#### Carl Schurtz.

At the outbreak of the rebellion, no man in the country more readily or profoundly comprehended, nor more powerfully and eloquently interpreted to the people the meaning and issues of the revolution then inaugurated, than Mr. Schurtz. He took the most radical ground, and helped very materially to enlighten to the true standard. His speeches were remarkable for their insight into the principles involved in the war, and he enunciated them with characteristic German profundity and thoroughness. The election of such a man is a source of pleasure to all true republicans. We give the following extract from his recent speech before the joint session of the General Assembly of Mis-

"In order to arrive at that permastruggle for their rights. Our democratic system of government can stand with security only upon the foundation of impartial justice and rights equal to all. A Washington correspondent of the Detroit Tribune says:
