**Jacob Thompson.**  
Jacob Thompson, the famous Mississippi rebel, returned recently to his old home at Oxford, Mississippi. He was received by a large concourse of his old neighbors, and was addressed by Colonel Leaton in their behalf. From General Thompson's speech in reply, we extract the following choice bits:  
But here you ask me, and very pertinently, why I have not returned among you earlier. That question, you at once perceive, leads me into the field of politics, into a sphere of the action of the Government and the conduct of its officials. Hence I am in the condition of an unfortunate Irishman, who was a sailor on board of a ship at sea, and the captain ordered him ashore to arrange some part of the rigging. After reaching a considerable height on the mainmast, his hold gave way, and down he came on deck with a heavy crash. The captain, frightened, ran to him and in sympathetic tones said, "Patrick, are you dead?" "No," said Pat, "I am not dead, but I am speechless." In Pat's condition, I had myself at this time in regard to politics and the management of the Government for the last 30 years.—I am speechless.

**Republican Platform.**  
The Republican party of Bexar county, assembled in Mass-meeting, in the city of San Antonio, on Wednesday, May 23, 1869, made the following declaration of principles:  
Whereas, Unity upon political questions is indispensably necessary among those who are loyal to the Government and the cause of the Reconstruction laws, and the National Administration. Therefore, be it resolved:  
1st. That we, the Republicans of Bexar county, in Mass-meeting assembled, accept the National Chicago Platform, as modified by the 18th amendment, and will loyally support the principles therein announced.  
2nd. That we most emphatically disapprove any division in the Republican party, and we earnestly urge upon all true and loyal men to drop all party names, and previous differences, and unite in one man in the great work of reconstructing the State in conformity with the National will.  
3rd. That we recognize the holding of a State Convention at Houston, on the fourth Monday of May, and a Congressional Convention at Seguin, on the third Monday in May.  
4th. That we are opposed to self chosen candidates, or to those nominated by citizens in BEXAR county.  
5th. That we pledge ourselves to support the regular nominees of our State and District Conventions.  
6th. That the Secretary of this meeting is instructed to furnish a copy of the proceedings of this meeting to the loyal papers of this State.

## TEXAS ITEMS.

**NAVY CULTURE.**—In the upper counties of Virginia, as far as Norfolk and Annapolis, a curious incident has occurred which will take the place of tobacco in a large extent, the coming season. This is evidenced by the great demand for seed from that direction. The history of the plant culture is quite interesting, and indeed curious. It has grown up almost entirely since the war, and its present magnitude may be chiefly ascribed to the funds contributed for those units by the soldiers of both armies, who occupied by turns, the section of country in which they were cultivated. A demand for them immediately after the abandonment of the military, among us, and though the crop has greatly increased from year to year, the price has in no wise diminished. It has become the most profitable crop now grown in Eastern Virginia. A good deal depends on the soil and preparation, but in all light, gray lands, and with a liberal use of lime or manure, a crop of 500 bushels to the acre may be reasonably calculated on. The average price for the last year's crop cannot have been less than \$1.50 per bushel. So great has been the stimulus thus imparted, that persons in that vicinity are making preparations to plant from 40 to 100 acres each.

The police and gangsters of Bryan City had a slight "oppression" in which the latter were the victims, when the military came to the rescue and arrested a squad of them. Bryan, it is said, is becoming a hot bed for them and they purpose emigrating.

The News-Letter reports the crops not damaged by rains.  
Peter Kheel, an old citizen of Waco, and Theo. Johnston, a merchant of the same place, are dead.

The Waco bridge is being completed.  
Corn and wheat look well in Tarrant, Johnson and Hill counties.

Contracts for grading and tying the Waco Gap Railroad are made. That road will be built.

