LONDON, Aug. 17.

The city of San Domingo, whose population is principally black, is represented as a model town. Robbery is unknown, and so orderly is the place under the present rule that the prison has been closed for want of offenders against the law.

The German philologists will this year hold their 27th annual meeting in Kiel, from the 27th to the 30th September.

Among the bills now being prepared for the Prussian Landtag there is said to be one for introducing civil marriage.

A Swiss journal mentions the organization of a company in New York with a capital of \$30,000,000 for the purpose of opening a regular steam communication between the United States, Southern Europe, India and China via the Suez Canal.

Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, on behalf of a committee appointed for the purpose, has presented a report to a meeting of citizens of Savannah setting forth the advantages of that port as the terminus of the projected line of steamships from North Germany. There are several other contestants for this prize, including Norfolk, Wilmington, Charleston, and other Southern ports.

The Germans continue their enforcement of the Sunday law in Pittsburgh. They have held a meeting to select men to look out for the different street railroads, and one of the speakers said: "The sole purpose the society wishes to reach is the extreme observance of the Sabbath, so that all classes of citizens would be equally compelled to bear its advantages and disadvantages." The Courts are already full of cases growing out of violations of the law.

A touching commentary upon the unsatisfactory nature of wealth as compared with health, was afforded by Mr. Keop about a year ago. He had been an invalid for a long time, and on one occasion remarked to a friend that he would most gladly give up all his enormous wealth if he could but regain the physical comfort which he enjoyed in his younger days when he was poor.

Beauty on the Surf.

A seaside correspondent writes: "The scene upon the beach strikes me with as keen a sense of jolly judicious and happy ridiculousness as when I first beheld it. What awkward animals we humans are when we venture out of our natural element into the element of the fish. The change of manner which the loveliest of her sex undergoes as she tumbles into the surf is a study for a philosopher. She has an air of dignity in spite of her bifurcated garments as she walks down to the water's edge; there is something of genteel exclusiveness in her mien, in spite of her naked white feet, which—mincingly go uncovered across the sands; an air of 'keep a respectful distance, please, as I am a society lady,' hangs about her, in spite of the coarse straw hat, tied over the ears with a red rag. And presently she is in the surf—a big wave sends her sprawling quadrupedly; she scrambles to her feet half choked with the salt water, which has rushed into eyes, ears and nose; clutches frantically at anybody who may be within his reach, and grins familiarly to the whole assembly."

Live Cattle Weighed by Measure.

The only instrument necessary is a measure with feet and inch marks upon it. The girth is the circumference of the animal—just behind the shoulder blades. The length is the distance from the shoulder blades. The superficial feet are obtained by multiplying the girth and length.

The following table contains the rule to ascertain the weight of the animal:

If less than one foot in girth multiply superficial feet by eleven.

If less than five and more than three, multiply superficial feet by sixteen.

If less than seven and more than five, multiply superficial feet by twenty-five.

If less than nine and more than seven, multiply superficial feet by thirty-three.

If less than eleven and more than nine, multiply superficial feet by forty.

Example: Suppose the girth of a bullock to be six feet three inches; length five feet six inches; the superficial area will then be thirty-four, and in accordance with preceding table the weight will be seven hundred and eighty-two pounds.

Example: Suppose a pig to measure in girth two feet, and length one foot and nine inches. There would then be three and a half feet, which multiplied by eleven, gives thirty-eight and a half pounds as the weight of an animal when dressed. In this way the weight of the four quarters can be substantially ascertained during life.—Southern Cultivator.

Idle Daughters.

It is a most painful spectacle in families, where the mother is the drudge, to see the daughters, elegantly dressed, reclining at their ease with their drawing, their music, their fancy work, and their reading, beguiling themselves for the lapse of hours, days and weeks, and never dreaming of their responsibilities, but as a necessary consequence of their duty, growing weary of their useless lives, laying hold of every newly invented stimulant to amuse their drooping energies, and blaming their fate when they dare not blame their God for having placed them where they are. These individuals will often tell you, with an air of affected compassion—for who can believe it real!—that poor, dear mamma is working herself to death. Let no sooner do you propose they should assist her, than they declare she is quite in her element; in short, that she would never be happy if she had only half as much to do.

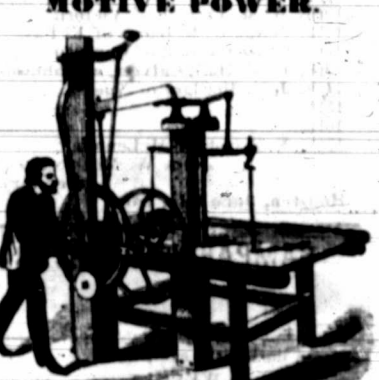

Too Much Dutch.

In our first article upon this subject we proved, by undeniable evidence, that the amount of taxes paid by our German population towards supporting the city administration entitle them to a greater representation than has hitherto been given them.

It is also to be remembered that delinquency can only occur in real estate taxes, because other taxes such as licenses, sale and market taxes must be paid in advance, for if not paid the business must suspend.

of which amount only \$192 remain unpaid. The German delinquents are mostly widows and persons not in the city at present.

But let us look over another leaf in the statistics of San Antonio and see how the "too much dutch" operates with the license tax.

