Houston, June 15th, 1869.

A WRITER in the Herald of the 16th instant, contributes an article of a column and a half in length, commencing with "Messrs. editors" and ending without even a "non de plume." We suppose it is meant as a reply to our "Political Curiosities," but it is really nothing more or less than the complainings of a man who has "missed his calculation." As a fair sample of the entire production we give our readers the opening paragraph:

It is very trying to be forced to seek from the courtesy of our opponents, the opportunity denied us by those in whom we had trusted,—but "any part in a storm," and if through the treachery of the pilot, the good ship is no longer able to find a port of refuge, she must even seek the open roadstead, and weather the storm as best she may. Since the "Sir Oracle" as he assumes to be, of the Republicans of this section, has by a successful coup d'état driven from the organ of their party, the only gentleman, that from its first inception has held a responsible position in its management and at the same time commanded alike the esteem and confidence of his party and respect of his opponents; and has in his own person assumed its guidance and control, and thus effectively gagged the majority, who would gladly see peace and order restored, and the personal and sectional animosities of the past banished from the political arena; there is no resource but to accept your kindly offer of your columns, for the opinions of those who rendered uneasy and indignant by the situation, seek to utter their protest against the misrepresentation the party sustains at his hands.

He says "it is very trying to be forced to seek from the courtesy of our opponents, the opportunity denied us by those in whom we had trusted." If the writer is a supporter of the Republican party and its regular nominee, Gen. Davis, he certainly has no cause for this complaint; if he is a supporter of the Jack Hamilton Democratic alliance then he found his appropriate "port" in the columns of the Herald, which flies the Hamilton ticket, and is his ally, not his "opponent."

The writer calls himself "the good ship." We suppose he is a kind of nautical politician, and has boxed all points of the political compass and is now completely "at sea."

The rest of this nautical introduction shows that the writer is possessed of a good deal of bitterness, if not actual despair, and spoils any favorable impression his essay might have produced upon the public by declaring that the editor who recently controlled this paper was the "only gentleman" who has ever held a responsible position in its management. The community at large can judge of the correctness of this assertion. The Herald's writer, whoever he may be, seems to set down every man who does not agree with the Herald, in politics, as wanting in brains and in the attributes of a gentleman. We may be wrong, but we think this will hardly do. Better get in a good humor, and drop your personal flings before you address an intelligent, genteel community like ours, you will succeed a great deal better, however bad your cause may be.

## The Central Railroad Buys the New Orleans Railroad.

The recent purchase of the New Orleans railroad by W. R. Baker, President of the Central railroad, is causing considerable speculation among the public. This road is worth more than nothing. It owes the State \$650,000 for money borrowed from the School Fund, and it is said to be indebted to its bondholders about \$200,000, besides interest. Besides this, there is pending a law suit, the bondholders against the stockholders, to foreclose a mortgage and get possession of the road. The Houston Times may come pretty close to the milk in the cocoa nut in the following surmise:

"Mr. Baker probably spies a nice speculation. The New Orleans and Chattanooga Railroad Company is known by everybody to be in dead earnest about the construction of a road to Houston. There is no reason in the world why he may not shortly, if he can, fight clear of the bondholders, sell out to that company and pocket a hundred or two thousand dollars clear profit."

The Central railroad snuffs the coming of a dangerous rival for the railroad ascendancy in this State, and may be laying their plans to cripple or hinder the progress of the Chattanooga road. But we can say in advance, it is no use; it is bound to come, and there is not money enough in the Central railroad to stop it.

## How Political Capital is Manufactured.

As a sample of the way political capital is manufactured we give the following, which appears in the Washington Chronicle of July 1st: (Special Dispatch to the Chronicle.)

AUSTIN, June 30.—Provisional Governor E. M. Pease left this morning for Washington to consult with the President on Texas matter. Governor A. J. Hamilton is out in an address to the people defining his position as candidate for Governor. He takes strong Republican grounds, and all parties concede his election by a very large majority.

This is the way Austin announces the departure of its minister plenipotentiary, E. M. Pease, and actually sends a lie in advance to help him out. A blind man can see through such a trick.

Which is it?—The democrats must decide the question whether they are the tools of Jack Hamilton or whether Jack is their tool. He boasts of being a Republican; if he is a Republican, then he makes a tool of every democrat who votes for him, for a democrat must relinquish his party and forswear his faith in order to vote for a Republican. If he is not a Republican, but calls himself such for the sake of gaining Republican votes, then he is the tool of the Democrats. Which is it?

GREAT STORM ALL OVER THE LAND.—Our exchanges are full of accounts of storms and floods all over the United States; many of them very disastrous. In Illinois more rain has fallen than any year since '56, and so copious has been the supply that it has caused vegetation to rot in the ground and has seriously injured the corn crop.

What a humiliating spectacle it is to see some Conservative papers uniting with the Radicals in opposition to General Hamilton!—Houston Telegraph.

It is much more humiliating to manhood and political decency to see men, claiming to be Republicans, combining with such miserable political cheats as the Telegraph.

"DEMOCRATS VICTORIOUS."—This is the heading over the result of the Virginia election, and it will be the caption over the result of the Texas election, if Hamilton is elected. How do Republicans like it?

## TEXAS ITEMS.

A TRAVELLER through Texas, says one of the most discouraging features in the public status is the large number of all classes, and of both sexes, who are indulging in the crime of idleness. He says he fully as many in proportion to population of idlers among the whites, as among the colored population.—Houston Union.

