Resolved, lst. That the Republican party of Texas heartly accepts the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully sustain the

same in word and spirit,
2 That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the accurity of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican par-ty therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of those amendments.

Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, where not modified by the proposed 18th amend-ment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the enhediment of correct prin-ciples of public policy.
