We give entire, this morning, notwithstanding its great length, the speech of Señor Castelar in the Spanish Congress. This event, like a monument, marks the beginning of a new era for Spain. It makes impossible the continued supremacy of that fierce ecclesiasticism, which has for four centuries desolated the peninsula.

It is true that the Express editor is a mild mannered man, and never deals in "epithets" or "slang," except where they serve his purpose, as for instance, it charges, that the Telegraph is the Central Railroad organ, and would fasten the positions of the Telegraph under former proprietors and editor, upon the present owner and editors.—Houston Telegraph.

The Telegraph is no chicken. It knows how to wear the look of lofty indignation, or injured innocence, when anything unpleasant in its history is unveiled, but if it is altogether too shrewd to deny facts, a fact denied, might be substantiated by proof, and that would be an awkward position, even for so old and artful a "soldier" as the Telegraph.

That's right, friend Webb, stick to your well worn role of "conscious innocence," and don't deny that you are the organ of the Central Railroad.

Railroad Talk.
Dollars, not wind, will build a railroad. Wind may be a good thing, with which to fan the flames of human pride, ambition and enterprise; but dollars alone will buy the iron, haul the ties, and grade the road. If wind could have built a railroad, the San Antonio and Mexican Gulf road would have been three times worn out by this time. The amount of printing and blowing done by one paper alone, if paid for at full rates, would easily lay down ten miles of track. We mean, of course, the San Antonio Herald. No trade-wind ever blew more steadily or longer in one direction, than has the Herald—its rising and setting thought, day in and day out, through good and through evil report, has been the San Antonio and Mexican Gulf Railroad. But, as we said, wind alone can not build railroads; and more is the pity.

The San Antonio and Mexican Gulf railroad wind, after blowing for years, has suddenly been converted into one huge blast. It looks like blowing the daylight out of the long cherished enterprise. It looks to us like the last gasp, the last struggle of the dying steed. It sounds like the last words of the statesman, Webster, who said, "I yet live," and then sank to his pillow in death. San Antonio offers to take \$300,000 stock in the first road, coming within thirty miles of that place. The wise men do not propose to subscribe \$300,000 to help get the road to a point, where nothing could stop it; but they propose to take stock only after the victory has been achieved. They propose to come in at the eleventh hour for their talent. They propose to come in for a share of the spoils. They propose to come in at a time when the earnings of a road would extend it to any required distance. Good for San Antonio.—Victoria Advocate.

Dr. A. R. Fischelbach, in his "Vollstaendige Geschichte," says: "We know of cases in Lithuania

with \$15 annual rings, and a circumference of 82 feet; of oaks in the Polish forests in which one can count 710 perfect rings, and whose stems measured 49 feet round. There are elms whose age is known to be above 350 years, ivy 440, maples 516, larch 570, oranges 640, planes 720, cedars 800, walnut 900, fimes 1,000, pines 1,200, oaks 1,400, olives 2,000. From these numerous examples of extreme old age, one may almost conclude that (provided the seed from which they spring be sound, the soil and climate favorable, and the means of nourishment abundant,) the existence of many plants may be extended to an indefinite period, should they be fortunate enough to escape accidents from without."

The Brakeman on the Pacific Railroad.

It will not be long before the voice of the future brakeman, day after day, on the Continental journey will shout to sleepy passengers:

"Chicago. Change cars for New Orleans, and for Lake Superior."

"Missouri river. Change cars for Saskatchewan, Kansas city, and Lake Superior."

"Rocky Mountains. Change cars for Santa Fe, El Paso, Matamoros, City of Mexico, and all Points on the Northern and Southern Pacific railroads."

"Great Salt Lake—twenty minutes for dinner. Change cars for Fort Benton, British Columbia, Big Cañon of the Colorado, Panama, Lima and Valparaiso."

"Sierra Nevada. Change cars for Owyhee, Columbia river, Puget Sound, Sitka, and Kamschatka."

