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to the voting place and deposited their ballots in the box with imposing solemnity. The observance of the previous week had disappeared entirely. Not a cheer, not even a cry of any sort uttered, and the order which reigned during these two days.

The Southern democrats have gained a complete victory. Paris has voted for the sovereignty of the people and against the personal power of the Emperor. The following figures show the result of the voting at Paris:

Opposition 23,015

In the departments, parliamentarily in the large towns, the opposition has likewise made great progress, although the majority still remains devoted to the Government.

The opening of the Chambers is fixed for June 23. This session will be preceded by a proclamation concerning the mission of the new Chambers.

The new legislative body will be called to complete the work already begun with a view to the establishment of a completely liberal constitution.

In the interim the Court is going to pass a few days at Fontainebleau. But it is said that this time no guests will be invited. The Emperor went west and has to prepare the basis of his new politics. Let us hope they will be preferable to his last.

A change in the ministry is spoken of. Prince Napoleon, the Emperor's cousin, would be President of the council without portfolio. The ministers would be personally responsible.

It is at all events certain that there will be changes, and the situation is decidedly altered by the number of votes given in this election in favor of a change of government.

But of all questions which has not for a moment ceased to trouble the public mind is the question of the foreign policy of the Government.

For some years the crowned heads of Europe have not ceased to repeat their assurance of peace in a solemnity of way. In all our hearts peace, why all these armaments, the enormous armies which are not intended to crush us? What need have we of an armed force of three millions of men, which can be under arms in the space of a week?

Another curious piece of news comes from Mexico and which cannot be any thing but a joke.

Madrid according to this account, has had a hand in the French elections. He has even been able to tempt several agents of the secret police, and has worked actively in favor of the democratic party. However, Mr. Humeau, according to the same account, has made a secret treaty with the Emperor's family, according to which the Comte de Paris would be King of France, and the Duke of Montpensier King of Spain, and the Duke of Anjou King of Portugal. Decidedly Comon was well chosen to publish such a piece of news. The Messenger in Mexico mentions it also.

There is something more likely, but which we give without vouching for its truth. There is a rumor that the crown of Spain has just been offered to Prince Alphonse, brother of the King of Portugal. It is said that this new candidate to the Spanish throne is betrothed to the daughter of the Duke of Montpensier.

On another point, it would appear that the chiefs of the Nihilists, a party that supports the cause of the Prince of the Asturias, have advised the generals Comon and Comon to induce the Emperor to abdicate in favor of his son, for that this step is indispensable to the success of the young Prince as a candidate to the throne.

TEXAS ITEMS.
In compliance with general orders from the Fifth Military District, a rigid quarantine has been established for the Bay of Matagorda and vicinity, and went into effect on the 18th inst. Dr. F. E. Hughes is the appointed quarantine surgeon.

Several new leaf packeries are being opened below the bay. The Indiana Leaf Packing Company, at Lumberton, in which our corresponding merchants, B. Ferguson & Co., are connected, is a building sixty by eighty feet, with a cellar thirty by sixty, nine feet deep. This establishment is engaged in packing and rendering leaves extensively.—Indianapolis Bulletin.
