SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

LONDON, August 31.
The favorable weather during the past
week has assured abundant crops through-
out the British Islands.

PARIS, Aug. 31.
Don Carlos has embarked for England,
he has abandoned, for the present, the at-
tempt to provoke a rising in Spain.

A dispatch from Ajaccio announces that
the Empress is indisposed, the Prince alone
will assist at the festivities in honor of
Napoleon first.

The French journals have received copies
of a manifesto inciting to insurrection,
signed, President de Committee Brues.

A note from the American Legation pro-
nounces the story of the conspiracy on the
Sabine, utterly unfounded.

Advices from Paraguay announce that
the installation of the Provisional govern-
ment meets with many obstacles, render-
ing doubtful the probability of the scheme
for the pacification of the country. Lopez
holds position of great strength in the
Cordillera mountains, and the want of
provisions compels the allied army to re-
main inactive.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 31.
Thirty thousand troops are concentrat-
ing for review in honor of the Empress
Eugenie.

HAVANA, Aug. 31.
The journals discredit the reports of
proposals of the United States to Spain
for the separation of Cuba from the moth-
er country, but declare, if such proposals
are made, they can have but one possible
result—refusal.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1.
The Continental Hotel was saved. The
Club stable on Broad street was burned, 30
horses were burned.

The Imperial Insurance company paid
one hundred thousand dollars on whiskey
recently burned, and will in a few days
pay two hundred thousand more.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.
Senter and Stokes are both here. The
President leaves to-night to be absent two
weeks, when he will return and remain.

Dent has departed for Mississippi.
The debt statement shows a decrease of
debt of five and a half millions, the state-
ment includes eleven millions for pensions.

TEXAS ITEMS.

A peddler named Franks was mur-
dered in Walker county last Satur-
day week. The son of Mr. Burk
Randolf and a young man named
Blackburn, of Madison county, are im-
plicated; the latter is a fugitive
and the former in jail. Neither of
them, the item says, are over seven-
teen years old.

The Waco Register says the diffi-
culty in Bell county seem to be ap-
proaching a climax; On Tuesday
Col. Johnson dispatched a squad of
soldiers from Waco to the assistance
of the sheriff and posse of Bell county.
The rumor is that the remnant
of the McKee party are recruiting
and organizing in that county.

A cattle drover has just returned
from Abilene, Kansas, and informs
the Waco Register that when he left
Abilene, three weeks since, there
were about 100,000 head of cattle at
that place, and that the market was
extremely dull. The average selling
price was about \$20 for beef cattle.
He says that about the last of Octo-
ber the several beef packers will
go up.

The Waco papers learn that John
C. Sneed, late Sheriff of Hill county,
was shot and mortally wounded a
few days since at Mt. Calm, Lime-
stone county, by a man named Alex.
Bell. No particulars.

The Bonham News, 21st, says that
in a family difficulty between Henry
Boren and his nephew, they both
were killed.

The Brenham Banner of Friday
says cotton picking is in full blast,
and tells Houston and Galveston to
look out for 20,000 bales from Wash-
ington.

The Banner mentions as a speci-
men of good farming that Col. Sam

Williams and one of his sons have
this year cultivated twenty seven
acres of cotton and fourteen acres in
corn, and besides having the very
best corn in the county, he claims
that he will gather exactly twenty-
seven bales of cotton and that he
will exhibit the bale that takes the
premium at the Washington county
fair.

The Brenham Enquirer mentions
the arrival of sixty additional peni-
tentiary convicts to work on the
air-line railroad.

True Chivalry.

Chivalry does not appear to have
died with slavery; for true chivalry
never lived with it. The Life Sav-
ing Benevolent Society, of New
York, have presented a gold medal
to Midshipman T. B. M. Mason, of
New York, for his gallant exploit it
saving from drowning two of the
enlisted men of his ship, the Guar-
riere, in the harbor of Rio Janeiro,
at the risk of his own life. In hand-
ing the token to Mr. Mason, Henry
Ward Beecher said:

"Without stopping to ask, 'Am I
not better than these men? Is not
my life better than theirs? but
prompted alone by a pure feeling of
generosity, you plunged into the
waves twice, and would have done
it a third time had you not been re-
strained by those around you. By
this noble act you saved two valu-
able lives. That, sir, was a manly
deed—a thoroughly manly deed—
and this is not the end of it; for all
men, through all time, are made
better when they see or hear of a
manly action. It is my duty to ex-
press the high sense of respect en-
tertained by your fellow-citizens for
your distinguished act."