"San Francisco. Passengers for New Zealand, Honolulu, Melbourne, Yokohama, Hong Kong, and all other points in Asia, Africa and Europe, will keep their seats, till landed on the wharf of the daily line of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company. Baggage checked through to Peking, Calcutta, Grand Cairo, Constantinople, St. Petersburg, Paris, and Liverpool.—Exchange.

PARAGRAPHS.

We do not anticipate any war between this country and any other, just at present, for two reasons. We don't want to fight them, and they don't want to fight us. England, for example, is not in position to fight anybody; Spain, under the new regime, has enough to do at home; France is looking across the Rhine; Russia is our fast friend. And, as for ourselves, this nation has reason to welcome peace, and to look forward with gladness to the reorganization of its industry and commerce, and the restoration of its finances, and the development of its resources. Probably we can stand a war to day better than any other civilized nation, but we shall be still stronger relatively with every year that passes. Wherefore, let us possess our souls in patience. Ripe pears will drop with very little shaking! And pears not ripe are not the best to eat.

The South has some sense left, and has gained a pretty fair appreciation of the creature known among men as a "Northern Democrat." Hear the Pittsburg Index, long time one of the most bliviant of Southern anti-reconstructionists:

The glorious Democracy of the North! The forgers and divisors of our chains. The hounders on of a brave people to destruction. The heroic proxymartyrs who bear with such noble equanimity and patient endurance, the suffering of their Southern brethren. The men who, safe in the rear, beset the poor devils in Virginia, Texas and Mississippi to keep up the fire, until a reaction gives them the spoils. Oh, they are a chivalric, glorious set! Their advice has always been high sounding and has always led to fair results. By all means let their counsels guide us for the future.

We commend this pleasing home hound to the papers which are so fond of telling "the people" of the South to "maintain their honor!"

A French gentleman of wealth and character, whose business has called him through the South a number of times during the last twelve or fifteen years, has just returned here from one of those trips. He says he never before saw such evidence of material prosperity as on this occasion. He notes that persons are now for the first time allowed a fair degree of freedom in the expression of opinion, and that there is more safety for life and property than ever before.

It is a curious fact that fifteen diamonds, each weighing one carat, can be bought for \$1500, while one diamond weighing fifteen carats, is rated at \$12,000 to \$15,000.

One excellent result of our early and friendly relations with China and Japan is, that an American Company has been the first to secure the privilege of establishing a telegraphic line from the Pacific seaboard to the ports of those countries.

Washington, D. C., May 22.—The President stated to Judge Paschal, who called in behalf of Governor Pease, of Texas, that the time for holding the election in Texas and Mississippi would not be decided until after the election in Virginia. He thought the best time would be between the laying by of crops and commencement of picking season. Paschal suggested the first Monday in August had always been election day in Texas. The President said he should direct General Reynolds to proceed with his work, and would consider after the Virginia election. He said he had mentioned the first Monday in November to Major Moore, but would probably suggest an earlier day. The President has been informed by gentlemen, upon whom he had much reliance, that divisions in the Union party would be healed, and he hoped so.

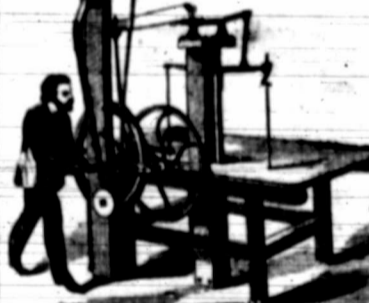

OUR telegraphic dispatches show a financial movement in the right direction on the part of our Secretary of the Treasury. Instead of launching a million of gold upon the market every now and then, to cause speculation and aid in the formation of rings, he has given orders to the Assistant Secretary, Van Dyck, of York, to buy government bonds to the amount of one million-dollars per week. This will assist very largely in appreciating their value. It will tend to cause a rise in Europe, while at the same time it will throw a constant stream of gold upon the market at regular intervals. This will therefore work to the advantage of the country in two ways—first, a steady supply of gold, which must prevent the great fluctuations attendant upon a spasmodic supply; second, a constant withdrawal of a certain amount of gold from the market.

