The Hamilton Platform.

Jack Hamilton has attempted to run as a candidate for Governor without a party and without a platform. The action of the Republican State Convention has already begun to do its work, and Hamilton must have something to stand upon—some kind of a plank, board or log to hold on to, since the tide of Republicanism begins to swell in earnest, so the recent Democratic pow-wow at Houston, put forth the following as the Hamilton platform. We copy from the Houston Times:

A set of resolutions, which may be considered the Hamilton platform, were read by Col. Jas. H. Tracy. They gave the acceptance of the proposed constitution, etc., in the reconstruction acts of Congress, and express various and pluming party platitudes. These resolutions were submitted to the meeting in full and declined to be copied.

Resolved, That this meeting has assembled not for the purpose of constructing a platform of political principles, but to give expression to our determination, in an honest and sincere old fashioned Republicanism, and to this end, we will support the administration of Gen. U. S. Grant. We will accept, in good faith, and support the system of reconstruction demanded by the co-ordinate branches of the government. We pledge ourselves to the support of law and order in the State. We will vote for the adoption of the constitution submitted by the late Reconstruction State Convention of Texas. We are opposed to the formation of parties based upon race and color, and will use our best efforts to prevent the same unless driven to the sole alternative by adverse sentiments and action.

We will support, whenever they appear, honest, capable, and possess the qualifications required by law, believing that the Hon. J. J. Hamilton, who has announced himself as a candidate for Governor, possess those qualifications, we pledge him our support.

The first feature of this platform is that it does not speak in the name of the Republican party of the nation, but in the name of "old fashioned Republicanism," which means anything or nothing, just as you please, but mainly it does not mean the Republican party, and in the spirit of this "old fashioned Republicanism" they will support the ad administration of Gen. Grant, which means nothing but a miserable subterfuge.

The second feature of this platform is it does not endorse the Reconstruction Acts of Congress, but "will accept, in good faith, and will support the system of reconstruction demanded by the co-ordinate branches of the government." This is simply setting around the plain words "we endorse the reconstruction acts of Congress."

But the main political feature is the clause—"We are opposed to the formation of parties based upon race and color, and will use our best efforts to prevent the same, unless driven to the sole alternative by adverse sentiments and action." The plain English of this is, "opposition to the success of the Republican party," which depends upon the colored citizens for the bulk of its vote, and a threat that if Jack Hamilton and a colored legislature are not ready to succeed, the red cohort of Hamilton's name,

the party are to be displaced, to wit—"The White Man's Party."

The last clause endorses Jack Hamilton, who was present, made a speech, and placed himself squarely upon the platform furnished him by his own friends.

We now ask every man who claims to be a Republican in the State, to scan this platform and see if he can stand upon it. No endorsement of the Republican party or its platform in any shape—not a word about the 14th and 15th amendments—not a word about the national debt—not a syllable upon the vital interests of the State—in fact, nothing that issues peace or reconstruction. But it is the platform of the "third party solid out wing of the so-called Democratic party, now led by Jack Hamilton, drunk or sober, just as you please.

C. C. Gillespie and the Secret Circular.

The secret circular which is embodied in the address of the Republican State Convention, and which proves the conspiracy entered into by Jack Hamilton, to trade off the Republican party and secure himself the position of Governor, has been acknowledged by the infamous Gillespie as his production; we copy his letter making the acknowledgement, published in the Houston Times:

AS RECEIVED FROM A CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE.—"Friend, the correspondent of the Houston Times, writing from New Orleans, under date of 16th inst., reviews Jack Hamilton in a manner not only truthful, but scathing; in his conclusion he says:

"To an honest, well-balanced mind, the difference between E. J. Davis and A. J. Hamilton—the two rival Radical candidates for Governor, is just this: that while Davis' course excites hatred and revulsion, I am very much obliged to the Union, and other papers, for the patriotic government he has so nobly upheld and signed."

"It was a letter of counsel and consolation, from straightforward Democrats to straightforward Democrats, in view of the probable fact that no Democratic State Convention would be held, and was intended to bring about a sense of action. As is evident from the letter itself, it had nothing to do with the Republican party, nor to sympathize with either wing of it, whether Hamilton or Davis Republicans, and looked only to "the ultimate triumph of the Democratic party," after reconstruction—which hope was based upon the belief that reconstruction under the proposed Constitution, would once more give the State government under the control of its white citizens. I extract what follows:

"Gen. Hamilton knew nothing of that letter. It was written immediately after the issue of the Convention, before Gen. Hamilton left Austin, and we know nothing about Gen. Hamilton's sentiments, except that he had sincerely fought the dismemberment of the whites, and that he would run for Governor before 'the people' as a whole. Our object was to bring about a sense of action, in the support of Hamilton, as the best we could do under the circumstances, among the friends, and also to assist in the support of Dr. David Baker for Lieutenant Governor, as our choice among Republicans. We hope that the publication of the letter may help still more in the accomplishment of the ends had in view in writing and mailing it."

"Gen. Hamilton, ever honest of his beliefs, I am not aware of it. But I have the very best of reason for believing that Mr. Tracy knew all about it when it was written, and that he approved it, and was the author of it."

This is the whole conspiracy. Gillespie denies that Hamilton knew anything of the letter. Oh, no, it was simply a remarkable coincidence that Hamilton and David Baker should appear simultaneously at the head of Democratic sheets, and that Hamilton should refuse to be the candidate of the Republican party.

Gillespie's "best reasons for believing" that Mr. Tracy of the

Union knew all about it and approved of the circular, bears the strongest kind of an impress of a lie. Gillespie, the renegade preacher, who advocated in his speech at the San Jacinto celebration a few months since, the hanging of Union men with the grape vines that grew on the battle field, is Hamilton's right hand. Is there an honest Republican who will hesitate after such a disclosure of treachery on the part of Hamilton, to exert all his influence to give success to the Republican ticket headed by Gen. Davis?

Now a single Republican paper in the State has Hamilton's name for Governor.

The Houston Telegraph is silent, having had no paper writing for Hamilton at the most hand.


