Platform of the Republican party of Texas.
Resolved—1st. That the Republican party of Texas heartily accepts the conditions of reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully sustain the same in word and spirit.
2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all citizens of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of those amendments.
3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, when modified by the proposed 15th amendment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republicans of Texas especially, commend the spirit of the additional resolution adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz, and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as served in the late rebellion, but who now frankly and honestly co-operate with us in restoring the peace of the country, and reconstructing our State Government on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.
4. That the payment of the debt incurred in preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will condemn all attempts to evade in any manner, the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creators of the same.
5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of internal improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in Convention herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term of "carpet-bagger," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.
6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main object of Constitutional Government viz: The equal, civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.
7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore warn the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, is the result of an insidious design of the enemy purposing the practical surrender of the State to the rebel.

8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express unqualified confidence in the administrative abilities, and integrity of the honored head of our Government—President Grant, and in the patriotism and wisdom of the majority in Congress.
P. W. Hall, of Robinson, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in ferreting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Geo. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.
Johnson Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and he knows as resolution No. 9:
Resolved, That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

TEXAS ITEMS.
It is contemplated to erect two large well arranged and well furnished buildings in the city of Dallas expressly for school purposes.
A negro named Hart has been sentenced to be hung for rape. He will be executed in Jefferson, on the 10 of August.
The Waco Examiner of the 9th, says the Brazos was falling rapidly at that point. This relieves the planters of that region of all fears of an overflow.
A detachment of soldiers have arrested Richard B. Long, and a son of Judge Roberts, of Tyler. They are supposed to have been concerned in an affray in Tyler, about a year ago, in which a soldier was killed.
A military commission is soon to meet in Waco for the trial of offenders.
The Texas Vindicator has changed hands and will soon reappear as a Conservative organ.
The Huntsville Republican says that Gen. Reynolds has made an appropriation to continue operations in the penitentiary. That institution is very well patronized. Additions are made almost daily to its inmates.
The Henderson Times is credibly informed that there is a "mad-stone" in the possession of Mrs. Elizabeth Melton, of Rusk county. It has been used several times with success.
The Victoria Advocate of the 8th, learns that the work on the Indianola tap road continues, and hopes before winter sets in to see it completed, and the road between that place and Lavaca put in thorough repair.
Texas beavers were selling in Abilene, Kansas, on the 13th of June, at from \$30 to \$32 per head. There appears to be no trouble apprehended from the State authorities of Kansas, in driving cattle direct to Abilene.


LYRGE BEEF HIDE.—Thos. Ellsbury has just received what we consider the largest beef hide in Texas. It is about seventeen feet long and thirteen feet broad, and weighed when green two hundred and six and three-fourths pounds. Mr. Ellsbury says that beef when killed weighed 3717 pounds. Reader, you can call and see it for yourself as it certainly is a big thing somewhere (this notice or the hide). It will only be here for a few days.—Telegraph.
The following paragraph, from a recent decision of Judge Lindsay, will interest many:
A sheriff has no authority to exact a bail bond from one whom he has arrested, or who has voluntarily surrendered himself into his custody. It is his duty to take the accused before some magistrate that the offense may be inquired into.
The Indianola Bulletin says that that place was never in a more prosperous condition than at the present time. No indications of yellow fever or other serious disease are to be seen.
The soldiers and negroes had a free fight at Columbus on the 4th.
Herman Tracy, an old citizen of Columbus, Texas, is dead. He was a native of South Carolina.
The Waco Register says:
So far as we can learn, cotton is growing finely, with every prospect for a good crop.
The Navasota Ranger says:
We have been shown three cotton stalks upwards of five feet high, loaded with the finest and largest bolls we have ever witnessed this early in the season. Two of the stalks are from Grimes and one from Washington county. If the cotton crops in these counties are not troubled by the worm, they will be the largest and best ever produced.
The Texas Countryman says:
Cotton, when it has been worked, looks well and promising, and if spared from the ravages of the caterpillar, an abundant yield may be anticipated. We were told, at Brenham, that the cotton worm had already made its appearance on some farms in the upper portion of Washington county, but that they had done but little damage as yet; however, should the rains continue as they have for the past week, it is thought the worms will completely destroy the crop.