A MOVEMENT is organizing in Texas to ship to the North a large number of negroes who desire a change of climate and labor.—New York Herald. The editor of the Herald has been badly imposed upon. No such movement is either organizing or possible. The news must have originated in the Freedman's Bureau at Washington.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The National Republican Party of the United States, assembled in National Convention in the city of Chicago, on the 20th day of May, 1868, made the following declaration of principles:

First. We congratulate the country on the assured success of the reconstruction projects of Congress, as evinced by the adoption, in a majority of the States lately in rebellion, of constitutions securing equal civil and political rights to all, and regard it as the duty of the government to sustain their institutions and to prevent the people of such States from being remitted to a state of anarchy.

Second. The guarantee of Congress of equal suffrage to all loyal men of the South, was demanded by every consideration of public safety, of gratitude and of justice, and must be maintained, while the question of suffrage in all the loyal States, properly belong to the people of those States.

Third. We denounce all forms of retaliation as a national crime, and national honor requires the payment of the public indebtedness in the utmost good faith to all creditors at home or abroad, not only according to the letter, but the spirit of the laws under which it was contracted.

Fourth. It is one of the labor of the nation, that taxation should be equalized, and reduced as rapidly as the national faith will permit.

Fifth. The national debt, contracted as it has been for the preservation of the Union for all time to come, should be extended over a fair period for redemption, and it is the duty of Congress to reduce the rate of interest thereon whenever it can possibly be done.

Sixth. That the best policy to diminish our burden of debt is to seek to loan us money at lower rates than we now pay, and must continue to pay as long as repudiation, partial or total, open or covert, is threatened or attempted.

Seventh. The Government of the United States should be administered with the strictest economy, and the corruptions which have been so shamefully nursed and fostered by Andrew Johnson, call loudly for a Radical reform.

Eighth. The doctrine of Great Britain and other European powers, that because a man is once a subject he is always so, must be rejected at every hazard by the United States, as a relic of the feudal times, not authorized by the laws of nations, and at war with our national honor and independence. Naturalized citizens are entitled to be protected in all their rights of citizenship as though they were native born, and no citizen of the United States native or naturalized, must be liable to arrest and imprisonment by any foreign power for acts done or words spoken in this country, and if so arrested and imprisoned, it is the duty of the Government to interfere in his behalf.

Ninth. Of all who were faithful in the trials of the late war, there were none entitled to more especial honor than the brave soldiers and seamen who endured the hardships of campaign and cruise, and imperiled their lives in the service of their country. The bounties and pensions provided by law for those brave defenders of the nation, are obligations never to be forgotten. The widows and orphans of the gallant dead are the wards of the people, a sacred legacy bequeathed to the nation's protecting care.

Tenth. Foreign immigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth and development of the resources, and the increase of power in this nation, "the saviors of the oppressed of all nations," should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy.

Eleventh. This Convention declares its sympathy with all oppressed people, who are struggling for their rights.

On motion of General Carl Schurz, the following additional resolutions were unanimously adopted as part of the Republican platform:

Resolved, That we highly commend the spirit of magnanimity and forbearance with which the men who have served in the rebellion, but now frankly and honestly cooperate with us in restoring the peace of the country and reconstructing the Southern States governments upon the basis of impartial justice and equal rights, are received back into the communion of the loyal people; and we favor the removal of the disqualifications imposed upon the rebels in the same measure as their spirit of loyalty will direct, and as may be consistent with the safety of the loyal people.

Resolved, That we recognize the great principles laid down in the immortal Declaration of Independence, as the true foundation of Democratic Government, and we hail with gladness every effort toward making these principles a living reality on every inch of American soil.
