SMALL Houses. - The experiment of building moderate houses for moderate means has been tried in Montreal during the last year with good results. In the year 1867, the necessity of increasing the number of houses of moderate rent attracted the attention of gentlemen interested in the subject, and a building association was formed, chartered, and organized. The stock of the association was issued in \$60 shares, payable \$1 a share per month, or in advance if the stockholder so preferred, interest being allowed on all advance payments On the 1st of July last year \$75, 000 of the stock had been taken, ground was chosen in a suitable situation, and cleven houses were built and sold, and are now occupied. In building the houses the wishes of applicants are consuited; the houses are sold at an advance of ten per cent, on the cost of land and buildings, to cover interest, insurance, and other expenses, while the houses are building, and the payments with six per cent. interest are made in monthly or quarterly install ments, extending over a period of 10 years, or less, at the option of the purchaser. A building association in this city would be productive of good results.