Midshipman Mason, by his noble
deed, has won a place in the hearts
of all men far above that which
even an admiral's uniform could
gain him.—Springfield (Illinois)
Journal.

THE SUNFLOWER A CURE FOR FEVER AND AGUE.—M. Martin, in a paper read before the Therapeutic Society of France, states as a proved fact that the common sun- flower possesses the faculty of free- ing the atmosphere of the animal and vegetable germs supposed to constitute the miasma productive of fever and ague. He says the ex- periment has proved successful in the low districts, near Rochefort, and that the Dutch have proved its value in neutralizing the noxious ef- fects of marshy exhalations. The sunflower has long been appreciated as a fattener of poultry, and sup- plying food for bees, etc., and many people cultivate them chiefly for that purpose. But if M. Martin's theory be correct, we expect to see it more largely cultivated, especial- ly in the low-lying districts, and the homely-looking flower will be blessed by thousands, who look with horrid anticipation for the return of their regular "shaking day."

Mr. HOWELL, of the Atlantic who
sketches "Jubilee Days" in the Au-
gust number, pays the following well-
deserved tribute to Madame Parepa-
Rosa:

"What helped more than anything
else to restore you your dispersed
and wandering individuality was the
singing of Parepa-Rosa, as she tri-
umphed over the harmonious rivalry
of the orchestra. There was some-
thing in the generous amplitude and
robust cheerfulness of this great art-
ist that accorded well with the ideal
of the occasion; she was in herself
a great musical festival; and one felt,
as she floated down the stage with
her far spreading white draperies,
and swept the audience a colossal
cortage, that here was the embodied
genius of the jubilee. I do not trust
myself to speak particularly of her
singing for I have the natural mod-
esty of people who know nothing
about music, and I have not at com-
mand the phraseology of those who
pretend to understand it; but I say
that her voice filled the whole edifice
with delicious melody, that it sooth-
ed, and composed and utterly en-
chanted, that though two hundred
violins accompanied her, the greater
sweetness of her note prevailed over
all, like a mighty will commanding
many. What a sublime ovation for
her when a hundred thousand hands
thundered her acclaim! A victorious
general, as accepted lover, a suc-
cessful young author—these know
a measure of bliss, I dare say; but in
one throbs the singer's heart, as it
leaps in exultation at the loud do-
light of her applause thousands,
must out-echo them all. Let me

lay these poor little artificial flowers
of rhetoric at the feet of the diving
singer, as a faint token of gratitude
and eloquent intention."

Thrifty Colored Men.

The papers all over the South bear
evidence to the thrift and industry
of the colored men who have so late-
ly been emancipated. The cry that
the negroes in a state of freedom
would be a careless, improvident
set, has been abandoned long ago.

The Augusta (Ga.) Constitutionalist
gives the following statement, show-
ing what industry may do:

Six colored men, engaged on the
plantation of Mr. Joshua Key, in
Burke county, came to this city,
and, backed by this gentleman, drew
money enough on their fine pros-
pective crop from one of our cotton
factors to purchase from Messrs.
Wymon & May six new buggies,
with all appurtenances, one of them
a two-horse vehicle. To these vehi-
cles they each hitched their own
mules, animals which evidenced by
their sleek appearance the faithful
care they received, and drove from
the city, an illustration of what in-
dustry, good behavior and thrift will
accomplish for the colored, as well
as the white man. Here is an ex-
ample worthy of imitation by the
many idle and misguided colored
men who congregate around the
towns and cities, living from hand
to mouth.

THE Chinese visitors to New York
are thus described: "Mr. Chey-
Chew is a young man of about
twenty-five years of age, but his
companion is forty-three. Both
are polished in manner, and speak
English fluently. They wear loose-
fitting blue flannel suits, buttoning
close to the chin and cut in the
Oriental style. Their heads are
closely shaven, except at the crown,
from which depends the inevitable
pig-tail, so dear to the Chinaman."

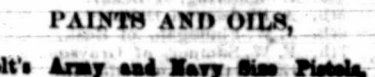
