SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

Congress.

WASHINGTON, April 3.

HOUSE—The House is considering the Fargo railroad matter.

The election committee did nothing.

The reconstruction committee heard Virginia.

The Republicans favor a spring election and the submission of the Constitution of Texas, and are against a division of the State.

A colloquy between Butler and Whitmore, indicates a disposition to let Texas and Virginia slide this session.

Deficiency appropriation bill, including two millions for salaries of assessors and collectors, passed.

Concurrent resolution to adjourn on the 10th adopted. Adjourned.

SENATE—Judiciary committee directed to report a bill defining the meaning of the eight hour law.

Sprague made a personal explanation, that his courage and his word did not rest on wine or whisky, but on his knowledge of the danger to the country from the legislative and executive power assumed by the Senate.

Longstreet's appointment confirmed after two hours discussion—55 to 20.

Concurrent resolution to adjourn April 10th, passed both Houses.

American News.

WASHINGTON, April 3.

Gen. Badeau is ordered to report to the President for duty.

Secretary Borie will be absent until Tuesday.

It is expected that the Spanish minister will leave the country, in case Bank's Cuban resolution is adopted.

Twenty-five Virginians called on Grant, who intimated that he would consult with the cabinet and communicate a message, recommending vital changes, which include submission of the constitution with the test oath and disfranchisement.

Nominations: Governors of Territories—Stafford, of Arizona; J. A. Campbell, of Wyoming; C. G. Crane, of New Mexico; Alvin Flanders, of Washington; Steadman Conist at St. Jago de Cuba; Pinkney Rollins collector for 7th district of N. C.; J. W. Boreman assessor for 7th district of N. C.; Napoleon Underwood assessor for the 2nd district of La.; J. Hoddie postmaster at Holly Springs, Miss.; C. Lovell postmaster at New Orleans.

Hill, leading half a dozen members of the Georgia Legislature, waited upon Gen. Grant, in opposition to the Bullock party.

By direction of the President, paragraph 8 of general order 18, March 16th, 1869, discontinuing the department of the Cumberland, is revoked. Maj. Gen. Cooke is assigned to the command of that department when it shall be relinquished.

New York, April 3.—The steamer Fairbank brings the crew of the Model, from Portland for Savannah, wrecked off Point Lookout.

PHILADELPHIA, April 3.—Twichel in his confession says, his wife killed her mother in quiet, while he was asleep. Twichel afterwards assisted in throwing the body out of the window.

TEXAS ITEMS.

WIGFALL, of Texas, has been practicing predatory lawfare outside of the English courts, since the close of the war.

The Tyler Reporter and Bonham News raise the name of John Hancock for Governor, to the northward.

UNDER the name of the San Antonio Express has been lifted out of the gutter, and appears to be wished pretty decently for a dirty radical sheet.—Houston Times.

It is announced that the Central Railroad would be completed to Hearne's Station by Saturday last, the 20th inst., and to Calvert by the 1st of May.

ONE or two more such editorials in the State Gazette as the one published yesterday, headed "Elisha, the Ensignite," will secure the election of E. M. Pease as the next Governor of Texas, whether he is a candidate or not.—Austin Republican.

Hamilton is forced down the throats of the people in all his soothing demagogues, it is to be hoped Hon. John Hancock, the accomplished jurist and high toned gentleman, may be elected to the next highest State office.—Lavaca Commercial.

A REJECTED APOSTLE.—The Austin Register rejects the idea of running Bonlds Baker for Lieutenant Governor on the ticket with A. J. Hamilton, and says that "Governor Hamilton and his friends have no connection or sympathy with the scheme." Then the next conundrum in order—who has! Surely the modest Bonlds has no idea of running on the platform of his own merits.

The Shreveport Southwestern says: We hear it rumored on our streets that one of the Jefferson prisoners has turned States' evidence, and made some very important disclosures, which, it is said, will go far toward convicting the others. Knowing ones who wear the blue, state they have evidence enough to hang or shoot the leaders, and send the others to the Dry Tortugas.

THE Houston Times thus alludes to the Constitution submitted to the voters for ratification: The election comes off in July, of the adoption of this hell-bog instrument. From what we know of this infamous product of infamy, the thought of its adoption becomes at once appalling. The thought of adopting this tonest of foul blots, as the organic law of the land, is alarming, terrifying and revolting.

FROM Lavaca county we have the most gloomy accounts of the prospects of the crops. While the corn is in a condition to be worked, the grasshoppers have commenced their depredations, with the almost certain prospect of entire destruction to the crops. It is supposed that all of the cotton planted will also be destroyed, and that seed cannot be obtained to recast the crops. Cotton seed will command three dollars per bushel in this market in a short time, with such a prospect. And what makes the prospect more threatening, is the fact that these wretched creatures are still hatching out their young, and may not leave the country for the next two months. We fear the remarks made of Lavaca county, may apply to all of the interior country. Fortunately for us, the coast counties have not been visited by these scallwags.—Lavaca Commercial.

