OFFICIAL. LAWS OF THE

UNITED STATES, Passed at the Third Session of

the Fortieth Congress,

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

A PROCLAMATION Whereas a convention defining the rights, tumunities and privileges of consuls, be-

tween the United States of America and his Majesty the King of Italy, was concluded tween the United States of America and his Majesty the King of Italy, was concluded and signed by their respective plenipoten-tiaries at Washington, the eighth day of February, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, which convention being in the Eng-lish and Italian languages, is word for

word as follows:
The President of the United States and his Majesty the King of Italy, recognizing the utility of defining the rights, privileges, and immunities of consular officers in the two countries, deem it expedient to

conclude a consolar convention for that purpose.

Accordingly, they have named: the President of the United States, William H. Seward, Secretary of State of the United States; his Majesty the King of Italy, the Commander Marcello Cerruti, &c.; who, after communicating to each other their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE I.

Each of the high contracting parties agrees to receive from the other consular general, consula, vice-consule and consular

general, consuls, vice-consule and consular agents, in all its ports, cities, and places, except those where it may not be convenient to recognize such officers. This reservation, however, shall not apply to one of the high contracting parties wit applying to every other power. ARTICLE IL.

Consular officers, on the presentation of their commissions in the forms established in their respective countries, shall be furnished with the necessary exequater free of charge, and on the exhibition of this instrument they shall be permitted to enjoy the rights, prerogatives and immunities granted by this convention. ARTICLE III.

Consular officers, citizens or subjects of the State by which they are appointed, shall be exempt from arrest, except in the case of offences which the local legislation case of offences which the local legislation qualifies as crimes, and punishes as such; from military billetings, from service in the militia or in the national guard, or in the regular army, and from all taxation, federal, state, or municipal. If, however, they are citizens or subjects of the State where they reside, or own property, or engage in business there, they shall be liable to the same charges of all kinds as other citizens or subjects of the country, who are merchants or owners of reposerty.

ARTICLE IV.

No consular officer who is a citizen or subject of the State by which he was ap-pointed, and who is not engaged in busin-ess, shall be compelled to appear as a wit-uess before the courts of the country where he may reside. When the testimony of such a consular officer is needed, he shall such a consular officer is needed, he shall be invited in writing to appear in court, and if unable to do so, his testimony shall be requested in writing, or be taken orally, at his dwelling or office.

It shall be the duty of said consular offi-cer to comply with this request, without any delay which can be avoided.

In all criminal cases, contemplated by
the sixth article of the amendments to the
constitution of the United States, whereby
the right is secured to persons charged
with crimes to obtain witnesses in their
favor, the appearance in court of said consular officer shall be demanded, with all
possible regard to the consular dignity and
to the duties of his office. A similar treatment shall also be extended to United
States consuls in Ital in the like cases. States consuls in Ital in the like cases. ARTICLE V

Consuls general, consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents may place over the outer door of their offices, or of their dwelling houses, the arms of their nation, wish this inscription, "Consulate, or vice-consulate, or consular agency," of the United States, or of Italy, &c., &c. And they may also raise the flag of their country ou their offices or dwellings, except in the capital or the country, when there is a legation there.

ARTICLE VI ARTICLE VI.

The consular offices and dwellings shall be at all times inviolable. The local authorities shall not, under any pretext, invade them. In no case shall they examine or seize the papers there deposited. In no case shall those offices or dwellings be used as places of asylum. When, however, a consular officer is engaged in other business the papers relating to the consulate shall be kept separate.

ARTICLE VII.

In the event of the death, incapacity, or

In the event of the death, incapacity, or absence of consuls general, consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents, their chancellors or secretaries, whose official character may have previously been made known to the Department of State at Washinger to the minister for foreign affairs in Italy, may temporarily exercise their functions of the same of the ly, may temporarily exercise their func-tions, and while thus acting they shall en-

tions, and while thus acting they shall enjoy all the rights, preregatives, and immunities granted to the incumbents.

ARTICLE VIII.

Consuls general and consuls may, with the approbation of their respective governments, appoint vice-consuls and consular agents in the cities, ports, and places within their consular jurisdiction. These officers may be citizens of the United States, Italian subjects, or other foreigners. They shall be furnished with a commission by the consul who appoints them and under whose orders they are to act. They shall enjoy the privileges stipulated for consular officers in this convention, subject to the exceptions specified in Articles III and IV.

Anticles IX

Consula general, consula, vice consula, and consular agents, may complain to the authorities of the respective countries, whether federal or local, judicial or executive, within their consular district, of any infraction of the treaties and conventions between the UnitedStates and Italy, or for ehe purpose of protecting the rights and interests of their countrymen. If the complaint should not be satisfactorily redressed, the consular officers aforesaid, in the absence of a diplomatic agent of their country, may apply directly to the government of the country where they reside.

ARTICLE X.

Consuls general, consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents, may take at their offices, at the residence of the parties at their private residence, or on board ship, the depositions of the captains and crews of vessels of their own country, of passengers on board of them, and of any ether citizen or subject of their nation. They may also receive at their offices, conforma-ARTICLE X.

tion to which said consular officer may be long. Copies of such papers, and officia documents of every kind, whether in the original, copy or translation, duly authen-ticated and legitimed by the consula gene ral, consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents, and scaled with their official scal, shall be received as legal documents in courts of justice throughout the United States and Italy. At Cachar where it was most severe, the Cachan where it was most severe, the earth seemed agitated by a great wave, rising in a well 20 feet high, tossing trees and buildings about, and making trees and buildings about, and making hills reel. The river chang ed its course and ran upwards for an hour, tossing the water 30 feet into the air. The earth opened in hundreds of places, vomiting up volumes of blue sand and water and enguifing houses, cattle and men; in sone cases closing over what it had swallowed, and in others remaining in yawning abysses, sellwing the roofs of houses 20 feet below the surface. The co-vulsion was felt over all Lower Bengal at the same time, and continued with great shocks for several days.
