Platform of the Republican party of Texas.

Resolved, 1st. That the Republican party of Texas heartily accepts the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully sustain the same in word and spirit.

2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the pacification of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of these amendments.

3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, where not modified by the proposed 15th amendment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republicans of Texas especially, commend the spirit of the additional resolutions adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz; and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as served in the late rebellion, and who now frankly and honestly co-operate with us in restoring the peace of the country, and reconstructing our State Government on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.

4. That the payment of the debt incurred in preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will condemn all attempts to evade in any manner, the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creditors of the same.

5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of industrial improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in connection herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term of "scrap-iron," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.

6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main object of Constitutional Government viz: The equal civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.

7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore warn the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, is the result of an ignominious design of the enemy purposing the practical surrender of the State to the rebels.

8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express unqualified confidence in the administrative abilities, and integrity of the honorable head of our Government—President Grant, and in the patriotism and wisdom of the majority in Congress.

P. W. Hall, of Robinson, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:
 Resolved, That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in ferreting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Geo. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.
 Johnson Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and be known as resolution No. 9:
 Resolved, That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

 And thus it is that mankind have an immortality, in which Passion, the Divine part enters to life, whilst the base portions perish.

DR. CHENEY, of Chicago, who has been cited to the bishop for trial on a charge of certain omissions in his reading of the church service,

has been very warmly indorsed by his own congregation, who see no heresy in his course, and deprecate the coming trial.

THE Rev. John Long, of Thomasville, North Carolina, a Methodist preacher, who has served twenty-five years, while preaching, was stricken down by apoplexy, and died almost immediately.

THE Rev. Van Nest, living in Florence, Italy, has come home to obtain the means of paying for a monastery and church building which has been purchased for an orphan asylum—the first in Italy.

Bishop Melvaine had arranged to sail for Europe, July 3d, but was too unwell to go on that day. The indisposition was temporary, resulting from too great fatigue. He is at present with a relative at Orange, New Jersey.

THE Rev. Mr. Van Liew has resigned the pastorate of the Reformed Church of Readington, N. J., after a service of forty years. He retires from active life on account of advanced age. Rev. Mr. Van Slike, a recent graduate of Rutgers College, has accepted a call. This is the third installation in that church for eighty years, the last two pastors continuing their connections for forty years each.

BISHOP PAYNE, of the Protestant Episcopal Church, is compelled to leave Africa in consequence of ill-health. He has been a missionary in that country for more than 30 years. During the time of his Episcopate he has confirmed 643 persons, and ordained 55 to the ministry. He has started churches at 22 places, extending a distance of 250 miles of what was a most barbarous coast. He has also established schools of various kinds, and an orphan asylum to take care of destitute children.

ELDER William Davenport, of the Christian Church, who died in Nebraska City, June 24, moved to Tazewell county, Ill., from Kentucky, in 1834, for the purpose of getting his family where they would not be subject to what he regarded as the cursing influence of slavery. He had previously manumitted his slaves. As soon as he was settled in Illinois he commenced preaching, and continued it without interruption until his health and constitution began to fail. In the thirty years of his most active labors as a minister, he baptized over 4,000 persons with his own hands. In 1848, he and his brother-in-law, Ben Major, of Woodford county, Ill., started a select school in Walnut Grove, in that county, which has since grown up to be Eureka College. During the rebellion the Elder, who was a strong Union man, was at one time taken prisoner by John Morgan, who so admired his resolute independence of character that he released him. Mr. Davenport was aged 72 years.

THE united church membership of the Old and New School Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church will number about 440,000. Reunion with the Southern Presbyterians will follow in time, which will swell the numbers up to more than half a million. Should all the churches, which are one with them in polity, become merged into one body, the grand total would be over 900,000.

ALL the Protestant parishes of Bohemia are about to declare publicly their adhesion to the resolutions adopted at the recent Assembly of Worms in reply to the Papal encyclical inviting the Protestants to appear at the approaching Ecumenical Council. For this purpose, it is said, a great public meeting will shortly be held of all the Protestants in the Austro-Hungarian monarchy.

