TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

WASHINGTON, Aug 14.

A recent dispatch telegraphed upon information furnished by Col. Edwards was wrongly printed in many Southern papers. The facts as furnished were that the negro Turner has been superseded, and Mr. Washington, the former incumbent restored to the Macon, Ga., postoffice.

The Cubans here have advices to the 3th containing Jordan's report of an engagement near Holguin. Valmaseda being reinforced determined to surprise the Cubans, Jordan fully advised, was prepared to meet Valmaseda. Jordan advanced a small force to lead Valmaseda into an ambush, the stratagem succeeded, Valmaseda's forces were thrown into confusion, Jordan charged, forcing Valmaseda to retreat in disorder, his impressed negroes broke on the first attack. The fight destroyed Valmaseda's army, giving the Cubans control of the Holguin district. The Spanish loss is 170 killed and wounded, and over 700 captured and deserted.

Further Cuban advices report the slaves throughout the island exhibiting symptoms of insubordination and sympathy with Cospedes; they are joining Cospedes in large numbers—thereby securing the emancipation proclaimed by the Provisional government. They make, it is said, good soldiers.

Quezada is nearly ready to attack Nuevitas, with certainty of success, unless the Spaniards are reinforced. It is believed they will avoid the contest. Vessels sufficient to remove the garrison are concentrating before the town.

Rear Admiral Davis is ordered to make arrangements for the survey of the Isthmus of Darien for ascertaining the feasibility, cost, &c., of a ship canal.

The pay of assistant assessor in Tennessee, North Carolina and the Gulf States has been reduced 50 cents per day.

The Times says the question of enforcing the test oath in the case of the members elect of the Virginia Legislature has been decided affirmatively by the Attorney General, and it will accordingly be enforced by Gen. Canby.

The President authorizes the publication of a conversation, showing his strong affiliation with the Radical Republicans of Mississippi and Texas.

PARIS, Aug 14.

Marshal Niel, Minister of War, is dead.

The Press, government organ, says that business relations between the Turkish and Lombardy railroads are entirely broken off.

Items from the Santa Fe New Mexico.

The ditch company of New Mexico is a great success, and is bringing out the gold diggings.

Adjutant General Cook and Mr. Hutchinson returned from New Mexico last Wednesday, where they are running a quartz mill and are taking out "cheaps" of money.

Late Arizona advices represent the Indians very bad, worse than for some years. There is not a road in the whole Territory that is safe to travel.

Mr. Richard Hudson, sheriff of Grant county, writing to a gentleman in Los Cruces, under date of July 9th, says: We have had some considerable excitement here this week, over recent rich discoveries of gold. Messrs. Milby & Backus have struck some very rich quartz on their lead (Patrol No. 2). It is so rich that they have taken from some of the rock, powdered in a hand mortar, from one to two hundred dollars per day. Day before yesterday, Messrs. Langston, McGee and Hart found another lead near the one they have been working, from which they have taken, with the aid of a hand mortar, about one thousand dollars of gold in a day. So you see we have good prospects for the future. The quartz found by Langston, McGee and Hart paid as high as fifty dollars to the pound.

We understand that Col. A. H. Pfeiffer has raised a party of fifty prospectors and gone to the San Juan country. The Colonel knows every foot of that country, and if there is any gold there, we are inclined to think they will find it.

TOMATO CATSUP.—Take ripe tomatoes, (small red ones are preferable), wash, but not skin them, and thoroughly boil them one hour, and then put them through a hair sieve, and to one quart of juice add one table-spoonful of cinnamon, one of black pepper, half of Cayenne, half of nutmeg, one of good mustard, two-thirds of a tea-spoonful of salt. Boil three hours, and then to one quart of juice add one pint of pure clear vinegar. Boil half an hour longer; bottle hot and seal up. This catsup will keep for years, and will not require shaking before using. A porcelain kettle should be used.

PARAGRAPHS.

