Washington, D. C. Aug. 14th, 1869.

It is well understood in Texas, and better known here, and no doubt fully realized by Gen. HUMBOLDT'S ANNIVERSARY.—At a meeting held at the Casino Hall on Thursday evening, the 20th day of August, the following Societies were represented: The Casino Society, Commercial Club, Workmen's Association, Fire Company No. 1, the Turnverein, the Singing Association of Messrs. Thielmann and Plagge, the City Band, English-German School, and schools of Messrs. Plagge and Meier. Not present, but invited: Fire Company No. 3, Kraiden Kasson-verein, the school of Mr. Mueller.