THE impression that the Friends are dwindling away is incorrect. During the last year the orthodox branch of the society alone received about 1,500 new member. There are now twelve yearly meetings—nine in this country and one each in Canada, Ireland and England. The society is growing quite rapidly in this country—viz., the Haverford College, in Pennsylvania; Earlham College, in Richmond, Ind., and Whittier College, at Salem, Iowa. It is a noteworthy fact that the society flourishes most in those States whose Quakers believe in Sunday schools.

San Antonio Sleeps on her Oars.

Our citizens have evidently all the business they can attend to, as our commercial boat floats along the stream without the help of an oar. We may reach the still waters of business stagnation some day that will rouse every oarsman in the boat. We have all the advantage of natural position, but who does not know that any neighboring outside point, furnished with railroad facilities would cause our beautiful old town to wither like a lily in a drained pond.

Western Texas must depend upon its own energies; it can hope for little from the State in the way of help to their railroad enterprises. The weight of the monied and political influence of the State is greatly on the Galveston side of the house, and hence we see at this time considerable effort being put forth to complete the railroad to Austin; and the people of La Grange urged to put themselves in connection with Galveston by rail. It is the one great idea of the Galvestonians to build up their city as the one great and only sea coast town of Texas. San Antonio has all the ingredients of becoming a great inland city, its position is a key to the frontier, it has grown year after year, amidst war and famine, and still continues to grow. All that it needs is a railroad to the Gulf, to place it on a firm and lasting foundation, and to make it a city whose prosperity nothing can disturb. We must have a road to Indiana, and then we can afford to smile at the struggle of such pretentious State pots as Austin.

Life on the Frontier.

Indian Fight on the Llano.

CAPTURE OF A CAPTIVE.

ONE INDIAN KILLED.

Adventure of Adams and His Neighbors.

Life on our Texas frontier is full of danger and excitement, and hardly a week passes over but some Indian forray is chronicled. We have letters from the Llano and Gillespie counties, which might be wove into a first class story for Bonner's weekly.

Our agent at Hedwigshill, the county seat of Mason county, writes us under date of July 27th, to the following effect:

On the 25th July, twelve Mexicans met ten Indians, near Allen's ranch, on the upper Llano; the Mexicans attacked the Indians and defeated them, the Indians leaving one of their number dead on the field, and their entire outfit, consisting of twenty-four horses, saddles, etc.; also a captive white boy was captured, who had been stolen from the Colorado river country, a few days before; the boy is about 12 years old, his name is not given. The Indians escaped by jumping into the Llano and swimming to the opposite bank, which prevented pursuit.

The Llano has been very high, and at the date of correspondent's writing, was impassable only for a boat. The mails were carried in a small boat. A company of soldiers were encamped on the bank of the river, unable to cross—on their march to New Mexico.

On the 21st of July, a Mr. Adams met twenty-five Indians, near Dorsey's mill. Adams was well mounted, but was so hard pressed, that he was compelled to turn at times and show fight; he managed to kill one of the Indians horses and to wound one Indian. Adams escaped to the ranch without being hurt, and organizing a scout of citizens, gave pursuit to his pursuers. Nothing heard from this scout yet.

Another correspondent writes us from Gillespie county, to the effect that Bill Neighbors, who lives on Pecan creek, in that county, while out from his house, some two hundred yards, hobbling three of his horses, he heard a noise and looking up, saw fifteen Indians about one hundred yards distant; he stooped down and began to unhobble his horses again, in order to let them go, but the Indians dashed upon him and compelled him to run for his life. They surrounded him on all sides, but he steadily pressed for his house, firing his pistol at his assailants, amidst a perfect shower of shot and arrows. One Indian dismounted in front of him, and deliberately shot at him, but missed his aim; he returned the fire and says that the Indian saved himself by his shield. On nearing the house, the uncle of the pursued man came out to his relief, and the Indians ceased pursuit, taking with them the hobbled horses.

Such is a sample of life on our frontier. The region where these Indian forrays are made, is one of the most beautiful, in point of wild scenery and landscape, on the continent.

ANOTHER SHOT FROM THE BLUNDERBUSS.—Old Geo. W. Paschal has fired off his blunderbuss again, in the shape of a four column letter in reply to Glenn, which is appropriately published in Flake's Bulletin. As the result, Paschal lies kicking with his heels up, from his own discharge. Nobody hurt.

