OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Third Session of the Portieth Congress.

(Continued.)

(PUBLE-No. 43.)

An act granting the right of way to the Walla-Walla and Columbia River Rail-Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled;

Monse of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the right of way through the public lands be, and the same is hereby, granted to the Walla Walla and Colombia River Railfoad company, a corporation existing under the laws of the Torritory of Washington, and duly incorporated for the purpose of constructing a railroad from said rown of Walla-Walla to some eligible point on the navygobe waters of said Columbia river, in said Territory; said right of way hereby granted to said railroad is to the extent of one hundred feet in width on each side of said road where it may pass over the public lamis; also, all necessary ground, not to exceed five acres at each station, for station buildings, workshops, depots, machine shops, awitches, side-tracks, term-tables, and water stations.
