Endorsing the Two Oaths.

By telegraph we learn that the Attorney General has decided that the test oath must be administered to the members of the Virginia Legislature. This decision decidedly changes the complexion of things, not only in Virginia, but in Texas. Persons now offering themselves as Candidates for the Legislature or for Congress, who cannot take the test oath are simply ineligible, and their longer continuance in the field is an open defiance to the law, and their election will be as void as if they were not citizens of this country. The audacious and the people have now fair warning that the test oath will be applied and have no excuse to offer for setting it at defiance.

HEAD LINES.—It is astonishing what names some men are: the editor of the Herald, for instance, calls Jack Hamilton's record during the last two years "dead issue". What we want the people to know is, that Jack Hamilton has never been a moderate man, but always an extreme, from a headlocked, blood-thirsty radical, he flies to the other extreme, and preaches just the opposite doctrine to that he announced a few months since. No change has taken place in Jack Hamilton, the change is in the character of the editor. We want the people to understand that he is an inclined dangerous man who has no regard for truth or principle, his assertions and promises of today exalt his career and invigorate to-morrow. His elevation to office will only serve to strengthen the brand of infamy which has already been fixed upon our State. If we want to make a reputation for good morals, we must not elect a man to the chief office of the State, whose private and public character is a living curse and disgrace to his race.

Our Travelling Troubles.

We hope our readers will not weary often continuation of the want, misery, and adventure of a railroad, in contact with the progress of the world. We are determined to present the question in all its phases.

We have proven, however, that the amount paid out for freight from individuals to the master would at present pay a dividend to a rail road of at least 24 percent upon all the amount invested in the construction and running the road; this showing of itself, is sufficient to induce the immediate construction of a road, be what be the investment which capitalists make? And these falsehoods secure us a road in a very short time. The same figures which demonstrate that one railway line is of present sufficient to pay an enormous profit to a railroad, also prove that the amount now invested by private individuals in wagons, carts, and animals to carry freight from the coast to the interior is greater than that necessary to build and equip a rail road. We believe we do not overstate the figure when we put down the value of these teams and rolling stock, and the amount of labor required to run them at maximum speed. Now, what does this prove? It proves that private enterprise has in the most awkward manner furnished a substitute for a railroad at a greater cost than a railroad. It will add not only to its good reputation for progress but will cause it to be placed at par with men abroad who seek Southern districts where Southern prejudices have become fairly exact.

Our Slaveholders.

Would it not be well for the people of Texas, to know for what purpose the Rev. E. M. Wheelock, late of the Freedman's Bureau, and late teacher of a colored School in New Orleans, is drawing \$2000 per annum from the school fund and by what authority this money is paid to that sinner?

Not a free school in the State, except those supported by our city, and the application for help from the school fund made by our city authorities was treated with silence. It is not contempt by the authorities at Austin, then, Reynolds has this positive under his control, and his attention is respectfully directed to the impropriety of paying a salary to a schoolsuperintendent when there are no schools. The school fund is now made to feed a tool of the Hammerstein faction—while thousands of children are starving for want of education.

It has been remarked, that when an argument cannot be refuted by the Austin Republicans on Flake's Bulletin, or when stubborn facts are cited, which cannot be denied, they immediately set to work to denounce their opponent and to cast him out of their society, and without the pale of decent journalism, and to announce that they will not reply to anything that comes from so filthy a source. Of course this settles the question. Whenever these quill drivers meet an opponent who is of too heavy metal for them to handle, they resort to the pitiful device of personal abuse and vilification.—Laughey, Haynes, Wheelock, Logan, Price & Co., will do for specimens of journalistic gouty and respectability. They should advertise in connection with their club rates, to furnish a full sized likeness of either in all of them, to every head of a family in Texas—for the children to look at?

Japan: SYMBIOTIC of San Antonio, we learn, is running for Congress in the interests of the Columbus railroad extension. Between Col. Still in the State Senate, and Stribling in Congress, pledged to a railroad interest antagonized to the railroad to this day, our people may look out for the most disastrous results.—Advertiser Commercial, August 1863.

All you have to do, Mr. Commerical, is to vote for a Republican, who knows what a railroad is. No danger from Stribling, he is running a tilt against his political disability, on the "iron coated" ticket.

G. T. Kirby for the Senate.

This Austin Republican denies that Rev. E. M. Wheelock is its editor. The vulgarity and general absence of truth displayed in the editorials of the Republican preclude the idea of any one but Longley being its editor; but why pay Wheelock so handsome a salary out of the State Treasury, if he does nothing for it?
