Live Cattle Weighed by Measure.

The only instrument necessary is a measure with feet and inch marks upon it. The girth is the circumference of the animal-just behind the shoudler blades. The length is the distance from the shoulder blades. The superficial feet are obtained by multiplying the girth and

The following table contains the rule to ascertain the weight of the animal:

If less than one foot in girth mul tiply superficial feet by eleven. If less than five and more than

three, multiply superficial feet by sixteen. If less than seven and more than five, multiply superficial feet by twenty five.

If less than nine and more than seven, multiply superficial feet by thirty three.

If less than eleven and more than nine, multiply superficial feet by

Example: Suppose the girth of a bullock to be six feet three inches; length five feet six inches; the superficial area will then be thirtyfour, and in accordance with pre-ceding table the weight will be seven hundred and eighty-two mounds.

Example: Suppose a pig to measure in girth two feet, and length one foot and nine meches. There would then be three and a half feet, which multiplied by eleven, gives thirty-eight and a half pounds as the weight of an animal when dressed. 

[Translated from the Freie Presse.] Too Much Dutch.

In our first article upon this subject we proved, by undeniable evidence, that the amount of taxes paid by our German population towards supporting the city adminis tration entitle them to a greater representation than has hitherto been given them. We proved that the Germans paid 55 4-5 per cent of the whole amount of taxes, while the Americans did not contribute more than 24 13-50 per cent. But we desire to add, more evidence to prove that there is not "too much dutch" in our city affairs. The per centage of city taxes paid by the different nationalities, as given in our former article, was carefully prepared from the assessment lists. that is from the amount of taxes to be levied by the Assessor and transmitted to the Treasurer. But it is well known that some fair to pay and are regularly docketed on the delinquent list. And this delinquent list is a long one every year. To find the exact percentage of taxes paid by Germans and Americans it will therefore be necessary to examine the delinquent list for the fiscal year 1868, ending August 1st 1869. The result of our inspection is, that the Americans have paid only 18 42 50 per cent of their taxes, while of the Germans only 2 2-5 remained

It is also to be remembered that delinquency can only occur in real estate taxes, because other taxes such as licences, sale and market taxes must be paid in advance, for if not paid the business must sus-

The income tax of our American citizens amounts to \$5,516, of that amount \$1,042 has not been paid. and we can assure our readers that some of our "best names" figure in quent list. The Germans are taxed \$8,048 on their incomes, ernor.

of which amount only \$192 remain unpaid. The German delinquents are mostly widows and persons not in the city at present.

But let us look over another leaf in the statistics of San Antonio and see how the "too much dutch" op-emies with the license tax.

There were, during the year, three hundred and fifty licenced and ax-paying establishments embracing wholesale and retail groceries and dry goods stores, liquor dealers, commission (merchants, lumber yards, barrooms, restaurants, hotels, billiards and bagatelle, livery stables, backs, carts, Auction houses, pawnbrokers, breweries, and beer saloons. They are distributed as

Total Of these 193 are in the hands of nearly equal to the percentage of what war Mr. Times ! taxes paid by the Germans on real estate. An exidence that the industrial capacity and business activity of this nationality has kept even pace with their acquisition of property, which also proves that this acquisition of property is the result of German industry and German labor-or in more forcible langnage, that the Germans have earned their property by the sweat of their brows.

Of the 350 licenced establish ments during the past fiscal year 143 were merchantile establishments, retail and wholesale, dealing in manufactured goods and groceries, distributed as follows:

This shows that the Germans have 62 12-33 per cent of the full number, while the Americans only own 18 12-33 per cent. In the wholesale business the Ger-

man element of San Autonio is represented by 17 houses out of 22, which shows a percentage of 77 13-50, while the Americans only figure with 3 stores or not quite 14 per cent. We have also looked into the mirror of our city tax list, to see to what kind of trades our Americans do most incline and we find that they are greatly inclined to speculation, the most prominent of this class are the bankers, pawnbrokers, and Auction houses. Among the occupations the keeping of livery stables, hacks, carts etc which is almost monopolized by the Americans. We leave the inferences to be drawn by our readers as to the industrial qualifications. In this connection the interesting fact should be mentioned that of 20 tax paying wagons used for heavy work employed in hauling rocks from the quarries, and other building material, 11 are owned by Germans, 3 by Mexicans, 4 by Irishmen, 1 by a Polander, and one by an American.

Looking over the list of those industrious persons who furnish our market with meat and vegetables. who may justly be counted among the hard working portion of our population, we find, that we have to thank for our daily food, 37 Germans; 7 Americans, 3 Mexicans, and one Frenchman.

In the rock quarries we find 4 Germans and 4 Mexicans, as renters. To whom we are indebted for our building material.

The above facts are especially directed to the consideration of those who think there is "too much dutch" about our city affairs, and we hope they may ponder them well. We can justly say with Bassiano in the merchant of Venice: "Thanks Jew, that you have taught me that word."

Tarbell, Secretary of the Republican Executive Committee of Mississippi, at the residence of Secretary Fish in New York, on the 6th inst., Grant re marked on the small number of Republicans engaged in the National Republican party in Misssissippi, using the name of Judge Dent, and said that in his judgement, the fact was in itself evidence that they could not be otherwise than used by the opposition. The President said his only desire was peace and amity, and he would do anything to bring that about; but that the people cast suspicions upon their own motives by the fact that all their efforts seem to be aimed at dividing, not aiding the Republican party in their midst. If they were really in earnest, they would not be so anxious about those with whom they acted. To sincere men it could got be difficult to tell who in the South were and had been the ad-

The President stated that in his conversation with the gentlemen representing the new Republicanparty in Missippi, he had expressed himself much more emphatically against their course, than he had to Gen. Tarbell. He said he fully endorsed Gen.
