**Platform of the Republican party of Texas.**  
Resolved, 1st. That the Republican party of Texas hereby accept the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully maintain the same in word and spirit.  
2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of these amendments.  
3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, where not modified by the proposed 14th amendment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republicans of Texas especially commend the spirit of the additional resolution adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz; and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as served in the late rebellion, but who now frankly and honestly seek the peace, and re-constructing the Union Government on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.  
4. That the payment of the debt incurred in preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will condemn all attempts to evade in any manner, the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creators of the same.  
5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of internal improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in Convention herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term " Carpet-bagger," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.  
6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main object of Constitutional Government viz: The equal, civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.  
7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore urge the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, is the result of an insidious design of the enemy purposing the practical surrender of the State to the rebels.  
8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express unqualified confidence in the administration, ability, and integrity of the honorable head of our Government—President Grant, and in the patriotism and wisdom of the members of Congress.  
P. W. Hall, of Robinson, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:  
Resolved, That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in ferreting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Gen. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.  
Johnson Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and be known as resolution No. 9:  
Resolved, That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

**OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES,**  
Passed at the Third Session of the Fortieth Congress.  
(Continued.)  
[PUBLIC-NO. 37.]  
GOVERNMENT IN THE TERRITORIES.  
DAKOTA.  
For amount required to pay the increased salaries to the judges of the Territory of Dakota, authorized by act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, two thousand hundred dollars.  
IDAHO.  
For amount required to pay increased salaries to the judges of the Territory of Idaho, authorized by act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, three thousand dollars.  
For refunding to the appropriation for the legislative expenses of Idaho Territory, the amount advanced from this fund and not accounted for by the secretary of said Territory, thirty-eight thousand dollars.  
MONTANA.  
For amount required to pay increased salaries to the judges of the Territory of Montana, authorized by act of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, two thousand five hundred dollars.  
For amount required to pay outstanding liabilities on account of compensation and mileage of members of the legislative assembly, officers, clerks, and contingent expenses of the assembly, twenty thousand dollars: Provided, That from and after the thirtieth June next the salaries of the judges of Utah Territory shall be the same as now paid to judges in Idaho and Montana Territories.  
WYOMING.  
For expenses of the Territory from January first, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, namely:  
For Governor, one thousand five hundred dollars.  
For chief justice and two associate justices, at two thousand five hundred dollars each, three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars: Provided, That the compensation of the said officers of the said Territory of Wyoming shall not commence until they have been commissioned and qualified.  
For secretary, nine hundred dollars.  
For contingent expenses of the Territory, five hundred dollars.

Our Candidates.

After the adoption of a platform, in which was suppressed all that was likely to cause a difference of opinion among Republicans, the recent Republican State Convention proceeded to the solemn and important duty of nominating a State ticket. This duty, so far as the position of Governor was concerned, was not difficult, as General Davis was the choice of every delegate; his nomination was not the result of manipulation or political trading; it was the spontaneous gush from the hearts of the loyal people of Texas, who turn to him in this hour of trial and danger as the man they can trust as their leader.

The other nominations were not so easily made, as there were no office-seekers at Houston. But finally, a ticket was made up, of gentlemen of known worth and tried Republicanism, and a provision made to supply any vacancy which might occur from death, resignation or otherwise.

General Davis, our candidate for Governor, is known so well to every man in Texas it is almost a needless task to speak in his behalf. A self-made man, who stands in the front of his profession as a lawyer, who has won by his faithful, honest course in his business relations, the just esteem of every man who has ever made his acquaintance. He is a man of wonderful evenness of temper, cool, calm and deliberate in his judgment, firm and unyielding in purpose. And there is not a streak of vindictiveness in his nature. In his manners he is polite and affable; in fact, he is a generous, wholehearted patriot, towards whom even a generous foe can not feel other than admiration and respect. Politically, he is the embodiment of the true Republican sentiment in this State. Regardless of his own popularity, he has espoused measures which, right in themselves, had been unnecessarily carried into the Republican party, like lighted torches; he has always labored to build up the loyal party upon a firm footing—he has never stood in the way of harmony, and when the political storm was lashed into a fury by demagogues who envied the high standing of General Davis, he stood calm and firm, maintaining what he conceived to be right. Bargains and trades have been offered him, he never forgot the integrity of his party or his own self-respect enough to entertain them. At last he stands forth the unanimous choice of the Republican party for Governor, an untried, an untroubled, but one he deems it his duty to accept.

In the late rebellion he guided on his sword and went to the front to fight for the preservation of the government.—He won honorable distinction, and the loyal people of Texas owe him a double debt of gratitude for having saved their country, and aided in restoring to them the freedom of the old flag, from the grasp of the Red Rover his name is cherished at the bedside of every Texan, and in Washington, he is recognized as the fittest representative of loyalty in this State. And no true loyal man can refuse to vote for him for Governor.

Col. J. W. Flanagan, our candidate for Lieut. Governor, is an old Texas, —for twenty years a member of the Texas Legislature, an able lawyer, a consistent Union man during the rebellion, and at present a good Republican; he is a lawyer of fine abilities, and in habits a temperate virtuous man,—a man of wealth and great political influence in the popular opinion in which he resides, making him a tower of strength to the ticket. Judge Carter, for Comptroller is an old resident of Texas, and hails from the northern section of the State, as a member of the Reconstruction Convention he won the respect of all,—a man of fine education, splendid address, and stainless character, and a staunch Republican; he will carry the north. Mr. Jacob Kuechler, our candidate for Commissioner of the Land Office, is well known in Western Texas as an honorable representative of that large and intelligent body of our citizens who have made their homes in Texas and to whom is due the credit of our best reputation as a State. In this passing notice we will not attempt to forestall a future sketch of this excellent man and patriot,—a graduate from the classic schools of Prussia,—he was among the first to pioneer our frontier—in the heroic commander of the Union men at the Nueces massacre his name will live in history,—a profound thinker—a practical engineer and surveyor, and a genial, wholehearted gentleman, are among the qualities he brings to our State ticket as one of its standard bearers.