Eight miles from Berlin is Tegel, a quiet place in the forest, with only a modern castle and its appendages. From the castle, by a winding footpath, at first through an over-arching jungle of lilacs, and then through native woodlands, one is led a long distance, until he is unexpectedly brought to a little dell, with an inclosure of graves covered with ivy. One of the sleepers in this quiet place is Frederick Henry Alexander von Humboldt, who was born in 1769, and died at the age of ninety years. At the head of the inclosure is a neat monument of red granite, surmounted by a beautiful figure of "Hope" in white marble. Long arms of oak, reaching out horizontally toward the sleeper, some of them more than fifty feet long, and ever green with moss of many years, give to the secluded spot a venerable surrounding. The April breeze whispering through the boughs of spruce and cedar, told the visitor to speak low and walk softly, and my feelings were in a good mood readily to hear and heed the gentle monitor.

In one of the church cemeteries, not half a mile from my lodgings in Berlin, in a retired corner, are the remains of Augustus Neander, the eminent church historian. A plain head stone has sculptured on it a side-view of his attractive face. Under the work of the sculptor is this inscription: "A sister to an unforgotten brother."

Prof. Tholuck, speaking to me yesterday of his lovely traits and great excellence, said: "If it were the custom now to have saints, Neander would surely be canonized."

I have often to step in and take a fresh look at the serene face of Neander. Not old, but ripe, he died at sixty-one; and evidently worthy of the laurel in his department of life's work.—The Advance.

Few men like to think their youthful days have passed. Youth seems to be the great touchstone in this world. The quicker it goes, and the faster we get away from its enchanted boundaries, the fewer become the motives for enjoyment and the objects that call forth the hearts sympathies. But there is a way of keeping the heart fresh and young to the end; and then, although the head may turn white, and the hands may become thin and shadowy, in the harbor of the eye may rise at anchor all the

winged ships that are freighted with cargoes of a life's love and joys, and upon the lips may linger savors of pleasant words that have made existence a blessing to all around. No, there is no need of feeling disheartened and despondent because the years, like leaves of autumn, are passing; that is the course of nature, to which we can oppose no obstruction; but no way, if we will, extract the sting from the reflections incident to old age, and dispense sunshine all around us by the cheerfulness of our temper and the sunniness of our looks and language.

SEIDNEY SMITH, in his work on moral philosophy, speaks in this wise of what men lose for the want of a little brass, as it is termed: "A great deal of talent is lost to the world for the want of a little courage. Every day sends to the grave a number of obscure men, who have only remained in obscurity because their timidity has prevented them from making a first effort, and who, if they could have been induced to begin, would in all probability have gone great lengths in the career of fame. The fact is, that in order to do anything in this world worth doing, we must not stand shivering on the bank, thinking of the cold and danger, but jump in and scramble through as well as we can. It will not do to be perpetually calculating risks and adjusting chances."

As long as time shall last the Hebrew—child of the Orient—will be an object of interest and curiosity to his fellow-man. Tossed for ages upon the ever changing tide of history, subject to every vicissitude and exile, a refugee, he has nevertheless carried with him the lamp and light of that divinity of law of which he is the oracle, through the manifest will of God. Even in the darkest ages of the world he has kept alive the spark of immortal reason and illumined the gloom of fanaticism, skepticism and tyranny by his unquenchable faith and his exalted conception of majestic design of the Creator. Time, revolution and change have only wrought out more clearly his claim, and placed him more distinctly as an object of wonder and admiration. Triumphant over every obstacle, he has at length come to be the first citizen of the world in commerce, finance and the fine arts. Rothschild, Tourco, Mendelssohn, Heine, and hundreds of others have proven their claims among the great masters, and lifted the reproach of the nations "from off their people." It can no longer be said: "The wild dove hath his nest, the fox his cave, mankind a country, Israel but the grave!"

For in this land of freedom, as in almost every country of the globe, the Hebrew has the largest liberty, and has built himself a home. He has become identified with our institutions and shares equally the burthens of the government. But the most remarkable feature about the Hebrew is his charity; he never suffers one of his own people to become an object of care to the State; his benevolent societies are without end.
