SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

LONDON, August 21.

Thirteen hundred stores and three hundred dwellings burned in Jamaica, Turkey. The Times in discussing the changes in the French government, says the Emperor Napoleon after persisting over the destiny of France for seventeen years, and after doing much to make up for the loss of the liberties of France will do well if by restoring those liberties he proves that concessions during the remainder of his reign may prove a pledge to that of his son and that there will be no lack of opportunities for the French to atone themselves to regard the son as the natural heir instead of the father.

MEXICO, Aug 14.
Pinolo Vega is on the Guadalupe with 1000 men.

The conductor coming in with a million and a half in specie for export on the Vera Cruz railroad, was attacked near Parris and plundered of \$50,000.

Havana, Aug 22.
Deroda reviewed the troops at Matanzas and who expressed their willingness to go into active service.

Four hundred rebels are devastating the country. A convoy with detachment of 80 strong left Puerto Padre for Los Tunas encountered rebels twice, with severe fighting. Nothing known, but report says the country reached Los Tunas.

WASHINGTON, August 22.
Cubans have the following advice: Volunteers are exhibiting purposes of their organization, that of wresting the Island from Spain. Every where throughout the Island the volunteer juntas are in concert with chiefs at Havana. Deroda is under the same control which expelled Dulce from the island.

It is reported that a formidable organization of Spaniards in the interest of Céspedes government as against the volunteers has been exposed by a spy.

MADRID, Aug 22.
It is asserted on reliable authority that preliminaries for the possession of Cuba have been signed.

WASHINGTON, August 22.
Cubans have dates to the 13th. Jordan had a running fight that lasted the whole day; the Cubans lost about 150 killed and wounded, the Spanish loss reported much greater. In this fight the Cubans were dislodged from their camp, but rallied and finally drove the Spaniards off.

Revenue \$700,000.

It is stated Bailey Peyton advocates the election of Andrew Johnson to the Senate from Tenn.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug 23.
No rain since August 4th, and all reports agree that corn is suffering throughout the State.

Council appropriated \$25,000 for families of canal boatmen detained by low water.

PARIS, August 23.
The La France says: However painful it may be for Spain to accept the suggested solution of the Cuban difficulty, there is no other plan possible. It is the only way for Spain to save some fragments of the wreck. The value and duration of Cuban independence under protection of America

is another question. The desire of absorption which characterizes the Americans qualify them very badly to perform the part of a platonic protection, and it is very probable that they are trying to bring about the second edition of the history of Texas.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.
Col. Rafael Quesada, brother of the commanding General of Cubans, arrived in New York in the Arizona from Aspinwall.

Quesada reached Jamaica a month since from Cuba in a sailing vessel. Quesada is bearer of important dispatches; he gives a gloomy account of the situation of the patriots, and says 42,000 are in the field, and 35,000 more armed by the middle of Sept. The slaves are volunteering by thousands; they are willing to work in trenches and camp, procuring and cooking all provisions, giving armed troops the entire time for drilling and discipline.

How the Japanese Women Bathe What will Mrs. Grundy Say!

A correspondent of the New York World, who has been visiting Yokohama, describes a visit to one of the native bath houses there:

Here, open to the street, as usual, we found the place to be a large square room, with the floor raised about two feet from the ground, and a partition about two feet high, running through the center. On one side of the room, in the costume of Mother Eve before she studied pomology, were collected from fifty to seventy women and girls, and, on the other side, perhaps thirty men and boys, clad in a curtailed pattern of the famous Georgian major's airy suit, but of that even the shirt collar and spurs were wanting. The old joke about a wet nurse in a bath house was here partially realized.

Some dozen native dryads, whom I took to be the owners of the lavatory temple, were scouring the dark-haired, rosy minds with large bunches of paper, while others poured water over them from a well in the center of the room by means of wooden dippers with long handles. The ceaseless din and chattering of the nymphs under the process was absolutely deafening. Far from feeling any sense of shame by the presence of their own countrymen, who were enjoying the bath in company, they gave not the slightest thought or attention to the number of foreigners who were looking on. Perhaps, like the poet's chivalrous defense of Lady Godiva, I ought to say that they were clothed in an unconsciousness of immodesty, it being a custom to which they are habituated from infancy.