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The position of Treasurer is vacant. Mr. Price, who was nominated has declined for private reasons. This important position will be duly filled by some competent staunch Republican. Our ticket represents fairly, every section of the State; it was chosen with a view to set's all former differences in the party, and like the platform, represents a united, harmonized, powerful, and we feel confident, to be victorious political party, which offers in its victory speedy restoration of our State to the American Union, and peace to our people.

A Slight Mistake. The New York Merchantile Journal of the 10th inst. in an interesting article on Cattle Raising speaks thus of Texas: Texas was for years a great cattle producing State, but the war and the cattle plague, decimated her herds, and she is now slowly making up for the losses thus sustained. The vast range of pasture lands in all parts of Texas affords a very sweet and stimulating herbage, and the cattle raised in that section thrive wonderfully, and can be reared with but little trouble or expense. In Texas the winters are short, the climate mild, the air is very pure, water is abundant, and nature has thus made bountiful provision for the sustenance of all animals of the bovine species. The mistake is we have never known such a thing as the cattle plague in Texas and notwithstanding the war we have more cattle running loose on our prairies than we ever had before, only help us to get our beef to market. Mr. Journal and we will do a great deal towards lessening your complaint that the supply of beef in the United States is far from being sufficient for the actual requirement of our own people.

Mr. FRANKLIN, a newspaper reporter in a reported interview with the great philanthropist says: Mr. Prebode proceeded to state that he had given money, \$7,000,000. He first made his family rich, by coming in the number thereof \$1,000,000. His gift to the Freedmen's Institute in Baltimore, was \$1,000,000. He presented something like \$1,000,000 to the University of Harvard and Yale, and to institutions in Sydney, London and elsewhere. He presented \$2,000,000 to aid the cause of education in the South—\$1,000,000 in cash and \$1,000,000 of Mississippi oil per cent bonds, which, said Mr. Prebode, "will ultimately be good."

It is evident enough that the enormously wealthy dispenser of millions who sat there on the sofa is far down the decline of life. Yet many years ago he was in the full vigor of his manhood, and he was a robust constitution.

In Savannah we were shown about the city by a "native Georgian," who took great pains to show us where the Union troops burned whole quarters of the city, but who, nevertheless, was like every rebel soldier we have met, genial, kind and hospitable, having nothing to say that could detract from the position of "a man he had met in the field." Here let us say that wherever we have been abroad and earned as a Yankee, we have always found that the party was a "blacker on" in the rebellion, while those who treated us as best were soldiers who "honorably surrendered."—Civ. Boston Traveller.

HERE is the way the ladies propose to revolutionize matters when they get the ballot. Ralph Waldo Emerson, in his recent address before the Woman's Suffrage Convention in Boston, says: If the vote is to be granted to women, and certainly it must be, then we must arrange to have the voting clean and honest and polite. The State must build houses, instead of dirty rooms and corner shops; the State must build palaces and halls, in which women can deposit their vote in the presence of their sons and brothers and fathers. The effect of that reform upon the general voting of the State all can feel. If the honest opponents of female suffrage could be made to believe that this proposed reform could be successfully brought about, we are inclined to think that one of the strongest objections in their minds to allowing women the privilege of the ballot would be removed.

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A NATIONAL Christian convention of persons opposed to Masonic and other secret organizations has been in session at Chicago during the past week. The following resolutions, in addition to some pledging support to the Synagogue, the newspaper organ of the association, were adopted, their matter being: WHEREAS, Secret societies are, in their organization and operations, most manifestly unchristian and, in their very nature of secrecy, in direct opposition to the religion of Christ and hostile to the peace and welfare of the Church of Christ; and WHEREAS, True Christians are bound to keep their garments clean from admittance of every kind, to accept no fellowship between light and darkness, Christ and Belial, righteousness and unrighteousness; therefore,

Resolved, That in the judgment of this convention it is the duty of all branches of the Christian Church to free themselves from all fellowship with these unchristian works of darkness. HERE, Schmitt, a Prussian gentleman, for ten years past resident in the Northern Principality of Japan, has arrived in San Francisco with three Japanese families. These families are the precursors of forty Japanese families now on the way for our port, and of a further accession of eighty families, making in all one hundred and twenty families, say, four hundred persons, who are coming here for permanent settlement. They are mostly silk cultivators and manufacturers; some are tea cultivators. They bring with them 20,000 trees of the *Morus Alba*, three years old. This is the most tender leaf of all the mulberries, and it makes the best silk in that country. They bring a great number of bamboo plants of the large variety, useful for a thousand purposes; they are twelve feet high and three years old. They bring also 5,000,000 of tea seeds. The seed of the tea plant is a small nut.

When the National Capital was revolutionized from its old and seemingly hopeless plight of Democracy, we were told on all hands that the Republican victory was won only because the Freedmen's Bureau gave out rations to hordes of worthless negroes for the sake of keeping them on hand to vote. The Freedmen's Bureau is now abolished. There is no longer what our opponents were pleased to call a Free Negro Banding House in Washington. Washington goes Republican because a majority of its inhabitants are honestly in sympathy with the spirit of the nation at large. They were so last year, and their opponents knew it, but found the Freedmen's Bureau a convenient pretext on which to load their defeat. This year the Freedmen have no Freedmen's Bureau to aid them, and to have been forced to make the most out of the circumstances which their own parsimony stirred up at two or three of the voting places. Even there, we are glad to see, were not nearly so bad as they were represented.—New York Tribune.
