PARIS, Aug 21.
The Empress and Prince Imperial depart eastward on Monday.
The French authorities have arrested 12 Carlist leaders while attempting to cross the borders.
HAVANA, Aug. 21.
Derodas has gone to Matanzas.
Three coast patrol schooners are receiving armament at the arsenal.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.
Cubans here have advised to the 15th, which reports the disorganization of the Spanish volunteer forces complete, many of them affiliating with Céspedes.
It is stated on good authority that neither Gen. Lee nor any noted Confederate official will attend the Gettysburg identification meeting. Confederate Generals avoid the meeting because they are apprehensive of disagreement regarding numbers, position, and relative valor.
Negroes implicated in outraging a lady near Front Royal, Va., were hung by citizens.
Objections to the Gettysburg identification meeting are absence of corps commanders; Longstreet is in New Orleans, A. P. Hill is dead, Ewell from loss of leg and health unable to travel, and Stewart, commanding cavalry, is dead, without the presence of these officers a correct identification is impossible.

TEXAS ITEMS.

THE BRENHAM BANNER of the 18th says cotton is beyond all danger now, save the danger of getting hands to pick it.

The Banner says Washington county is ready to commence picking the largest cotton crop she ever raised and will not compromise on a single pound under twenty thousand bales.

The La Grange Democrat thinks 2500 bales of cotton a large estimate for the loss by the late overflow in Fayette county; The Democrat believes that county will make 7500 bales. No worms reported in that county.

THE STOCKDALE beef-packing company began slaughtering today, the 19th inst. They will kill one thousand beefs to start on for an experiment.

THE BANNER says the worms are said to be destroying what cotton the floods left in the Colorado bottom above La Grange.

MAN KILLED.—Deputy Sheriff G. S. Grange, from Independence, writes us that a man, name unknown was shot and killed near J. D. Fishop's place in the Gay hill neighborhood, last Friday, for stealing two horses from G. W. Sheppard. The coroner's jury found the killing to have been done by Zion Barton, and a warrant for his arrest was in the hands of Mr. Grange.—Brenham Banner, 17th.

TEN men were arrested in Montgomery and brought to Navasota on Saturday last. They were taken to Bryan, where they will be tried by the military commission now sitting there, for the murder of the brother Jones. One of the prisoners is the sheriff, by military appointment, of Montgomery county. The services of Messrs. Boone, of Montgomery, and Col. Shannon of Navasota have been secured. A writ of habeas corpus will be issued, and the prisoners be brought to Navasota before Judge Caldwell.

Lay a Fainting Person Down

Says a physician in Heath and Home.

It is surprising how eagerly every body rushes at a fainting person, and strives to raise him up, especially to keep the head erect. There must be an instinctive apprehension that if a person seized with a fainting or other fit fall into the recumbent position, death is more imminent. I must have driven a mile to-day while a lady, fainting, was held upright. I found her pulseless, white and apparently dying, and I believe if I had delayed ten minutes longer she would really have died.

"Always remember this fact—namely, fainting is caused by a want of blood in the brain; the heart ceases to act with sufficient force to send the usual amount of blood to the brain, and hence the person loses consciousness because the function of the brain ceases. Restore the blood to the brain, and instantly the person recovers. Now, though the blood is propelled to all parts of the body by the action of the heart, yet it is still under the influence of the laws of gravitation.

In the erect position the blood ascends to the head against gravitation, and the supply to the brain is diminished, as compared with the recumbent position, the heart's pulsation being equal. If, then, you place a person in a sitting position whose heart has nearly ceased to beat, his brain will fail to receive the blood, while if you lay him down with the head lower than the heart blood will run into the brain by the mere force of gravity, and in fainting, in sufficient quantity to restore consciousness. Indeed, nature teaches us how to manage fainting persons, for they always fall, and frequently are at once restored by the recumbent position into which they are thrown.

ABOUT thirty years ago, a few citizens of New Baintree, in Massachusetts, met together and resolved that the best interests of the town required a tavern into which spirituous liquors should not be sold, as the fact was patent to all that too many of the young men in the place would congregate at the "village inn," and were forming habits of social drinking.
