JACKSON, August 24  
The canvass has opened in Mississippi, J. E. Williams, well known conservative colored orator from Tennessee, and S. W. Maraway, colored, from Va., are here at work for the Conservatives. Judge Jeffords and Williams to-day published a list of appointments to address the people.

**Texas Items.**  
**DROVE OF TEXAS CATTLE CAPTURED BY INDIANS.**—The Jackson Clarion is advised by Mr. W. A. S. Cooper of Water Valley, Miss., that he and Messrs. Holloway and Reade sustained a heavy loss on the 30th ult., in the capture near Fort Atchison, Kansas by the Indians, of their large drove of cattle and mules, which they had purchased in Texas, and which were being driven to the California market.  
A gentleman has just returned to Lavaca from a trip into the interior as far as Austin, and tells the Commercial that from all the information he could gather, he concludes that the average yield of the cotton crop, notwithstanding the floods, will exceed the production of last year.  
The Heamstead Countryman of the 12th learns that Reuben Harris, Theodore Boyd, Lenius Jones, Jack Hays, Mr. Heffin and two sons are the names of the citizens of Montgomery county arrested by the military, on the charge of being implicated in the hanging of the Jones brothers. Other parties, supposed to have been the head persons, have gotten out of the way.  
**MAN KILLED.**—Deputy Sheriff

George S. Grange, from Independence, writes to the Brenham Banner that a man, name unknown was shot and killed near J. D. Bishop's place, in the Gay Hill neighborhood last Friday, for stealing two horses from G. W. Sheppard. The Coroner's jury found the killing to have been done by Zion Barton, and a warrant for his arrest was in the hands of Mr. Grange.  
**RETURNED.**—We learn that some of the men who went in pursuit of the escaped thieves, mentioned in our last, have returned, having pursued the fugitives for some distance down the Brazos, where they entered the cedar brakes, which it is said is infested by a band of thieves numbering about sixty. One of the pursuing party, we learn, entered the brakes and obtained valuable information of their number and precise whereabouts. The citizens and military, cooperating together, will not long permit even the cedar jungles to afford them an asylum.—Waxahatchie Argus.

The far-famed race horse, Rebel, arrived here on Sunday evening looking the very pink of perfection and beauty. He was taken to the stables of our fellow-citizen, ex-Governor Askey, four miles from town, where he is to be put in proper training for the fall races in San Antonio, which come off in October. Rebel, we believe, is a "native Texian," having been raised by Mr. Harper, of Lavaca county, and has not probably his superior in a two mile heat. Last Spring he was entered in the Houston races against those two formidable competitors, Gen. Ewell, of Mobile, and Bismarck, of New Orleans, beating the former three mile heats and the latter two mile heats.—Gonzales Inquirer.

**MORE KILLING.**—On Tuesday morning last, a man named Harrington rode up to the house of Henry Boren, called him out, and after interchanging a few words, each fired on the other, Boring firing with a pistol and Harrington with a shotgun. Harrington's shot took effect in the head of Boren, producing death in six or eight hours. Boren's son, a lad 10 or 12 years of age, seized his father's pistol and fired at Harrington as he was making off, striking him in the back. Henry Boren's father accompanied by a boy followed the wounded man and trailed him by the blood to a patch of brush, when Harrington again fired, breaking the boy's thigh. The brush was subsequently searched and Harrington found dead.  
The difficulty is said to have originated in an attempt on the part of Henry Boren to implicate Harrington in some horse stealing that has been going on in that neighborhood. Harrington was a son-in-law of Henry Boren's brother, and we learn, connected in no way whatever with the Lee party.—McKinney Inquirer, 14th inst.

We have received a letter giving an account of the late shooting affair at Nacogdoches on the 7th, but as it is not accompanied by a responsible name we cannot publish it. The Rusk Observer has an item of the same affair, which was a private difficulty of long standing. Several parties were engaged. The Observer says:  
Fifteen shots were exchanged. Young Richard Whitaker received a mortal wound. Burroughs received five wounds—three in the arm, one in the right breast—the last a serious, though not considered a mortal wound. Crane received an accidental flesh wound in the leg. He did not participate in the fight. None of the parties have yet been arrested. There are no civil officers in the county of Nacogdoches, though there is a company of Federal soldiers stationed there.

Cotton-picking has now fairly commenced in the vicinity of Hempstead. The Countrymen hears of hands picking 125 pounds per day. No serious damage by the worms as yet, and hopes are entertained that none will be done.  
The Republican of the 18th learns that on the 15th Mr. Costly, living on Ryans ranch about fifteen miles from Austin was accidentally shot and killed by Geo. Wason.