There were, during the year, three hundred and fifty licensed and tax-paying establishments embracing wholesale and retail groceries and dry goods stores, liquor dealers, commission merchants, lumber yards, barrooms, restaurants, hotels, billiards and bagatelle, livery stables, hacks, carts, Auction houses, pawnbrokers, breweries, and beer saloons. They are distributed as follows:

Table showing distribution of establishments by nationality: Germans 193, Americans 85, Mexicans 23, Frenchmen 20, Irishmen 13, Polanders 16, Total 350.

Of these 193 are in the hands of Germans, a percentage of 55.8-50, nearly equal to the percentage of taxes paid by the Germans on real estate. An evidence that the industrial capacity and business activity of this nationality has kept even pace with their acquisition of property, which also proves that this acquisition of property is the result of German industry and German labor—or in more forcible language, that the Germans have earned their property by the sweat of their brows.

Of the 350 licensed establishments during the past fiscal year 143 were mercantile establishments, retail and wholesale, dealing in manufactured goods and groceries, distributed as follows:

Table showing distribution of mercantile establishments: Wholesale 17, Retail 1st class 16, 2nd 30, 3rd 26, Total 89.

This shows that the Germans have 62.12-33 per cent of the full number, while the Americans only own 18.12-33 per cent. In the wholesale business the German element of San Antonio is represented by 17 houses out of 22, which shows a percentage of 77.13-50, while the Americans only figure with 3 stores or not quite 14 per cent.

Looking over the list of those industrious persons who furnish our market with meat and vegetables, who may justly be counted among the hard working portion of our population, we find, that we have to thank for our daily food, 37 Germans; 7 Americans, 3 Mexicans, and one Frenchman.

A COLORED WOMAN CARRIES OFF THE PRIZE FOR THE SECOND BALE.—The second bale of cotton received at Galveston was sent by a colored woman. It was raised by her on the Colorado River. The News says that she and her children will gather thirty or forty more.

PARAGRAPHS.

Strange to say, George didn't seem to appreciate the gift.

A German forest keeper, has published in the Leipzig Journal, a recipe he has used for fifty years, and which he says, has saved several men and a great number of animals from a horrible death by hydrophobia. The bite must be bathed as soon as possible with warm vinegar and water and when this has dried, a few drops of muriatic acid poured upon the wound, will destroy the poison of the saliva, and relieve the patient from all present or future danger.

The Carlsruhe Zeitung is informed by its Vienna correspondent: "It is said that the Hungarian Government is firmly resolved, in case the Court of Rome is unable or unwilling to furnish certain guarantees required as to the spirit and tendency of the approaching council, to strictly and absolutely forbid the members of the Hungarian Episcopate to attend it. It is self evident that if such a resolution be taken in Hungary, it may be imitated in the other half of the Monarchy."

WHY SHE TOLD THE TRUTH.—A little girl who was put upon the witness stand in Justice Stephen's office a few days ago gave a very unexpected and good reason why the truth should be told. After taking the oath, the attorney for the party in whose interest she had been summoned, asked her if she knew the nature of the obligation she had just taken—what she was obliged to do. "Yes, sir," was the reply, "I must tell the truth." The attorney for the other side immediately asked, "Why must you tell the truth?" Answer: "Because if I don't this case won't be won." The reply produced a sensation and the girl was permitted to testify without further questioning.—[Cleveland Plaindealer.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The following is telegraphed by request. The following statement is made by permission of the President: In an interview with Gen. Tarbell, Secretary of the Republican Executive Committee of Mississippi, at the residence of Secretary Fish in New York, on the 6th inst., Grant remarked on the small number of Republicans engaged in the National Republican party in Mississippi, using the name of Judge Dent, and said that in his judgement, the fact was in itself evidence that they could not be otherwise than used by the opposition. The President said his only desire was peace and unity, and he would do anything to bring that about; but that these people cast suspicions upon their own motives by the fact that all their efforts seem to be aimed at dividing, not aiding the Republican party in their midst. If they were really in earnest, they would not be so anxious about those with whom they acted. To sincere men it could not be difficult to tell who in the South were and had been the administration's friends.

The President stated that in his conversation with the gentlemen representing the new Republican party in Mississippi, he had expressed himself much more emphatically against their course, than he had to Gen. Tarbell. He said he fully endorsed Gen. Ames' administration, and that that officer would have to do much, and more serious things than he had heard charged, before he would subject himself to removal.

Present—His Honor, Mayor Thielepape, Aldermen—Messrs. Hertzburg, Buchetti, Newcomb, Gross, Norton and Callaghan.

The minutes of the meeting of Aug. 2nd were read and adopted.

Petition of steam engine fire company No. 2, asking an appropriation of \$3,021, this being the amount of the Company's indebtedness, referred to the Finance Committee.

The petition of sundry citizens in regard to the bad condition of Pross street, read and referred to committee on public improvements.

The resignation of J. F. Studer as assistant marshal accepted.

The several applications for the office of assistant marshal were read; on motion it was adopted that the candidates be balloted for, when the following was the result: A. W. Knapp received 3 votes, F. Gahan received 3 votes. The vote being a tie the Mayor gave his vote in favor of Captain Knapp.
