WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.  
Southern Radical Representatives and Senators are stopped in their clamor for removal by the appropriation bill of 1867, forbidding assessments for political purposes or removal from office for political opinions, under penalty of removal from office of persons making exactions or ordering the removal. Several persons removed in violation of this law, have been restored.  
Supervisor Starwood, of Alabama wants to send several of his inspectors to the Penitentiary.

**To the Citizens of Western Texas.**  
As an erroneous impression has, through the misrepresentation of certain journals of the State gotten abroad, respecting Jack Helm, and those co-operating with him to arrest and bring to justice thieves and desperadoes who have been holding high carnival for years in our midst, I take this opportunity of saying to the people, that Jack Helm is acting under the highest authority in the State (orders from Military Headquarters.) He seeks to molest no one—to the honest law abiding citizen he offers protection. For those thieves who have been deprecatating upon the stock interests of the country with impunity he has orders to arrest and bring them to justice. That this will be done, and effectually done their is no doubt. Fellow citizens, this is the last resort—Grand Juries have failed to accuse and the law has been impotent to convict in multitudes of cases. As citizens of the country we are interested in the suppression of crime, whether we are stock raisers or not; that you will respond with alacrity to assist me, I ask no further guarantee for the future than your conduct in the past.  
My men are kept under control, and no citizen can complain of the least injury at our hands. I labor for the supremacy of the law without compensation or reward; and when the robbers are brought to justice, the majesty of the law vindicated, when honesty and industry can receive the fruits of its labors, I will be repaid for all, in the knowledge that I have done my duty.  
Hoping fellow citizens, that you will now understand me, I subscribe myself your obedient servant.

The public debt, under Secretary Boutwell's common-sense financial management, continues steadily to decrease. Already nearly fifty millions of dollars have been paid off since the inauguration of General Grant as President. It is Secretary Boutwell's purpose to pay off, if he can, one hundred millions of dollars of the debt each year, so that, by the end of President Grant's term of office, the debt will have been reduced four hundred millions of dollars, or about one sixth. At this rate, if it shall be maintained, the entire debt can be paid off in twenty-five years, or less; and at the same time, the rate of taxation be steadily reduced in proportion as the population and wealth of the Republic increases. Indeed, the same rate of taxation will suffice, if maintained, it is believed, to pay off the entire debt in about fifteen years, or less. But as the debt grows less and interest less annually, while our population and wealth increase, we can raise a national revenue equal or superior to that we now raise, and yet steadily reduce the rate of taxation. In order to reduce the debt, and pay current expenses now, absolutely requires more money than will be required five years hence; while, five years hence, if we continue to grow and prosper, a less rate of taxation will produce a larger national revenue annually. By the end of President Grant's term, therefore, if all goes on as well as now seems probable, the country will be comparatively lightly taxed, and yet rapidly reducing its debt; while by the end of the succeeding President's term, if our finances continue to be as wisely managed as at present, our national rate of taxation will once more be lighter than that of any other people in the civilized world, with a rapidly diminishing debt, and the prospect of speedily being, as we were before the late rebellion, a nation almost free from national taxation, and only feeling the strength of its Government through the blessings it secures, and not through any burdens it imposes. By that time, too, we shall be one of the most mighty nations of the earth in the number of our population; and, probably, the most powerful in military and financial strength.—Detroit Post.

We therefore say to all matrons, in reply to the above query, if you will allow us:—Teach, instruct and train your daughters diligently, faithfully and persistently in all they shall need to know when they become wives, to wit; to be good housekeepers. These are plain words to be sure, yet we are confident that no mother will, nor daughter can, successfully controvert them.

Call for Primary Meetings in the 29th District.

By order of the Republican State Executive Committee, and in conformity with a call for a District Convention to meet at San Antonio on the 4th Monday in September, the 27th of September, 1869, the counties forming the 29th District are hereby called upon to hold primary meetings for the purpose of electing delegates to said District Convention.

Registration.

The most important preliminary to the coming election is the Registration of the voters of the State. In fact the cause of Reconstruction depends upon this Registration and we have no doubt but our military Commander is now perfecting his arrangements to carry it out properly.

All depends upon proper Boards of Registration.

Men who know the spirit and intent of the Reconstruction law, and have the courage and desire to enforce it. It may be urged that the appointment of radical loyal men would be too plainly partial and one-sided.

An appeal is always open to the military commander, where parties consider themselves aggrieved.

In the coming Registration the Boards must be made of stern material, as there will be a desperate attempt on the part of those who were refused at the last Registration, to register; oaths will be no barrier, and the Registrars must be continually on the watch to keep out persons who will insist upon taking the oath.

The appointment of mixed Boards, that is, mixed in politics, with a military officer to preside, as was done in Virginia, would in our opinion be disastrous in Texas.
