There is no obligation a good citizen should discharge more cheerfully than his taxes.

POISONOUS SODA FOUNTAINS.—Dr. Clendene, who was recently commissioned by the city of Cincinnati to look after the Soda fountains, reports that out of the hundred specimens examined, fourteen contained copper and ten lead, making twenty-four poisonous. From his description of what is necessary in the way of fountains, pipes, etc., to keep soda water pure, we predict there is little or none sold South that is not poisonous. The fountain should be enamelled, but enamelled fountains cannot be transported. A heavy coating of tin may be substituted. All the pipes should be of tin, no copper or lead should be allowed in contact with the soda. There is no difficulty in ascertaining the condition of soda water. By adding a few drops of the solution of yellow prussiate of potash to a glass of the suspected soda water, placed on a white paper, no change is occasioned if it is pure; but if even a small quantity of copper is present, a shade of purplish brown is produced and readily appreciated by looking down in the glass. The presence of lead is readily detected by adding to the suspected liquid a few grains of the iodide of potassium, which if lead is present, produces a yellow tint. These tests should be applied by all who sell soda water, every two or three days, and to every new fountain.
