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**OFFICIAL LAWS**  
OF THE  
**UNITED STATES,**  
Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.

*(Continued.)*

*(Public- No. 28.)*

An Act making appropriations for the support of the army for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated, for the support of the army for the year ending the thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and seventy:

For expenses of recruiting and transportation of recruits, fifty thousand dollars.

For pay of the army, eleven million dollars.

For compensation of officers' subsistence, one million five hundred thousand dollars.

For compensation of surgeons for officers' horses, twenty thousand dollars.

For payment in lieu of clothing for officers' servants, two hundred thousand dollars.

For payments to discharged soldiers for clothing not drawn, two hundred thousand dollars.

For subsistence in kind for regular troops and employees, four million five hundred thousand dollars.

For medical and hospital department, two hundred thousand dollars.

For purchase of artificial limbs for officers, soldiers, and sailors, forty thousand dollars.

For medical and other necessary work for the library of surgeon general's office, two thousand dollars.

For expenses of commanding general's office, five thousand dollars.

For regular supplies to the quartermasters' department, to wit:

For the regular supplies of the quartermasters' department, consisting of food for officers, enlisted men, guards, hospitals, storehouses, and offices, of forage in kind for the horses, mules, and oxen of the quartermasters' department at the several posts and stations, and, with the armies in the field, for the use of the several regiments of cavalry, the batteries of artillery, and such companies of infantry as may be mounted, and for the authorized number of officers' horses when serving in the field and at the posts, including, but not limited to, the amounts of straw for soldiers' bedding and of stationery, including blank books for the quartermasters' department, certificates for discharged soldiers, blank books for the pay and quartermasters' departments, and for printing of division and department orders and reports, five million dollars.

For the general and incidental expenses of the quartermasters' department, consisting of postage on letters and packets received and sent by officers of the army on public service; expenses of courts-martial, military commissions, and courts of inquiry, including the additional compensation of judge advocates, recorders, members, and witnesses while on that service, under the act of March sixteen, eighteen hundred and two; extra pay to soldiers employed under the provisions of the law for the support of the erection of barracks, quarters, storehouses, and hospitals, in the construction of roads, and other constant labor, for periods of not less than ten days, under the acts of March two, eighteen hundred and nineteen, and August fourth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, including those employed as clerks at division and department headquarters; expenses of officers' messes and from the frontier posts and armies in the field of escorts to postmasters and other disbursing officers, and to trains where military convoys cannot be furnished; expenses of the transportation of troops in the field, or at posts on the frontier, or at posts or other places, when ordered by the secretary of war, and of non-commissioned officers and soldiers authorized office furniture, hire of laborers in the quartermasters' department, including the hire of interpreters, spies, and guides for the army; compensation of clerks to officers of the quartermasters' department; compensation of forage and wagonmasters, authorized by the act of July fifth, eighteen hundred thirty-eight, for the apprehension of deserters and the expenses inci-

dent to their pursuit and for the following expenditures required for the several regiments of cavalry, the batteries of light artillery, and such companies of infantry as may be mounted, viz: the purchase of travelling bags, blankets, and shoes; hats, horse and mule shoes and nails; iron and steel for shoeing; hire of veterinary surgeons; medicines for horses and mules; picket ropes; and for shoeing the horses of the corps named; also, generally, the proper and authorized expenses for the movement and operations of an army, not expressly assigned to any other department, one million dollars.

For the purchase of horses for cavalry and artillery, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For mules, or the allowance made to officers of the army for the transportation of themselves and their baggage, when travelling on duty without troops, escorts, or supplies, one hundred thousand dollars.

For transportation of the army, including baggage of the troops when moving either by land or water, of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, from the depots of Philadelphia, Cincinnati, and New York to the several posts and army depots, and from those depots to the troops in the field; and of subsistence stores from the places of purchase, and from the places of delivery under contract, to such places as the circumstances of the service may require, to be sent by ordnance, ordnance stores, and small arms from the foundries and arsenals to the arsenals, fortifications, frontier posts, and army depots; freights, wharves, tolls, and cartages; the purchase and hire of horses, mules, oxen, and wagons, carts, and drays; and ships and other conveyances, and boats required for the transportation of supplies and for garrison purposes; the drays and cartage at the several posts; hire of teamsters; transportation of funds for the pay and other disbursing departments; the expense of sailing public transports on the various rivers, the Gulf of Mexico, and the Atlantic and Pacific for procuring water at such posts as from their situation require it to be brought from a distance; and for clearing roads, harbors, and rivers, to the extent which may be required for the actual operations of the troops in the field, six and one-half million dollars.

For hire or commutation of quarters for officers on military duty; hire of quarters for troops, of storehouses for the safe-keeping of military stores, and of grounds for summer cantonments; for the construction of temporary huts, hospitals and stables, and for repairing public buildings at established posts, one million dollars.

For heating and cook stoves, fifteen thousand dollars.