THE Galveston Bulletin thus describes the new Railroad bridge over the Brazos at Richmond:

The bridge which was the cause of this glorification is one of Pink's Triangle Truss Bridge, a total length including approaches of 550 feet the actual length of the bridge proper is 499 feet. It is in three spans, that in the center being 248 feet, each of the other 125 feet 6 inches. It is supported by buttresses of concrete, each being 30 feet by 18 feet at the base, gradually diminish-

ing until at the top, they are 27 feet by 8. These buttresses are 46 feet above low water mark, so that the entire height of the bridge is 48 feet. The body of the structure is 16 feet wide, affording space for a track and carriage way. It is four feet higher than any water known. Its cost was \$150,000. The work was under the supervision of Mr. Geo. B. Nichols, assisted by D. J. Anderson Esq. It was built in one year, and would have required a much longer time but for the energy of the superintendents, and is the finest structure of the sort in the State, and is alike honorable to the mechanics and artisans, whose skill built it, and the banker and merchants, whose enterprise furnished the money.

A CORRESPONDENCE to the News from Travis, Austin county, under date of July 6th, gives the following:

Some of the farmers of this neighborhood met July 2d at the store of Mr. J. E. Stevens, to exhibit corn of this year's growth. The following is the measurement of stalk above ground:

E. Cleveland,	17	feet	4	inches.
Mr. Martin,	17	"	3	"
H. P. Wiley,	17	"	1	"
J. B. Pier,	16	"	9	"
Thos. Barnes,	13	"	9	"

The stalk of Mr. Barnes were 7 inches in circumference, and some of the stalks were over 10 feet to the first shoot. I hear of worm, but as yet I have seen none. Corn very fine—too much rain for cotton. This neighborhood is very healthy. Goliad county is shortly to receive forty families from the State of Alabama, to settle in that flourishing county.

HOW IT WAS DONE.—A gentleman in Grimes county picked off and burnt up fifteen bushels of cotton worms last year. The result was that he made over 100 bales of cotton, while his neighbor's crops were entirely destroyed by the cotton worm.—Houston Union.

THE CROPS, ETC.—We spent three days this week in the mountains, traversing portions of Hays, Comal and Blanco counties, as far as Blanco City. We were astonished to see the amount and character of land in cultivation, and congratulate the people of these sections on their splendid prospect for a crop. Their corn will average at least thirty-five or forty bushels to the acre, and we think not less than three hundred bales of cotton will be produced in Blanco county alone. This is very encouraging, and speaks well for the thrift and energy of the citizens. With such a healthy country, good land, splendid water, and enjoyable climate, they are and should be the happiest people in Texas.—San Marcos Pioneer, 3d.

MURDER.—There have been few offences of an aggravated character committed within our limits. On Sunday, the 27th instant, about two or three o'clock, our citizens were startled at the report that a barbarous and atrocious murder had been perpetrated in broad day light, in one of the most public places in the city. A man named Henderson, a wheelwright by trade, laying on a cart at his place of abode, his skull perforated and smashed by some heavy instrument supposed to have been done with a piece of iron which was found near the body. Circumstances led some persons to believe that the deed was done by a man who worked in the same shop with the deceased. A difficulty had occurred between them the day before, and this man being missing, search was made for him. His name is Hoover, a discharged U. S. soldier, he has been apprehended and undergone an examination, the particulars we have not learned, further than politics was not involved in the affray, both being Union or loyal men.—Corpus Cristi Advertiser.

TEXAS CATTLE COMING.—Mr. C. L. Roff, of Cook county, Texas, is the pioneer of drovers for this season. He arrived last Wednesday, with a drove of 800 head, and has them now pastured south of town, beyond the settlements. Three or four other droves following close after, will be in soon. It is estimated that between ten and fifteen thousand head of Texas cattle are already on this side of the Wichita, on their way to this or some other contiguous point on the Kansas Pacific Railroad, for a shipping market.

Mr. Roff came through in a little less than four weeks. He reports his cattle as being in splendid condition.—Alina Herald, 19.

A LADY COMMITS SUICIDE.—Mrs. Bettie Jones, wife of Dr. Jones of Springfield, Texas, committed suicide by shooting herself with a pistol about three weeks since. She shot herself three times—the first ball taking effect in the left arm, the second in the breast, and the third, which proved fatal, in the lower part of the neck—thus showing a determination and strength of purpose to end her existence, which we do not remember to have ever heard equalized before. Mrs. Jones

had given some slight evidence of insanity on several occasions previous to the commission of the rash act, proceeding from unknown causes, as she was pleasantly situated and apparently happy in her domestic affairs. This lady was the daughter of Mr. Calvin Morris, who formerly lived near Larissa, in this county, and a niece of the Hon. W. V. Tunstall of Anderson county.—Texas Observer.

EXPERIENCED farmers assert that the cotton worm never makes its appearance until after the first full moon in June, which this year occurred on the 23d. Time enough has elapsed since then to justify the belief, if this theory is correct; that we shall not be visited with these insects the present season, as we hear nothing of their ravages up to this issue.—Texas Observer, July 3.

MR. JESSE BUTLER, of this county, was arrested by our Sheriff, Joel Lindsey, on a capias from Harrison, and conducted thither under a heavy guard a few days since. He is charged with the killing of one Baker during the war.—Tyler Reporter.

## Letter from Victoria County.

Editor Flake's Bulletin:

Sir: My attention has been called to a letter recently published in the Austin Republican, addressed to Mr. John L. Haynes, and written by myself. That letter was prompted alone by a desire to unite the Republican party to Texas, and I was intended to be private, merely threw out some suggestions which, if acted on, I thought would have the desired effect. I am told that the propositions made are being used to the injury of an innocent party.

As you are aware, an effort was made by Republicans representing both wings of the party in Texas to reconcile the conflicting claims of the rival candidates for gubernatorial honors, so that the coming canvass the Republican party might present an unbroken front. The basis of what was considered by the friends of both Gen. Hamilton and