Corned Beef.

The pickle should be made as follows: To six gallons of water add nine pounds of pure salt, three pounds of brown sugar, one quart of molasses, three ounces of saltpetre, and one ounce of pearlash. Let these ingredients be boiled and carefully skimmed as long as impurities from the sugar and salt continue to rise to the surface. "Knickerbocker pickle—just what everybody knew before," you say. But wait a moment, and see if we don't tell you something you did not know before. When the water is ready to receive the rest of the material, pour in the saltpetre only, and when dissolved and the water boiling, dip your beef, piece by piece into the boiling saltpetre water, holding it for a few seconds only in the hot bath. When the beef has all thus been immersed, and become quite cool, pack it in the cask where it is to remain. Then proceed with your pickle as at first directed, and when perfectly cold, pour it upon the meat, which should be kept down by a cover and stone.

The immersing of the beef in hot saltpetre water contracts the surface by closing the pores, and prevents the juices of meat from going out into the pickle. The saltpetre absorbed by the contracted or cooked surfaces will modify the salt that passes through it, the whole producing the most perfect result.

Beef cured in this manner will preserve its color, and cut almost as juicy and inviting as a fresh roast. It is as unlike the hard, blue, briny, knotted substance sold at markets, and frequently cured at home, mis-called "corned beef," as a sirloin differs from a steak cut three inches back of the horns, and sold for porter-house. Try it and see.—N. E. Farmer.

A Call for a District Convention

A Republican Convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Legislature, will be held in San Antonio on the 4th Monday in September next, (the 27th). The District is composed of the counties of Bexar, Wilson, Comal, Kendall, Blanco, Burnett, Llano, Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Banderas, Edwards, Kimball and Menard. In accordance with the registered vote, these counties will be entitled to the following representation, to-wit: Bexar, 11 Delegates. Wilson, 2 " Comal, 5 " Kendall, 1 " Blanco, 1 " Burnett, 2 " Llano, 1 " Mason, Kimball, Menard, Edwards, 1 " Gillespie, 3 " Kerr, 1 " Banderas, 1 " The Republicans of the District are requested to hold meetings prior to the date of the Convention, and select representatives to the Convention, which will assemble in accordance with the above call. At said convention one Senator and four Representatives will be chosen. By authority of the EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Free Press to the Germans

The Free Press of August 24th publishes an address to the German citizens of the 29th District, in regard to the nomination of candidates for the next Legislature. Taking the registration of 1867 as the only feasible base upon which to calculate the probable vote of the district, the Free Press arrives at the following statistical statement: The 29th district, composed of the counties of Bexar, Comal, Blanco, Wilson, Kendall, Banderas, Kerr, Gillespie, Mason, (Kimball, Menard and Edwards, attached to Mason), and Llano, polls a total vote of 4128, out of which 3438 are white and 640 colored; in respect to nationality, the vote stands 1753 Germans, 1300 Americans, (Irish and English included), and 315 Mexicans. The reason why the German vote of this district overbalances that of any other nationality, so far as even to secure to it a majority of the white vote, is simply, that besides the county of Bexar, being largely

populated by Germans, the District embraces the three counties of Kendall, Gillespie, and Comal, the population of which are almost exclusively German, so much so that the two last named counties alone put nearly one thousand voters in the field. Another reason is, that the counties mostly settled by Americans are situated on the extreme frontier and consequently sparsely populated. Based on the principle that figures tell as the best of arguments, the Free Press takes strong grounds in recommending to the Germans of the 29th District to earnestly press their claims in the next election for representation by German Legislators.

To justify this claim and the necessity for German Representatives, the Free Press goes into an elaborate review of the question of Temperance Legislation, Sunday laws, and Immigration. It argues that the German Constituency of the District cannot trust the questions cited, so important to the German interests, but in the hands of men of their own nationality. The article goes on to show that in addition to the reasons given, the Germans, from a moral point of view are compelled to insist upon carrying their just claims, it being a well established fact and beyond any shade of contradiction, that in the political as well as in the moral life of man only self-esteem and self-reliance will make a man esteemed by others, while knavish submission which always shows a lack of moral courage will put the rights of a man under the foot of the more daring, to be trampled upon.