LONGLEY has a leader in his issue of the 25th on the very interesting topic of "Tobacco." This is his proper element as it belongs to his duties as an internal Revenue officer.

LONGLEY thanks a neighbor for the present of a cabbage head a good deal larger than his own. Rather a doubtful compliment.

NATIVE WINES.—Texas is, beyond question, the best grape growing country in the world; and there is more money to be made at it than in the cultivation of anything else. In this connection, we notice that Messrs. Jesup, Marsh & Wiggins, of Shreveport, advertise wine of the finest flavor from a vineyard in Smith county, Texas.—Jefferson Times.

A Speech From a Confederate Soldier.

We extract the following from a speech made recently by Col. Robert Bolling, of Petersburg, Virginia, who before the war occupied many high positions of trust and honor. We commend his language to the fire-eaters of the Democratic party:

"I came here to give you the reason why a Virginia Confederate can be a Republican. The party which to day asks your support and your vote is nothing in the world but the old Democratic party, with all the proscriptive features which it has possessed for the last thirty or forty years.

It is the same party which took you out of the Union and brought so much of woe and agony to every citizen of the Commonwealth. Do they ask your support because they fulfilled every pledge they ever made? If any man can point me to any promise ever made by that party which has been fulfilled, I will vote for it.

They told you to support them and they would save the Union. You did so, and they tried to destroy it. They told you to support them and slavery would be saved. You did so, and slavery is gone; and in the same way have they always deceived you by false promises, and I for one will trust them no longer.

Many of you believe that the object of the Republican party is to ostracize and proscribete Confederate soldiers. You believe this because you never read anything but a Democratic speech. There is not one single act of Congress, nor a single resolution of any Republican Convention, which proscribes any man because he was a Confederate soldier, or because he was an officer of the Confederate Government. You have believed that the objection of the Republican party is to degrade the Confederate soldiers. It is not true."

GENERAL CANBY AND THE VIRGINIA ELECTION.—We have the information that General Canby has sent circulars to all the members elect of the Virginia Legislature, asking of each if he can take the iron clad oath of loyalty to the Union; that if he can thus raise a qualified quorum of both houses he will issue a proclamation convening the Legislature to ratify the fifteenth amendment and elect United States Senators; but that if a quorum of iron-clad oath members cannot thus be procured, the commanding general of the military district of Virginia will order new elections to fill the seats made vacant by reason of inability to take the oath aforesaid.—N. Y. Herald.

It would seem that Gen. Canby will stand by his decision, which will no doubt cause a new election in Virginia, which will result in a Republican victory and the securing the majority of the Legislature.

The Jefferson Times on the Situation.

We clip the extract below, from the leading democratic paper of Eastern Texas, the Jefferson Times: If, as we are told, it is incumbent upon us to elect men in sympathy with the Republican party, or, in other words, practically to turn radicals, why stop half way? Why not, at once, join Mr. Davis and his friends? His is the party in favor at Washington. It has unquestionably the sympathy of the Administration and of Congress. If we are to sacrifice honesty and principle, and to consult policy alone, it seems to us we had better coalesce with the party most capable of serving us, or sell out to the highest bidder.

It may well be asked, in this feast to which the democracy of Texas are to be invited? Is it the statesmanship and the sole mission of its leaders to disband and destroy the party, and to lead its members, without even consulting them, into a radical encampment?

We, for one will have nothing to do with such an unholy coalition. We repudiate it; we abhor it; we scorn it. No earthly power shall cause us to forfeit all self-respect and all political integrity, by advising such an affiliation. Nor do we believe that the people have any sympathy with a movement so full of corruption. They have simply betrayed by their leaders. They could never be brought to consent to consign the State government for four long years into the hands of such men as Hamilton, Pease, Bell, Paschal, and their supporters and friends. If they did, it would exhibit the very worst species of political insanity, and in all probability, involve them in degradation and ruin. There is a safer and better road before them. They have the power to elect whom they please. Let them exercise it wisely, by organization, and placing honest men in the field, to whom they can safely confide the interests of the State.

WASHINGTON, July 30.

WASHINGTON, July 30.
Revenue over a million dollars. The President leaves to-night.

Clark Tullock has been appointed revenue collector.
