Jack Hamilton's Address to the People.

Over date of Austin, 29th of June, Jack Hamilton, the self-nominated candidate for Governor, issues an address "to the people of Texas."

The next point is his announcement that he is a Republican, in this wise: "It is known to you, fellow-citizens, that I am a Republican."

He next tries to explain his Democratic support upon the hypothesis that the Democrats see in him the essence of liberal reconstruction.

He next attempts to prove that he is the Republican party, and goes into a discussion of its tactics and makes a very untruthful statement of the question.

"Lawless men in large bands attend the political meetings held under the auspices of the Democratic clubs. The speakers indicate, by name, those elected for murder."

and a free press have never existed in Texas. The official report of lawlessness and crime, so far from being exaggerated, do not tell the whole truth.

Civil courts cannot punish outlaws. Military commissions must show that men can be punished in Texas for murder and kindred crimes. This will be the work of years.

In quoting this remarkable passage, and charging its authorship upon Gen. Davis, instead of giving the true author, Gen. Reynolds, Hamilton hopes to excite the fury of his Ku Klux friends against Gen. Davis.

His next point is to declare the recent Republican State Convention a "sham convention"—composed of "thirty-four (so-called) delegates." This part of the address is composed from the Houston Telegraph and the reports of other rebel papers.

In conclusion he says: "I do not seek the office of Governor for the sake of the office." But who will believe such a demagogue; he has not scrupled to misrepresent his opponent,—he does not hesitate to act the hypocrite.

General Hamilton is a National man. His utterances will be sought after as anxiously in Boston as in Galveston.—Austin Republican.

Yes, the Boston people may be very curious to hear from Jack in his new magnanimity role. On the 3rd December, 1866, A. J. Hamilton delivered an address on "Suffrage and Reconstruction," in Tremont Temple, Boston, in which occurs the following passage:

"The new catch word of universal amnesty and universal suffrage, is inconsequential, senseless and pernicious. How they are blended in principle or policy, or how they are to be conjointly achieved, and how they are to operate for the pacification of the country, its advocates have not made clear."

"I know of none who clamor for the blood of rebels; but I do know many who believe that unless all laws, human and divine, for the punishment of crime, are founded in error, the failure to make infamous, by proper punishment, such number of the leading rebels as would strike terror to others, and serve as an example, and a warning in all future time, is itself a crime."

INDIAN CAPTURE ANOTHER TRAIN ON THE FRONTIER.—OTHER DEPREDACTIONS.—We have just received from Mr. Mitchell, who recently left here for Fort Davis by the El Paso stage, dated Fort Concho the 29th of June, that reports have reached that point to the effect that four days before a train belonging to Messrs. Adams & Wicki was attacked, near Howard's Springs, and captured by the Indians. One teamster was killed, and 150 mules taken; the train was compelled to abandon the train. The station keeper at Fort station reports the Indians to have numbered two hundred. No other particulars given. Mr. Mitchell states that the stage was detained at the Concho by high water and unprecedented rains; also, that reports of Indian depredations came in from all quarters.

GLOOMY WEATHER.—One city has been visited with a terrific spell of wet weather. During the last forty-eight hours, the showers have been changed to steady rain, day and night. If the streets are deep, and in places they are deep, in fact, our city is a perfect sea of mud. Business almost still; very few have ventured out, and not a family or individual could be seen during all of Monday.

The builders on new buildings ceased their work, and the thoroughfares seemed deserted. Umbrellas, almost useless in such a storm, could be seen now and then waving along the slippery pavements, and a few carts, drays and hacks driven through the streets, were almost the only evidences of life. Every one exclaims, too much rain.

THE FOURTH.—The rain storm put a damper upon the programme for the celebration of the Fourth. The companies made some effort to get together, but the rain drove them to their homes. A salute was fired in the morning, at noon and at sundown. It being a very dry day to make a noise, the boys lighted a cannon hanging with pistols, gold and fire-crackers. In the evening, the company No. 1 gave a supper and dance at Bridon's Hotel, and a ball came off at the Casino. There was no disturbance of any kind that we hear of. At least our citizens had the good intention to properly celebrate the day, and were only prevented in coming out in their brightest colors by the inclemency of the weather.

CHIVALRY AT HIGH HILL.—TWO PEACEFUL CHIEFS.—A letter from High Hill, Fayette county, gives us the particulars of an affair which happened there on the 26th ult., showing that the chivalry is not dead yet. Mr. Osterman and troops were giving a performance, which was to be followed by a ball. The Germans of the place and vicinity were enjoying themselves in a peaceful manner, when half a dozen of the native chivalry rode up and took part, drinking heavily, and amusing themselves by stealing the bridles and ropes from the horses of the people who were witnessing the performance. Finally they mounted their horses and began to shoot off their pistols in order to frighten the peaceful Germans, some remonstrance took place, when these representatives of Southern Chivalry fired into the crowd, wounding severely two men, Mr. J. H. Loshan, an old man seventy-five years of age, receiving two shots in his back, and Mr. E. P. Schiller one shot in the shoulder. After delivering this murderous fire the ruffians rode off. Who will dare deny that profane peace reigns in Texas? We will state that the Germans were, as usual, unarmed, they had come together to enjoy themselves, not thinking of such a dastardly attack.


