Platform of the Republican party of Texas.

Resolved, 1st. That the Republican party of Texas hereby accept the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully maintain the same in word and spirit.

2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of these amendments.

3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, where not modified by the proposed 14th amendment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republicans of Texas especially commend the spirit of the additional resolution adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz; and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as served in the late rebellion, but who now frankly and honestly seek the peace, and re-constructing the Union of the country, on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.

4. That the payment of the debt incurred in preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will condemn all attempts to evade in any manner, the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creators of the same.

5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of internal improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in Convention herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term " Carpet-bagger," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.

6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main object of Constitutional Government viz: The equal, civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.

7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore urge the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, is the result of an insidious design of the enemy purporting the practical surrender of the State to the rebels.

8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express unqualified confidence in the administration, ability, and integrity of the honorable head of our Government—President Grant, and in the patriotism and wisdom of the members of Congress.

P. W. Hall, of Robinson, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in ferreting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Gen. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.

Johnson Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and be known as resolution No. 9:

Resolved, That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

AMERICAN NEWS.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Five negroes qualified as grand jurors, and Judge Fisher appointed a negro bailiff.

OFFICIAL LAWS

UNITED STATES,

Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.

(Continued.)

GOVERNMENT IN THE TERRITORIES.

DAKOTA.

For amount required to pay the increased salaries to the judges of the Territory of Dakota, authorized by act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, two thousand hundred dollars.

For amount required to pay increased salaries to the judges of the Territory of Idaho, authorized by act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, three thousand dollars.

For refunding to the appropriation for the legislative expenses of Idaho Territory, the amount advanced from this fund and not accounted for by the secretary of said Territory, thirty-eight thousand dollars.

MONTANA.

For amount required to pay increased salaries of the judges authorized by the act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For amount required to pay outstanding liabilities on account of compensation and mileage of members of the legislative assembly, officers, clerks, and contingent expenses of the assembly, twenty thousand dollars: Provided, That from and after the thirtieth June next the salaries of the judges of Utah Territory shall be the same as now paid to judges in Idaho and Montana Territories.

WYOMING.

For expenses of the Territory from January first, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, namely:

For Governor, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For chief justice and two associate justices, at two thousand five hundred dollars each, three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars: Provided, That the compensation of the said officers of the said Territory of Wyoming shall not commence until they have been commissioned and qualified.

For secretary, nine hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses of the Territory, two hundred dollars.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE.

For blank books, stationery, book-cases, arms of the United States, seals, pens, bags, postages, and miscellaneous expenses of the consuls of the United States, including loss by exchange, fifteen thousand dollars.

TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

For Stationery, furniture, fixtures, and repairs, two thousand dollars.

For rent, fuel, alterations, watchmen, and laborers, twelve thousand dollars.

For salary of solicitor and judge advocate of the navy department, from March fourth to July first, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, eleven hundred and sixty-seven dollars.

For the continuation of the work on the United States court-house and post office at Madison, Wisconsin, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For the construction of basin and new dock large office at New York, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For the construction of a public building at Springfield, Illinois, for a court-house and post office, and the accommodation of officers of the United States, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For construction of appraisers' stores at Philadelphia, thirty-seven thousand five hundred dollars.

For the continuation of the work on the public building at Cairo, Illinois, to be used for a post office, custom house, and United States court-room, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For the construction of custom house at Saint Paul, Minnesota, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For construction of custom house at Ogdenburg, New York, twelve thousand five hundred dollars.

For continuing the work on the marine hospital at Chicago, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For repairs of custom house at San Francisco, seven thousand five hundred dollars.

PATENT OFFICE BUILDING.

For casual repairs of the patent office building, five thousand dollars.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

For compensation of the superintendent of foreign mails from August first, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, two thousand seven hundred and forty-seven dollars and twenty-eight cents.

For compensation to the superintendent of the money order system from July twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, four hundred and sixty-four dollars and sixty-seven cents.

For compensation of chief division of the dead letter office from August first, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, two thousand two hundred and eighty-nine dollars and forty cents.

For compensation of one clerk of class four, and two clerks of class three, from August first, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, four thousand five hundred and seventy-eight dollars and eighty-one cents.

For amount required to meet a deficiency in the revenues of the post office department for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, seven hundred and forty-one thousand four hundred and sixty-six dollars and eighty-five cents.

Texas can supply it all at the cheapest figures, except perhaps, the flour.

AN ITEM.—An item passed our office yesterday (Wednesday) in the shape of a runaway horse and dray—the noble animal made very good time from the bridge to the square, notwithstanding the various obstacles encountered. Fortunately no damage done.

THE COMPLIMENTARY FAREWELL PARTY.—The complimentary farewell party to General Mason, comes off on Friday evening, the 25th inst., at the Menger Hotel. The general committee is composed of forty-five of our most prominent citizens.

STREETS.—The steady and copious rains of the past few days have been a severe trial in the way of muddy streets. Our usually dry climate of former years never produced the necessity of such care for the streets, and the town has grown into a place of over 12,000 inhabitants, without a proportionate growth of municipal improvements.

The present city authorities have done in keeping up the streets, and yet there seems to be no suggestion that the city make a loan of \$100,000, issuing bonds for the amount payable in twenty years, bearing interest at the rate of 7 per cent, payable semi-annually or annually.

The interest amounting to \$7,000 per annum, which could be paid by an additional tax on the people, out of the proceeds of the loan, and save the city the trouble of running the municipal machinery.

With this hundred thousand dollars, the improvements so much needed could be immediately made. Six main highways leading into and through the city, should be macadamized, so as to afford the traveling public a clean and comfortable egress and ingress.

This might cost about \$200,000, may be more; two or three new bridges are needed, which would cost about \$200,000. The river needs cleaning out, and some canaling done to prevent overflows, which would cost about \$200,000.

Twenty thousand dollars could be profitably spent upon our streets and irrigating privileges, leaving ten thousand dollars to spend in the way of ornamenting our squares and otherwise beautifying the city.

This money could be borrowed, and by the payment of a rent of \$7,000 per annum, could be set in circulation in our community. The improvements would enhance the value of all the real estate in the place, and more than produce the interest in the increased value of property.

It would be no burden to our people, and in twenty years the principal could be paid by San Antonio, a city of 100,000 inhabitants, without the slightest inconvenience, and we will immediately come into the enjoyment of good streets, shady squares, good bridges, etc.

Every city of any importance in the United States has found it necessary to pledge its credit in order to make public improvements, why not San Antonio? This suggestion has been made but never in any manner considered by the City Council, as our present condition under military rule prevents any great enterprise being undertaken, and besides before such a loan could be made the matter must be submitted to a vote of the people for their consent, and it seems useless to urge such an undertaking until an administration is placed firmly in place, which would have the opportunity to carry out the whole program.

We will speak further of this matter.
