently interrupt the proceedings of the convention by rising to a "question of privilege" to try to explain away some of his glaring inconsistencies. On these occasions, Judge Caldwell spouts and raves "like mad." His egotism vituperation and grandiloquence is truly majestic; but like any other imitator, Judge Caldwell makes ridiculous blunders, and he would no doubt improve faster if Jack would give him a little more private practice.

These Supreme triumvirs incline to the belief that the republican party in Texas, means the "Austin ring."

We are not sure, but we believe, these Supreme gentlemen favor the idea that the convention has plenary power in everything except a division of the State. To this they are bitterly opposed, and we understand that they are of opinion that the time for reconstruction has not arrived. Now, if the State should be divided, it would be very questionable who would pocket the \$4500 salary which each of these gentlemen finds himself in possession of. But if the State is not reconstructed, and the convention resolves itself into a legislative body, they will each continue to draw mileage and per diem to that institution. More than this, they will also be entitled to all railroad and other perquisites. And yet more:

If the convention should become unruly and pass some law or ordinance which this Supreme triumvir do not fancy, they can adjourn over to the court room and declare it "null and void ab initio."

If these Supremes would travel through West, East and North Texas, we incline to the belief that they would change their minds as to the republican party of Texas. But if not, let them become candidates for office in this State, and they will perhaps learn that the republican party of Texas has a vague idea that it can survive, even without the desirable support of the triumvirs which they constitute.

We are glad that Judge Latimer does not believe in the infallibility of these gentlemen, and we are told that Judge Morrill holds a like opinion. We are glad that Judge Latimer has a more just appreciation of loyalty; and the loyal men of Texas will remember him with pride and satisfaction.

Georgia Legislature

The Judiciary Committee of the Senate have submitted a resolution that the Hon. Joshua Hill of Georgia be admitted as a Senator from that State...

In considering the matter, the Committee say the case of Mr. Hill depend upon three considerations: First—Did the Legislature of Georgia, regularly organized in accordance with the constitution of the United States...

Second—Have the Legislature and the people of Georgia, subsequent to such compliance, committed such acts of usurpation and outrage as to place the State in a condition unfit to be represented in Congress.

Third—Whether in the whole case, taking the action of Georgia, both before and since the pretended ratification of the Fourteenth Amendment, a civil government has been established in that State which Congress ought to recognize.

These questions must be answered by the law and the facts. The committee then proceeded to quote the proclamation of General Meade, calling the Legislature together, and his correspondence relative to the eligibility of certain of its members...

The committee next refer to the expulsion of the colored members, and state that it is not possible to hold that no remedy for this wrong is now in the power of Congress—a wrong by which more than half the people of Georgia are deprived of the rights and privileges to which they are entitled.

The committee learn from the agents of the Freedmen's Bureau that in that State there have been 336 cases of murder from January 15, 1868, to November 1, 1868, and for all those outrages there had been no legal redress, and the civil government has evinced its total inadequacy...

The object of the call having been stated by his Honor, the Mayor, which was in regard to adopting the Ordinance fixing the License Taxes and Ad Valorem taxes for the year ending Jan. 1st, 1870, when the finance committee reported an ordinance...

His Honor, the Mayor was authorized to contract with Messrs. Sweeney and Haley as street contractors at \$120 per month, their proposal being the lowest for said work.

The legal opinion of M. G. Anderson in regard to renting of butcher stalls on Dec. 30, 1868, whether the same was legally done or not, was received and ordered filed.

On motion, the Mayor be authorized to inquire into this matter and report next meeting.

FRIDAY, Jan. 23, 1869.

Present—His Honor, Mayor Thielepape, Aldermen—Messrs. Hertzberg, Artzt, Sartor, Groos, Buchetti and Pentenrieder.

The object of the call having been stated by his Honor, the Mayor, which was in regard to the petition of Nat Lewis, S. Dauchauer, Bishop Dubois, and T. J. Devine, in regard to the line of building their front walls.

The petition of S. Dauchauer was read, on motion, which was adopted; that the Mayor proceed in Mr. Dauchauer's case as the city surveyor directs.

The petition of Nat Lewis to have a jury of seven freeholders appointed to assess the damages or benefits by the removal of his front wall to a line given by the city—petition granted.

The petition of Bishop Dubois to be shown the line to the front wall. It was ordered that the city surveyor make a plat showing the line he has made and report accordingly, forthwith, to committee on public improvements.

The petition of T. J. Devine in regard to the front wall on Market street, ordered that the city surveyor show the line from John James' property to Persch's corner on same street and Thier street.

The petitions of Fred. Boeschel and G. Persch for ditch commissioner, were read; on motion the candidates be balloted for: on first ballot a tie vote, second ballot Persch received 3 votes and Boeschel received 4 votes. Mr. Boeschel was declared elected, and his salary fixed at \$100 per month, so long as his services may be required, said ditch commissioner to receive instructions from the Mayor in the discharge of his duties.

A petition signed by numerous citizens praying that the old wooden house on Commerce street, adjoining the store of the Messrs. Bells, be declared a nuisance, and the city authorities to cause the same to be removed—said petition read.

On motion of alderman Arts, it was adopted, that hereafter any person who will hitch to Fire Co. No. 4 steam engine, two horses, and bring the same to the place of fire, shall be rewarded with \$10 U. S. currency.
