THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

WASHINGTON, March 4.—General Grant said: Your suffrage having elevated me to the office of the President of the United States, I have, in conformity to the constitution of the country, taken the oath of office prescribed by it, and have taken this oath without mental reservation, and with the determination to do to the best of my ability all that is required of me. The responsibilities of the office I feel, but accept them without fear. The office has come to me unsought, and I commence its duties untrammelled. I bring to it a conscientious desire and determination to fill it to the best of my ability, and to the satisfaction of the people, on all leading questions agitating the public. I will always express my views to Congress, and urge them according to my judgment; and when I think it advisable, will exercise the constitutional privilege of interposing a veto to defeat measures which are, in my opinion, unconstitutional; but all laws will be faithfully executed, whether they meet my approval or not.

I shall, on all subjects, have a policy to recommend, but none to enforce against the will of the people. Laws are to govern all alike, those opposed to, as well as those who favor them. I know no method that will so aid the repeal of obnoxious laws as their stringent execution.

The country having just arisen from a great rebellion, many questions will come before it for settlement in the next four years, which preceding administrations have never had to deal with. In meeting these, it is desirable that they should be approached calmly, without prejudice, hate and sectional pride, remembering that the greatest good to the greatest number is the object to be attained. This requires respect of person and property, and for religious and political opinions in every part of our common country, without regard to local prejudices. All laws to secure these ends will have my best efforts for their enforcement.

A great debt has been incurred in securing to us and our posterity, the Union; the payment of the principal and interest, as well as the return to a specie basis as soon as it can be accomplished without material detriment to the debtor class, or to the country at large, must be provided for to protect the national honor.

Every dollar of the Government's indebtedness must be paid in gold, unless otherwise stipulated in the contract. Let it be understood that no repudiator of one farthing of our national debt will be trusted in public place, and it will go far towards strengthening our credit, which ought to be the best in the world; and will ultimately enable us to replace the debt with bonds bearing less interest than we now pay. To this should be added a faithful collection of the revenue,—responsibility to the treasury for every dollar collected, and the greatest practicable retrenchment in expenditures in every department of the government.

When we compare the paying capacity of the country now, with ten States still in poverty from the effects of war—but soon to emerge, I trust, into greater prosperity than ever before—with its paying capacity twenty-five years ago, we can estimate what it probably will be twenty-five years hence. Who can doubt the feasibility of paying every dollar then, with no more tax than we now pay for needless luxuries. While it looks as though Providence had bestowed upon us a strong box of the precious metals, locked up in the sterile mountains of the far West, which we are now forging the key to unlock, to meet the very contingency that is now upon us.

Ultimately it may be necessary to increase the main lines to reach those riches, and it may be necessary, also, for the General Government to give its aid to secure this access, but that should only be when a dollar of obligation presents the same sort of dollar as in use now, and not before. Whilst the question of specie payment is in abeyance, the prudent business man is careful about contracting debts payable in the distant future. The Nation should follow the same rules.

A prostrated commerce is to be rebuilt and all industries encouraged. The young men from their age must be its rulers twenty-five years hence, and have a peculiar interest in maintaining the National honor. A momentary reflection as to what will be our commanding influence among the Nations of the earth, in their days, should inspire them with National pride. All divisions, geographical, political and religious, can join in this common sentiment.

How the public debt is to be paid and specie payments resumed, is not so important as that a plan should be adopted and

acquired in. Legislation upon the subject may not be necessary now, nor advisable, but it will be when the civil law is more fully restored in all parts of the country, and trade has its wonted channels. It will be my aim to execute all laws in good faith, to collect all revenues assessed, and to have them properly accounted for and economically disbursed. I wish, to the best of my ability, to appoint to office only those who will carry out the design.

In regard to foreign policy, I would leave individuals to deal with each other. I would protect the law abiding citizen, whether of native or of foreign birth, wherever his rights are in jeopardy, or the flag of our country floats. I would respect the rights of all nations; demanding equal respect for our own. If they depart from this rule in their dealings with us, we may be compelled to follow their precedent.

The proper treatment of the original occupants of this land—the Indians—is one deserving of careful study, and I will favor any course towards them which favors their civilization, christianization, and ultimate citizenship.

The question of suffrage is one which is likely to agitate the public so long as a portion of the citizens of the nation are excluded from its privileges in any State. It seems to me very desirable that this question should be finally settled now, and I entertain the hope, and express the desire, that it may be by the ratification of the 15th Article of the Amendment to the Constitution.

In conclusion, I ask patient forbearance, one towards another, throughout the land, and a determined effort on the part of every citizen to do his share towards a happy union, and I ask the prayers of the Nation to Almighty God, in behalf of this consummation.

Proceedings of the City Council.—Tuesday, Feb. 11. Board met pursuant to a previous adjournment. Present—Messrs. Mayor, Thompson, Alderman—Messrs. Atter, Sartorius and H. Thompson. The minutes of February 10, 1879, were read and approved. The Committee on Petitions and Ordinances also, when they had read the same for the prevention and extinguishing of fires, and the City Police and citizens when they had read the same, reported favorable on said ordinance; the same was adopted by sections as read, and to be in force from and after its passage. An ordinance, amending an ordinance passed March 2nd, 1878, in regard to the obstructions of side-walks, the same was adopted by sections as read, and to be in force from and after its passage. The session, board adjourned till Tuesday, February 18, 1879.

HIDE ORDERS.—The attention of those concerned is invited to General order No. 15, extending the provisions of the legislative act of 1876 to all persons engaged in the hide trade. The penalties provided in the law passed Nov. 1876, are attached to any violation of this act, and offenders are to be tried before a military tribunal. This order strikes at an offense that has lately grown into large proportions and to a point that a salutary effect would follow its rigorous enforcement.

The order was received too late for its publication in our issue of the 11th inst.

LOVELY SPECIMENS.—Some of our common robins, when they go South to spend the winter, are exceedingly fond of the berries of the "Fruit of India," a tree that is grown extensively for ornament and shade in some localities of Georgia and Florida. The birds collect upon it in great numbers, and after feeding a while, many of them become so intoxicated that they fall to the ground. Here they are picked up by the colored population, who, seeing their very nice materials for "pot-pies," if left undisturbed, the little creatures never recover from the effects of their intoxication.