The article finally winds up with an historical sketch of what German industry and energy, German muscle and brains have done in making San Antonio and Western Texas what they really are. It weighs justly the merits of the Germans of the 29th District putting into the balance their patriotism, and firm allegiance to the Union even in the darker hours of the rebellion, when treason was at a high premium and loyalty rather dangerous. We hope the German Republicans of the District will respond to the appeal of the Free Press and at the convention to be held in this city on the 27th of September come forward and secure the proper persons to represent them.

Call for a District Convention.

In another place will be found a call for a District convention. The importance of such a convention cannot be overestimated; our District will need good, and able men in the next Legislature to guard and advance its interests; and the only way to give every portion a fair hearing in the selection of candidates is to call a Convention. A Convention means organization, and consequently it will meet the active opposition of the conservative or Hamilton Coalition party, whose only hope is in the confusion arising from want of organization. No matter is more important to the material welfare of this part of Texas than the securing of able and good representatives, in order that our inequality in point of numerical strength in a Legislature elected mostly from Eastern and Middle Texas, may not be so keenly felt. In order to be effective our Representation should be a unit politically, which increases the necessity for a Republican convention and a straight out Republican ticket. We say to the true men of the District, let us move forward promptly in this matter, and success will crown our work.

MANY of our countrymen will remember Count Francis Pulszky, who came among us as secretary to Kosuth, and who, after his return to Europe, was for years a correspondent of the Tribune—the best informed with regard to events transpiring in Eastern Europe that we ever had. The "whirligig of Time" has wrought quite a change in his fortunes. He is now reconciled to the Government, has had his large estates (formerly confiscated) restored him, is right-hand man of Desak, the Hungarian Premier, and (we see) was spokesman of the Hungarian deputation at Vienna on Friday. Let those who are unlucky to-day trust in to-morrow.

THE bank of England's system of mysterious and almost imperceptible dots, varying upon each note, and known only to the officers of the bank, might be advantageously adopted in this country. The ten dollar greenbacks have such a dot, which seems to be the principal sign by which the genuine bill is distinguished from the counterfeit. If this system should be generally adopted, counterfeiters would be almost impossible.

DR. HOLLAND, writing from Venice to the Springfield Republican, says: "We were busy every day in our explorations of the canals, visiting many of the churches and all the principal picture galleries. One bright moonlight night we took two gondolas, and devoting the evening to such enjoyment as riding through these grandeur, and singing by the way, could afford. I do not think that those who participated in that night's entertainment will soon forget it. We went up to the Grand Canal, under the Rialto, into the side canals, under the shadows of the old churches everywhere that fancy dictated. At last, after singing ourselves hoarse, we turned the gondolas homeward, and were going quietly down the Grand Canal, when we met another party in a large gondola. We were not long in recognizing our American friend, Cyrus W. Field, who, with his party, was enjoying the moonlight and the water. The gondoliers brought the three boats alongside each other, then tied them together and let them float. And then in the moonlight we chatted and sang. We sang at the top of our voices the 'Star Spangled Banner,' and 'waved' it as long and as loudly as we could. 'Off in the Stilly Night' met the warm approval of the gondoliers at least; but John Brown's Body brought down the house. We sang 'Glory, Glory, Hallelujah' in a way that will not be forgotten in Venice. The next day we heard it all around us. Our own gondoliers had caught the grand refrain completely, and were singing it at all times and everywhere."

Virginia Legislature—Gen. Canby's Proclamation—The Iron-rod Oath

RICHMOND, August 14.—It is stated on good authority that Gen. Canby will, within ten days, issue a proclamation convening the Legislature, applying the iron-rod oath to the members, and when they cannot take the oath their seats will be given to candidates who received the next highest votes

THERE was a duel in Cohoes, New York, the other day. The seconds kindly drew the balls before the fire, which was peacefully delivered. But at the instant of firing, one of the seconds threw a small pebble against the breast of his principal's opponent, who, supposing he was fatally wounded, fainted and fell. The other, seeing the effect of his shot, dropped his weapon and fled to the woods, and has not since been seen. The man who fell recovered soon afterward, and upon inquiry was told that his antagonist had been killed by his shot, and his mortal remains were then reposing beneath the last "survivor," and he also fled to parts unknown.
