Platform of the Republican party of Texas.

Resolved, that the Republican party of Texas heartily accepts the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully sustain the same in word and spirit.

2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 13th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of these amendments.

3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, which were modified by the proposed 13th amendment, are accepted by the Republican party of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republicans of Texas especially, commend the spirit of the additional resolutions adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz; and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as served in the late rebellion, but who now frankly and honestly cooperate with us in restoring the peace of the country, and reconstructing our State Government on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.

4. That the payment of the debt incurred in the preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will conduct all attempts to evade in any manner, the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creditors of the same.

5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of internal improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in Convention herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term "scrap-bagger," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.

6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main object of Constitutional Government viz: The equal, civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.

7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore warn the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, is the result of an insidious design of the enemy purposing the practical surrender of the State to the rebel.

8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express unqualified confidence in the administrative abilities, and integrity of the honor of Gen. D. Butterfield, President of Gen. and in the patriotism and wisdom of the majority in Congress.

P. W. Hall, of Robinson, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in ferreting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Gen. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.
Johnston Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and be known as resolution No. 9:
Resolved, That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

OLOZAGA, ex-Minister of Isabella, and one of the shrewdest politicians in the Cortes, announces his belief that the election of a king for Spain is at this time impossible. Serrano's Regency or virtual Presidency is therefore a forgone conclusion, and to this extent the Republicans of the kingdom have gained a march upon the Monarchists. The best chances for the crown still belong to the Duke who furnished the powder to blow up the late establishment of royalty, but even Montpensier's chances are not for a surety good. In the indecision of the Cortes as to a king, the Regency will present something like firm ground—a basis whereon to erect either the Monarchy or the Republic. It is to be seen whether the Regency will be more royal than republican; but so long as Spain remains without a king, we apprehend that the republic will be preferable in proportion as the regency is sufferable.

The McKinney Register had a conversation with Maj. John A. Buck, who had just returned from a trip to the Indian Agency, situated in that portion of Texas known as the Pan Handle. He reports about ten thousand Indians now upon the reservation, and all appear well contented save a party of Cheyennes, who took French leave a short time since.

TELEGRAPHIC

American News.

WASHINGTON, June 23.
Cuban affairs have never been the subject of consultation, though occasionally the theme of conversation in the cabinet. The present aspect of affairs is that official action is probable. The government has no information that the opposite forces in Cuba ever met in open field, but that the little fighting that has been done amounts to nothing more than skirmishes, and operations confined to a few inland points. In this view of the case no member of the cabinet has expressed any desire or hint at reorganizing belligerent rights to the Cubans. The Spanish government has been informed that while the government will enforce the neutrality laws, its people sympathize with the Cubans.

The Spanish Minister is placed in direct communication with attorneys and marksmen that he may furnish them information enabling them to enforce instructions issued a month ago, to intercept the sailing of hostile vessels. The recent arrests were made on information furnished through Spanish sources, and mainly attributable to open boasting of Cuba's success, and in taking men and arms.

There is no disagreement between Fish and Sumner regarding Motley's instructions. Gen. D. Butterfield has been appointed assistant treasury agent at New York.

Webb has been telling Fish that Brazilians have no more respect for the United States than for Hayti, and suggests that we thrash them.

MEMPHIS, June 23.—A meeting of the citizens of West Tennessee, North Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas has been called for July 15th, to consider the best means of securing Chinese immigration.

New York, June 23.—The steamship Arizona arrived to-day with \$1,230,000. The yellow fever is dreadful at Lames, Peru.

The small pox is raging at Chiriqui, and there has been a slight earthquake and a great storm at Valparaiso. The government buildings were damaged to the sum of one hundred thousand dollars.

The bark M. V. Hogg from Matanzas arrived to day with yellow fever on board. Two more of the Saratoga's crew have died.

NORFOLK, Va., June 23.—In an affray at Franklin, Va, a negro was mortally wounded by one Holland. The negro collected at midnight and attempted to fire Holland's house but was driven off.

A few hours later the negroes burned a saw mill and lumber yard of Nasty News. Loss \$25,000.

PHILADELPHIA, June 23.—The Republicans nominated Geary as first ballot.

European News.
LONDON, June 23.—A deputation representing the Lancashire cotton trade petitioned the government to aid in the India cotton culture.

PROCESO, June 23.—The authorities of Naples, Turin and Milan are adopting extraordinary precautions against tumults. It is feared the revolutionists are inciting disturbances. Several arrests have been made at Genoa.

BREMEN, June 23.—The Great Eastern is 170 miles out, working well.

LONDON, June 23.—Lord Shaftsbury introduced an amendment that the Irish Church property shall be a fund from which to grant loans to the Irish peasantry.

From Mexico.
WASHINGTON, June 23.
Later news from Mexico, dated City of Mexico, June 14, states that minister Nelson had arrived.

The authorities at Acapulco had a difficulty with the United States steamer Pomacocha. An order was served upon the Commander to the effect that she must not leave the harbor. Without paying attention to the order the Pomacocha sailed next day.