For the ordnance service, required to defray the current expenses at the arsenals of receiving stores and issuing arms and other ordnance supplies of polished and of unpolished iron, steel, brass, and copper; of stationery and office furniture; of tools and instruments for use of public armaments, swags and vehicles; incidental expenses of the ordnance service, including those attending practical trials and tests of ordnance, small arms, and other ordnance supplies, two hundred thousand dollars. Provided that no money appropriated by this act shall be used in purchasing any iron, steel, or small arms.

**SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.**

**American News.**  
Washington, April 23.

Nominations to-day are only a half dozen, none Southern.

Senate committee allowed correspondents to depart.

Davis reports that the Allies refused to allow McMahon, bearer of dispatches to the Palmyra islands, to pass the lines.

The President withdrew the nomination of James B. Townsend, marshal of South Mississippi.

Details of the flood, North, are terrible. At Grand Bay, Virginia, eleven persons were swept away.

The flood at Albany, N. Y., was within two feet of the flood of 1867.

At Merriam and Concord it was higher than since 1832.

The Senate will doubtless remain in session all night, unless the adjourning resolution is reconsidered.

There was a big fight to-day over the nomination of Sanford for Spain; the nominations for first-class missions, in absence, in the Senate.

To-day, Sprague in replying to Nye, who made a personal explanation, and Abbott, of N. C., who defended Gen. Burdick, Gov. of Rhode Island, said, he had expected to be ridiculed and pronounced drunk and crazy. There was a multitude behind him, equally intoxicated and equally crazy. During his speech, still alluding to Nye, Abbott, and Anthony, Sprague said: Is there anything left in the constitution of our fathers that remains sacred yet, against which you do not dare to raise a suicidal hand?

The vote tabling Sanford's nomination to Spain was 36 to 37.

Gov. Hamilton, Maj. Oehlert, and other Tories, have resigned.

It is stated that the Administration sustains Hamilton's views regarding reconstruction.

The Senate to-day postponed action on the nomination of Lippard, for marshal of Texas. Blocker holds over.

It is supposed the Texas election occurs in July.

OTTAWAY, April 22.—Notice was given in

the House of Commons of a bill of indemnity against the United States, for precautionary measures against the Fenians. The mover said the object was to give members an opportunity to speak on the subject, and express their views upon Chamberlain's speech.

MADRID, April 22.—The leader of the Republicans said that the only alternative of the majority was to restore the Bourbons, or inaugurate a Republic. Senor Sorilla replied, that the restoration of the Bourbons was absolutely impossible, and that the establishment of a Republic would be a national calamity, and the majority, he asserted, would certainly succeed in obtaining a King.

## HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, WASHINGTON, April 6, 1869.

### General Order, No. 30.

The following regulations have been received from the War Department, and are published for the government of all concerned:

I. The number of clerks and messengers allowed to the headquarters of military divisions and departments out of the general service recruits, as prescribed in General Order No. 92, of November 4, 1868, will be reduced, so that from the 1st of July next they will not exceed ten in the aggregate, all of whom will be rated as clerks, and allowed the extra pay and commutations prescribed for "clerks."

II. The aggregate number of hired citizens employed by the Quartermaster's Department, whether rated as clerks, transmitters, mechanics, or laborers, will be reduced as rapidly as possible, so that by the 1st of July, 1869, and thereafter, they will not exceed 4,000 in the aggregate. The Quartermaster General will distribute this number to the several

departments according to the number of troops therein, or according to the work to be done; and when any necessity arises for a special number of hired men in excess of the above number, he will submit the case for the orders of the President.

III. The commanding generals of military divisions and departments will cause thorough inspections to be made as to the number of officers drawing commutation for fuel and quarters, and will reduce the number as much as possible. All officers and troops should be quartered in the regular forts and barracks belonging to the United States when ever it is possible, and when the barracks are inadequate for all military purposes, they may submit plans and estimates for new or enlarged barracks, with a view to accommodate in public buildings the army on its present standard.

IV. In like manner the commanding generals of divisions and departments will cause a thorough inquiry into all the means of transportation, whether of animals, wagons, barges, boats, &c., with a view to a reduction to the actual wants of the service, and will report thereon to the Headquarters of the Army specially.

## THE ROAR OF THE GORILLA.

When the gorilla saw our party, he stood up and looked us boldly in the face. He stood about a dozen yards from us, and it was a sight I shall never forget. He looked so big! Nearly six feet high, with an immense body, huge chest, and muscular arms, with fiercely glaring eyes, deep, gray eyes, and a hellish expression of face, which seemed to me like some nightmare vision. Thus stood, before me that king of the African forest. How black his face was! He was not afraid of us. He stood there, and beat his breast with his huge fist till it sounded like an immense kettle-drum, which is their mode of offering defiance, meantime giving vent to roar after roar. This was the most singular and awful noise I had ever heard in these African forests. It began with a sharp bark, like that of an

angry dog; then glided into a deep bass growl, which literally and closely resembled the roll of distant thunder along the sky. I have heard the lion roar, but greater deeper and more fearful is the roar of the gorilla. So deep is it that it seems to come less from the mouth and throat than from the deep chest and vast paunch of the beast.—Du Chaille's Wild Life Under the Equator.

