#### REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The National Republican Party of the United States, assembled in Nat onal Convention in the city of Chicago, on the 20th day of May, 1868, made the following decleration of principles:

First. We congratu'ate the country on the assured success of the reconstruction projects of Congress, as evisced by the adoption in a majority of the States lately adoption; in a majority of the States lately in rebellion, of constitutions securing, equal civil and political rights to all, and repard it as the duty of the government to mustain their lustitutions and to prevent the people of such States from being remitted to a state of anarchy.

SECOND. The guarantee of Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men of the South, was demanded by avery consideration of public safety, of gratitude and of justice, and must be maintained, while the question of suffrage in all the loyal States, proporty belong to the people of there States.

Three bundred recruits for the 4th, Cavalry arrived in Galveston yesterday.

form and selecting men to represent our principles for the next few years. Without a thorough organization, fraud/deception, and intimidation will be practiced upon the ignorant masses, and many men will ride into office on Republican votes who will continue to preach old fogy, stereofy ped democratic ideas for the uext four years to come. We know that it is a great punishment to our Democratic neighbors to be kept out of effice for the next four to him years. 