The troubles in Queretaro are increasing. The federal forces in Michoacan and Guanajuato are ordered to reinforce the Gosh at Queretaro, a march and was made. Much excitement over the elections. The Two Republics newspaper predicts that the government will carry this day.

OFFICIAL LAWS
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Third Session of
the Fortieth Congress.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

For amount required to meet an anticipated deficiency in the revenues of the post office department for the current fiscal year, three million seven hundred and sixty-two thousand five hundred dollars.

To supply deficiency in the appropriation for government building at the corner of F and Seventeenth streets, for fuel and compensation of firemen, for repairs, and for miscellaneous items, three thousand dollars.

To supply the deficiency in the appropriation for lighting the Capitol and President's house, and the public grounds around them, and around the executive offices, twelve thousand dollars.

For regular supplies of the quartermaster's department, two million five hundred thousand dollars.

For incidental expenses of the quartermaster's department, five hundred thousand dollars.

For horses for cavalry and artillery, one million five hundred thousand dollars.

For transportation of officers' baggage, one hundred thousand dollars.

For transportation of the army and its supplies, seven million dollars.

For barracks and quarters, one million dollars.

For medical and hospital department, fifty thousand dollars.

For contingencies of the army, four hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars.

For medical and hospital department, seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For necessary funds, one hundred thousand dollars: Provided, That the three last named sums are appropriated for the purpose of enabling the secretary of the treasury to settle accounts of disbursing officers for expenditures already made in pursuance of law, and shall not make any actual disbursement, but merely a transfer on the books of the treasury.

NAVY DEPARTMENT.
To supply a deficiency for provisions for the marine corps for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, forty-two thousand dollars.

Owing to the vigorous measures of the government kidnapping is on the decrease. The latest news from Queretaro says the federal party have displaced the State officers and are executing prisoners for treason.

The Taboquache, Mucche, Capote, Weemineke, Yampa, Grand River, and Uintah bands of the Indians, on the second of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, and in procuring the consent of the said Indians to the Senate amendment thereto, nine thousand two hundred and eighty-six dollars and seventy-seven cents.

SEALED PROPOSALS.

In duplicate, will be received at this office, until 12 M. Tuesday, July 9th, 1868, for the delivery at Camp, on Medicine Bluff Creek, near Fort Cobb, Indian Territory, and Camp on Arapahoe, Indian Territory, Northern Plains, for issues to Indians, as follows:

Camp on Medicine Bluff Creek, 4,000 head of BEEF CATTLE, on the hoof, 120,000 pounds of BACON, clear sides, 1,200,000 pounds of FLOUR, 1,200,000 pounds of SHELL CORN, 100,000 pounds SALT.

Camp on Arapahoe and Cheyenne Reservations. 1,400 head of BEEF CATTLE, on the hoof, 40,000 pounds of BACON, clear sides, 400,000 pounds of FLOUR, 400,000 pounds of CORN, 30,000 pounds of SALT.

Proposals may also be made for the delivery at Fort Harker, Kansas, of the total amount of Bacon, Flour, Corn and Salt required for the points named.

The Beef Cattle must be all steers, in good healthy condition and shall average at least one thousand pounds each live weight; the weight to be determined by weighing on scales. Their delivery must commence at each of the points named on or before August 20th, 1868, at the rate of 400 head per month, at camp on Medicine Bluff Creek, and 140 head per month at camp on Arapahoe and Cheyenne Reservations.

The beef cattle will be required to be kept by the contractor in the vicinity of the respective points named, and delivered monthly or weekly, as the Acting Commissaries may require. On the 20th day of October, 1868, half of the remainder of the whole amount due at that time to each post, must be in the vicinity of each post, and after that time the contractor will be required to put in the entire number of cattle due, or any part thereof, upon a thirty days' notice given him by such officer or agent as may be designated by the undersigned; provided that the contract or contracts for beef cattle shall not continue in force more than twelve months.

Should the undersigned determine that the contractor is not collecting cattle in the vicinity of each post designated, fact enough, or turning them in to the Acting Commissary of Subsistence as called for, he will purchase or cause to be purchased, beef cattle, as he may elect, at the expense of said contractor.

The beef contractor will have on hand at each post such quantity of feed for his cattle as the Acting Commissary of Subsistence may require. The articles of subsistence enumerated above will be subject to inspection at the point of delivery. The bacon must be sound and sweet; the flour must be equal to what is known here as superfine, the corn free from dirt, mold and unsound kernels, and the salt must be clean.

The delivery of these stores must commence on or before August 20th, 1868, and before which day each contractor must have delivered at least one-fourth of the amount due, or fees contracted for by him; August 20th he must have delivered two tenths; September 20th, four tenths; September 20th, five tenths; October 25th, 1868, eight tenths; and the remainder shall not be put in until such time as it may be required, but shall be delivered upon 60 days' notice being given the contractor by the undersigned; or his agent; provided that the contract or contracts for these articles shall not continue in force more than twelve months.

Proposals will be required for the delivery of any of the above articles, or for any portion of the amount required of any of the articles.