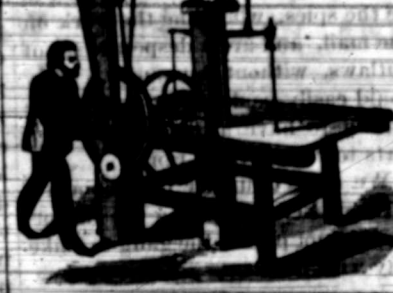

**Proceedings of the City Council.**

**REGULAR MEETING.**  
**WEDNESDAY, April 17th, 1906.**  
**Present.**—His Honor, Mayor Thielopape, Aldermen—Messrs. Hertelberg, Arta, Sartor, Gross, Callaghan, Buchetti, and Pentenrider.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.  
 The letter of Alderman Gross, in answer to a letter of the Mayor, commanding by his Honor the Mayor, in the office, if the official seal of the City of San Antonio, who could not take the oath immediately, would be legal and binding or not. A printed order from Headquarters was the answer.

The petition of Antonio Hutzler, in regard to a water wheel erected by Mr. Muhl in the alley between Green street, that said water wheel was doing much damage to said Hutzler's land, and praying for relief; the same was referred to committee on Public Improvements.

The letter of G. Schleicher, concerning the Iron Foot Bridge, as to the construction of the abutments for the same, and when he should instruct Messrs. Range & Co., of Indiana, to forward said bridge to San Antonio.

On motion, which was adopted, that His Honor the Mayor be authorized to give public notice to invite bids for the construction of the stone abutments according to Mr. Schleicher's specifications, laid down for the same.

It was ordered by the Board that when the rate of freight from Indianapolis to this place will be at the rate of \$1.50 per 100 lbs. specie, Mr. Schleicher be requested to have the Iron Foot Bridge forwarded to this city.

The proposition of Wm. Steel, to build a wooden foot bridge across the San Antonio river, at the foot of alley continuation of Paso street, accompanied by a sketch and specifications of the same for the sum of \$150,000 specie, the same was accepted, and that Mr. Steel proceed to build said bridge.

The petition of C. M. Dubois, Bishop of Galveston, in regard to removing back the wall of the Priest House, lately destroyed by fire to a given line by the corporation, asking as compensation for said removal the sum of 1,500 dollars, or that the same be submitted to the decision of freeholders, as the city charter directs, said petition was referred to the committee on Public Improvements, to investigate the matter and report immediately their action in the premises to His Honor the Mayor; if said committee do not recommend the payment of amount asked for, that case, His Honor the Mayor shall proceed as the city Charter directs in such cases.

The petition of E. Braden, as Chief of Fire Co. No. 1, that the license on a Concert to be given on 15th April, inst., for the benefit of said Fire company, be remitted, petition granted.

The petition of E. Algett, Esq., and others, in regard to the obstruction of a branch ditch by S. S. Brown, in lower San Antonio, and praying to be allowed to build a new water gate, the same was referred to the Ditch Commissioner, to instruct the petitioners as to the building of a new water gate.

The petition of Owen Clark, to be placed on city paper list, was read. It was ordered by the City Council that said Clark be placed on paper list, and that he be allowed the sum of \$12 per month.

The petition of G. Bennek, Market watchman, that the boxes used by the butchers in their stalls, for tools, meat, etc., be removed, and that the chopping blocks of the same be set on legs, for the prevention of rats and filth, the same was referred to the committee on Petitions and Ordinances.

The petition of Frank Deltler to surrender soldier stand No. 22, the same to be rented and he be allowed to bid on same, was on motion, laid on the table, adopted.  
 The letter of approval of Miss Hathaway, regarding Miss Hewitt as an efficient and competent teacher for city schools, was read and filed; that Miss Hewitt be continued as such, and that she be paid at the monthly salary of \$75 per month, adopted.

The bid for the various public works was taken up.

The bid of C. Pernar, \$280 for building stone bridge over Alamo ditch, the continuation of Paso street, was accepted, the same being the lowest bid for said work.

The bid of C. Pernar, \$150 for removing and building again the wall on the lot of Messrs. Tynan, on a line with the abutment of the bridge, on Commerce street, the same being the lowest bid for said work, was accepted.

On motion, which was adopted, that the Ditch Commissioner be continued in office for one month longer, to assist the city Callender in collecting the amount that the city expended in cleaning and repairing the ditches.

The Board proceeded to elect a City Assessor for 1906, which the following was the result:  
 Golard, L. Vota; A. Kope, 3 votes, and G. Rossy, 4 votes; Mr. Rossy was declared elected City Assessor for 1906, and the compensation for said work fixed at 400 dollars in United States Currency.

The City Officers reports for the month of March, 1906, were presented and referred to the Finance committee.  
 The Finance committee reported on city officers reports for the month of February, 1906, said reports found to be correct; also recommended the payment of several bills; Finance committee report, adopted.
