#### Letter from Col. Murphy in relation to the City Suits, &c.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Aug. 28th, 1869. Editor of the San Autonio Express.

SIR:-My attention has been called to an article in your weekly paper of the 26th inst., beaded "The last effort to remove Mayor Thielepape The railroad ring, &c." As this contract was made with me, I will in as few words as possible, give you the exact facts connected with the same.

While in attendance on the District Court of your county, in March last, defending the city of San Antonio in the railroad coupon cases, the city authorities in council assembled, requested my opinton and views about these Coupon and Bond cases, which I gave them. It was only then for the first time, and without the knowledge of General Davis, who was then in Washington, that the City Coneell, actuated by the conviction of the stupendous fraud perpetrated on the tax payers of the city; because convinced of the necessity of action on the part of the city to get rid of these Bonds and Coupons, which is well understood to create an apparent liability on the part of the city for bonds and coupons amounting to about three hundred thousand dollars, to be paid by the tax payers of the city of San Antonio, without having received one dollar' worth of consideration therefor. It was then that the city council made the contract with me, of which General Davis knew nothing, por ever heard of until his return from Washington. He had nothing to do with this contract further than being my law partner.

As for Mr. Newcomb, I have not the hon or of his acquaintance. I never met him that I know of He certainly knew no more of this contract than General Davis. Now, sir, as to the contract, or the fee to be paid by the city of San Antonio, perhape your tax payers can better see the difference between aix thousand dollars and three hundred thousand; possibly five hundred thousand would be a closer estimate, from the large number of suits and the expenses attendant on them, heretofore brought by the bond and coupon holders against your city.
