A PROCLAMATION.

(Continued.) ARTICLE XI.

ARTYCER XII.

The Lobby.

Perhaps of all modern inventions the lobby receives the least praise. Take, for instance, Indiana; the Constitution of that State forbids all special legislation upon any subject. The Legislature can or could some years ago; we do not know what changes may recently have been made-pass no special laws, grant no special privileges of any kind. Whatever it authorized it must authorize by a general law, under which any citizen might act. Thus, there was a general milroad law, a general banking law, a general ferry law, a general law incorporating literary societies, and so forth. When the Indiana Constitution was thus ordered, the lobby ceased to exist. There was nothing for it to do-nothing for it to feed on. Legislation was simplified.