The Virginia Election.
The defeat of the Republicans of Virginia on Tuesday was not unexpected to us, as our readers may have observed; although for several days past our advices from Richmond were highly flattering. The Republicans pulled a very heavy vote, and made a gallant fight, but the odds were against them from the first. Not to speak of their own divisions, and the fact that nearly all the candidates on the other ticket professed to be Republicans, they had to encounter the active and solid organization of the rebel Democrats; and these skillful and desperate politicians were never more skillful and desperate than on Tuesday. All the old stagers took the stump for Walker, Hunter, "Extra" Smith, Bocock, Ould, Daniel, Lyons, and Mosby made common cause, and Robert E. Lee took care to show that he was still true to his character. Aided by Republicans like Hunnicutt, Stearns, and McKenzie, a considerable white, and a large colored support was given to the so-called Conservative ticket. The combination against the colored people was in many places irresistible. Threats to deprive them of employment, if they did not vote with their enemies, were open and defiant. Hundreds were induced to leave their election districts. We have no doubt it will be made to appear that thousands were controlled

by these influences. The war upon white Republicans was hardly less severe, as we had personal opportunity of seeing in several visits to the State. No reputation was safe from the assaults of the rebel friends of Colonel Walker. Their venom against a "carpet bagger" as honest and upright as Governor Wells or Colonel Whittey was not worse than their hatred of a native Republican like General Wickham or Col. Bolling. The Republican canvassers had to run a perfect gauntlet, especially those from other States, of injustice and abuse. General Van Winkle, of New York, who passed through Washington on Tuesday, after his gallant campaign for Wells, gives some graphic pictures of his reception at several points where he spoke. At Petersburg, at a Republican meeting, he was interrupted and insulted by repeated cheers for Lee and Davis; and when he asked the disturbers to cheer for Confederate soldiers like Longstreet and Wickham, they responded by immediate groans. We hope the General will satisfy such of the Republican papers of New York as have been obstructing the Republicans of Virginia, of the injustice and cruelty of their example. A very little observation taught us that a faithful member of the Republican party there was no choice left but to go for the party and its platform, was boldly opposed the Republican platform, the administration of Grant, and the new free constitution of Virginia.
But all is not lost in Virginia. Congress holds the key to the citadel. The rebel Democrats may boast that they have elected their candidates, but there is an ultimate remedy. Colonel Walker, and friends, who declare they are still Republicans, have assumed the responsibility. It is for them to show that they do not intend to destroy the new constitution after the manner of Georgia and Maryland. It is for them to show that they do not ask Virginia's readmission into the Union, only to restore her to the men who have no higher mission than to persecute every citizen, white and black, who supports the Republican party. Counting on Congress, as they will, with professions of Republicans on their lips, we hope they will take such a stand as will prove that in the late election they were not willing parties to a plot to restore that State to its rebel masters.
The compact between Colonel Walker and these desperate politicians should be a warning to every aspirant South who professes any fidelity to the Republican party. We have an organization as we have a platform, and only those who obey the one and stand upon the other can hope to be regarded as Republicans. Wherever a candidate seeks for votes as "a Conservative" he cannot claim to be a Republican, or look for recognition from a Republican administration or a Republican Congress. The nomination of A. J. Hamilton, of Texas, as the "Citizens" candidate for Governor, however it may please the rebel element, does not strengthen the confidence of the great party of which he has been for eight years so bright an ornament. We had Colonel Walker proclaimed a Republican from tide-water to the mountains all through the canvass, and it remains for him to say whether he will be true to his known convictions during and since the war, or will help the rebels to overthrow the new free constitution, and so drive out the loyal element of the State.—Washington Chronicle.

AN IMPERIAL VISIT TO AMERICA.—Appleton's Journal for July 1st announces that Eugenie Montijo, Empress of the French, will visit America next summer. It says:
It is pretty generally known that Prince Arthur, second son of the Queen of England, will visit Canada and the United States during the present season, but the fact that we are about to announce has not yet been made public—that a more illustrious person will land on our shores next summer in the person of Eugenie Montijo. Eugenie will not visit the United States as Empress of France, but will travel alone, under an assumed title, which however, will not prevent her receiving a most cordial and enthusiastic reception wherever she may show her beautiful face. She will be the first of the crowned heads of Europe who has landed on American soil.

We also spent a portion of our devilhood in the upper story, in the office of the "Western Texas." We have always thought a good deal of the old mill, although it is a part of river impediment. We should like to see the beautiful river scenery, which presents itself at this point, marred by some driving shrieking factory or mill. The grand old structure now standing there is a rustic ornament.

CHATTANOOGA ROAD.—Some thirty of the owners of land along the proposed line of Chattanooga railway, between New Orleans and the Rigolettes, filed oppositions to the appraisements made by the Commissioners. The evidence was so conflicting that Judge Leannont took a trip over the whole of the proposed road, from New Orleans to Chef Meuteur, and after weighing all the statements, confirmed the report of the Commissioners. The N. O. Bulletin says:

It is very evident from the testimony taken in this case that the Chattanooga Railroad is no myth, but the contrary, will be finished between New Orleans and Mobile by next summer, and then it will be pushed westward toward the Pacific.