We are glad to see that Messrs. Sibley & St. John have inaugurated the importation of Texas beef, cured at Victoria from perfectly healthy animals at their own grazing grounds. By the process in use at Victoria—that of the refrigerated chamber—the same effect is produced as by the natural climate of the North; and as the beefs lose nothing from long driving, there is no staining to make up on the time. After packing, the beef is brought direct to our wharves in the vessels of the firm at a cost within the reach of all. Not only have certificates been published from reliable inspectors; but first-rate and reliable judges among our own merchants have pronounced it, after trial, equal to the run of any beef ever brought to our market. It is a question well worth the careful investigation of our merchants, contractors, planters and others interested in the purchase of large supplies. Every additional pound of supplies we can make to our own hand within our own borders, is as much saved in good money; and every additional ship-load of freight brought to our wharves is that much gain to the prosperity of Mobile.

In the present aspect of affairs we cannot be too ready to grasp at every means of self support; and we consider it in all cases the duty of every Southern merchant to buy Southern produce of all kinds, when he can get it of as good quality as the Northern and at the same rates.—Mobile Register.

OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.

(Continued.)

[PUBLIC-NO. 65.]

An act to define the fees of recorder of deeds and to provide for the appointment of warden of the jail in the District of Columbia, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this act the style of the "register of deeds of the District of Columbia" shall be "recorder of deeds of the District of Columbia."

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the legal fees for the services of said recorder of deeds shall be as follows, viz: The filing, recording, and indexing, or for making certified copy of any instrument containing two hundred words or less, fifty cents, and fifteen cents for each additional hundred words, to be collected at the time of filing, and when the copy is made.

For each certificate and seal, twenty-five cents.

For searching records extending back two years or less next preceding current date, twenty-five cents, and five cents for each additional year, to be paid by the party for whom the search may be made.

For recording a town plat, three cents for each lot such plat may contain.

For recording a plat or survey, five cents for each course such survey may contain.

For filing and indexing any paper required by law to be filed in his office, fifteen cents per year.

For each examination of title by the party or his attorney, fifty cents.

For taking any acknowledgment, fifty cents.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That all deeds of conveyance, leases, powers of attorney, and other written instruments required by law to be filed and recorded, and all copies of instruments and records and certificates authorized by law, filed, recorded, made, and certified by William G. Flood, as acting register of deeds for said District since the death of Edward C. Eddie, late register, up to the date of the appointment and qualification of his successor shall be, and are hereby, declared to be legally performed, the same as if the said William G. Flood had been legally appointed and qualified as register of deeds. And the said William G. Flood is hereby declared to be entitled to all the legal fees and emoluments of said office for his said services which have been hitherto allowed the register of deeds, and which accrued during said period.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passage of this act the supreme court of the District of Columbia shall have authority to appoint a suitable person to act as warden of the jail of said District, and to remove said officer whenever in the opinion of said court the public interests may require it, and to fill all vacancies which may occur.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That the warden of said jail shall have authority to appoint such subordinate officers, guards, employees, as are necessary for the proper management and safe-keeping of prisoners, which now are or may hereafter be authorized by law, subject to the approval of the chief justice of said court.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

Approved March 3, 1869.

[PUBLIC-NO. 42.]

An act to provide for the execution in the District of Columbia of commissions issued by the courts of the States and Territories of the United States or foreign nations, and for taking depositions to be used in such courts.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any party to any suit depending in any court of any State or Territory of the United States, or of any foreign nation, may obtain the testimony of any witness residing in, or temporarily within, the District of Columbia, to be used in such suit. When a commission to take such testimony shall have issued from the court in which such suit is pending, or a notice shall have been given according to the rules of practice prevailing in such court, on producing the same to justice of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, and on due proof being made to such officer that the testimony of any witness residing in the District, or temporarily within it, is material to the party desiring the same, such officer shall issue a summons to such witness, requiring him to appear before the commissioners named in such commission or notice to testify to such suit. Such summons shall specify the time and place at which such witness is required to attend, which shall be within the District of Columbia.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That if a suit is pending in any court of any State or Territory of the United States, or of any foreign nation, and it shall satisfactorily appear by affidavit by any officer named in the next preceding section, or to the judge of the orphans' court, or any commissioner for the taking of depositions appointed by the supreme court of the district—

First. That any person residing or temporarily dwelling in the District of Columbia is a material witness for either party to such suit.

Secondly. That no commission or notice to take the testimony of such witness has been issued or given; and

Thirdly. That according to the course and practice of the court in which such suit is pending, the deposition of a witness taken without the presence and consent of both parties will be received on the trial or hearing of such suit.

Such officer shall issue his summons requiring such witness to appear before him at a place within the District at some reasonable time to testify in such suit.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the officer before whom such witness shall appear shall take his testimony in writing, and shall certify and transmit the same to the court before which such suit is pending in such manner as the practice of the court may require. If any person shall refuse or neglect to appear at the time and place mentioned in the summons issued in accordance with this act, or if, on his appearance, he shall refuse to testify, he shall be liable to the same penalties as would be incurred for a like offence on the trial of a suit.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That every witness appearing and testifying under this act shall be entitled to receive from the party at whose instance he has been summoned the fees now provided by law for each day he shall give attendance.