The European Mail says that emigration from Great Britain to the colonies was never more active than at present. But adds: There is a prevalent idea that our possessions may be relieved in this way; and that the colonies will be glad to receive the burden of our workhouses. Some time ago the Times had an article supporting this view, and the other day Lord thought brought the subject before the House of Lords. He thinks that the emigration of paupers should be facilitated, and suggests that Poor Law Boards and Colonial governments should "lay their heads together" to ship off as many able bodied paupers as possible. The colonies are not likely to benefit by the introduction of an idle, shiftless, and broken down set of people; and as Lord Granville pointed out, do not desire such immigrants as they would be sure to get under this system.

Texas is leading higher for this class than any other country: \$500,000 in State bonds and \$200,000 in land. The very next day after the steamer Kaffra, landed her first installment of commodities, three of them called on the British Consul at Galveston for the means to buy food. They were paupers.—Ovillon.

The San Antonio Herald describes Quick, of the Houston Union, as a little, portly fellow, who during the war pretended friendship for the Southern cause, now going round making speeches to the negroes.

It is due to the cause of truth to say the appointments made by Gen. Reynolds, of civil officers for Galveston county and city are, on the whole, entirely satisfactory to the great majority of the people. We do not believe they have been made in a partisan spirit, but in compliance with the requirements of the law of Congress, and with a view to the competency, integrity and qualifications of those selected to discharge the duties of the various offices.—Ovillon.

The time has come in the present of Texas, when there should be no depending on the part of our people. There are times when we should meet all our faults and sins in the way of striking the same. There is a good time coming, and we confidently believe that enterprise, industry and energy will establish headquarters in Texas. Our wide-spread and fertile prairie must give up the gay dress of flowers which decorate their broad acres, for the more profitable crops of corn, and fields of waving grain. The horseman's shout to his stock, must give way to the merry song of the plowman, which sends yoke in growing strength, impudently to cry: "Fellow men, spread your iron tracks, in commercial snows, bring the country from the fertile lands of Red River, to the unimproved valley of the far off Rio Grande. These things are in the path of speedy accomplishment, if engaged in with unflinching determination.

The McKinstry Inquirer says: The great market of Galia county is a railroad. The Delta of the Nile is not richer than our land, which yields in abundance, all the small grains, and our cotton crops are not exceeded in any of the Gulf States. Give us a railroad and money will become as plenty here as it was in Confederate days.

And the Waco Register says: "The right, and able."  
Calla county produces material, and if her people were Yankee men should have been built long ago. It is useless to be in a hurry about getting one, until your people determine to build one for themselves.—"Give us a Railroad," is the cry "all over the South. These are not "living times." Whenever it will pay Northern people to build our roads for us, they will do so, but not till then. Whenever it will pay them to build our roads, it will pay the landholder a good deal more to build them for themselves.

The Quitman Clarion says: There are a dozen steam and water-power saw mills in Wood county, all of them doing an active business, which, however, would be greatly increased by means of reconstruction. It estimates the cost for taking the general cotton crop of the county, 400 bales, to Marshall or Jefferson at 25 cents return freight, \$10,000 more. Look, too, at our broad forests of pine, our beautiful streams of water, clear as crystal, our inexhaustible beds of coal, and vast extent of rich, unutilized lands, waiting to be enhanced 100 per cent. in value by the screening of the iron-ore.

Wood is certainly a great county and deserves, and we hope may soon have a railroad.

**OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES,**  
Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.  
(Continued.)  
[PUBLISHED BY THE SENATE.]  
For salaries and expenses of collectors, assessors, assistant assessors, revenue agents, inspectors, and superintendents of exports and drawbacks, together with the expense of carrying into effect the various provisions of the several acts providing internal revenue, excepting items otherwise estimated for, eight million dollars; Provided, That the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall make a detailed report to Congress of the expenditure of this appropriation of the next December session, to whom paid, how much to each, and for what purpose; giving the item of each payment and the number of employees; and hereafter the said Commissioner shall estimate in detail, by collection districts, the expense of assessing and the expense of the collection of internal revenue.  
For detecting and bringing to trial and punishing persons guilty of violating the internal revenue laws, or conspiring at the same in cases where such expenses are not otherwise provided for by law, one hundred thousand dollars.  
For incidental and contingent expenses of the treasury department.—In the office of the Secretary of the Treasury and the several bureaus, including copying, labor, binding, sealing ships' registers, translating foreign languages, advertising, and extra check hire for preparing and collecting information to be laid before Congress, and for miscellaneous items, fifty thousand dollars.  
For stationery for the treasury department and the several bureaus, fifty thousand dollars.  
For the general purposes of the treasury department building, including the extension.—For compensation of twelve watchmen and eleven laborers of the building, thirteen thousand eight hundred dollars.  
For contingent expenses of the said building, and five other buildings, occupied by clerks of the treasury department, viz: for fuel, light, labor, and miscellaneous items, seventy-five thousand dollars.

**REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.**  
The National Republican Party of the United States, assembled in National Convention in the city of Chicago, on the 20th day of May, 1868, make the following declaration of principles:  
FIRST. We congratulate the country on the assured success of the reconstruction projects of Congress, as evinced by the passage of the Reconstruction Act, and the civil and political rights to all, and regard it as the duty of the government to sustain these institutions and to prevent the people of such States from being remitted to a state of anarchy.  
SECOND. The publication of Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men of the South was demanded by every consideration of public safety, of gratitude and of justice, and must be maintained, while the restoration of suffrage to the rebel States is properly belonging to the people of those States.  
THIRD. The Reconstruction Act, in its operation as a national crime, and national sin, requires the payment of the public indebtedness in the utmost good faith to all creditors at home or abroad, not only according to the letter but the spirit of the laws under which it was contracted.  
FOURTH. It is due to the labor of the nation, and to the honor of the nation, that the public debt should be extended over a fair period for redemption, and it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon, when it can be made to do so.  
FIFTH. That the best policy to diminish our burden of debt is to improve our credit, and to pay as we go, and to pay at lower rates than we now pay, and must continue to pay so long as repudiation, partial or total, open or covert, is threatened or suspected.  
SIXTH. The Government of the United States should be administered with the strictest economy, and the expenditures which have been so shamefully abused and fattened by Andrew Johnson, call loudly for a Radical reform.  
SEVENTH. The doctrine of Great Britain and other European powers, that because a man is once a subject he is always so, must be rejected at every hazard by the United States as a relic of the feudal times, not authorized by the laws of nations, and at war with our national honor and independence. Native-born citizens are entitled to be protected in all their rights of citizenship as though they were native born, and no citizen of the United States shall be disfranchised, must be liable to arrest and imprisonment by any former owner for any cause which would not be sufficient to justify the Government to interfere in his behalf.  
EIGHTH. Of all who were faithful in the trials of the late war, those were none but those who more especially honor than the heroes and soldiers who endured the hardships of campaign and cruise, and imperiled their lives in the service of their country. The bounties and pensions provided by law for those brave defenders of the nation, are obligations never to be forgotten. The widows and orphans of the fallen dead are the wards of the people, and every legal right should be maintained in their protection.  
NINTH. Foreign immigration, which has done so much to enrich the country, and to develop the resources, and the increase of power in this nation, should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy.  
TENTH. This Convention declares its sympathy with all oppressed people, who are struggling for their rights.  
On motion of General Carl Schurz, the following additional resolutions were unanimously adopted as part of the Republican platform:  
Resolved, That we highly commend the spirit of magnanimity and forbearance with which the men who have served in the rebellion, but now frankly and honestly cooperate with us in restoring the peace of the country and reconstructing the Southern States governments upon the basis of impartial justice and equal rights, are received back into the communion of the loyal people; and we favor the removal of the disabilities imposed upon the rebels in the same measure as their spirit of loyalty will direct, and as may be consistent with the safety of the loyal people.  
Resolved, That we recognize the great principles laid down in the immortal Declaration of Independence, and the Constitution of the United States, and we will stand by them with gladness every effort toward making these principles a living reality on every inch of American soil.
