## TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

**BOSTON, Sept. 10.**  
Severe storm lasted throughout New England and many lives and vessels were lost. Every description of vessel dragged their anchor, and drifted.

**HAVANA, Sept. 10.**  
Lopez left the city with a battalion 400 strong. Spaniards put insurgents to flight in Sevilla bay. Thirty rebels killed in skirmish near Riamof.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.**  
Sherman assumes Secretaryship of War to-morrow.  
Revenue nearly a million.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 10.**  
Frontier question between Turkey and Persia is settled. Viceroy of Egypt submits to the demands of the Sultan, all points except budget. The great powers will use all efforts to prevent the Sultan pushing matters to extremes.

**LONDON, September 10.**  
The Post says the Pope is about making great efforts to convert American negroes. Two hundred of them studying for the priesthood.

**MADRID, Sept. 10.**  
Disturbances have been quelled, city and country tranquil.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.**  
Semi-official letter via Key West, says Quesada with three hundred men on a reconnaissance towards Las Tunas, which were attacked, but succeeded in reaching main body with a loss of 35 killed and wounded.

On the 18th Valmaseda attacked the Cuban position, first with artillery, making but little impression, the infantry then followed. The Cubans reserved their fire for short range, and compelled Spaniards to seek shelter behind their artillery.

After three hours fighting, Valmaseda attacked the position with his entire force, reported by deserters to be more than 4000 strong, half of whom were regulars. Cuban force number about 6000, four thousand well armed. The contest lasted near five hours, when Valmaseda retreated to Las Tunas. Cuban loss 72 killed, including several officers, and 102 severely wounded, 150 slightly, 47 missing. Two hundred Spaniards dead and wounded left on the field. Cubans captured 270 prisoners. 400 deserters who report Valmaseda had all his available force in this engagement, with 37 pieces of artillery, some heavy, and two regiments of cavalry. Cubans had 30 pieces of small calibre, and no effectively equipped cavalry.

This battle is the first of importance since the commencement, and causes much rejoicing in the Cuban army.

A letter from Havana states that the government exercises most rigid surveillance over telegraph and mails.

Outrages are increasing fearfully and are of a character not to be believed.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.**  
Commissioners on the part of Great Britain and the United States, adjusted claims arising from the Oregon treaty.

Hudson Bay company gets \$450,000 against a claim of over four millions; Puget Sound company, \$250,000 against a claim of over one million. These companies are required to return to the United States all possessions and rights belonging to them in Oregon and Washington Territory. By this decision a very long controversy, which at times threatened to disturb amicable relations between the two countries, closed. Proceedings cover 3500 pages of printed matter.

## Religious Intelligence.

A son of Garibaldi lately graduated from the Episcopal Seminary in Boston. He has studied for the ministry, and expects to go back as a missionary to Italy.

The Rev. Dr. Spalding, who is 75 years of age, is the oldest living missionary of the American Board. He has been engaged in his holy work in Ceylon since 1812.

The Volunteer Committee, which has in hand the revision of the Prayer Book, has represented a preliminary report, which is condemned by the Episcopalian as not being radical enough in its changes, and as depending too closely on old forms of the rituals.

A Protestant association is formed in London under the auspices of Lord Harrowby to furnish qualified faithful nurses for the sick, employing only Christian women of every denomination.

Miss Hart, of the United Presbyterian Mission in Egypt, was lately burnt to death while trying to seal a can of petroleum. Two natives perished with her. She was a lady of deep and earnest piety, a converted Jewess. She had labored with much success in Cairo about twelve years.

It is reported in various provinces in China that the class of literary men is actively opposing Christianity, and inviting the masses of the people to persecute the missionaries and native converts.

While the funeral of Dr. Movers, a "beloved physician" of Plattsburg, N. Y., was in progress at the Presbyterian Church, of which he was a member, mass was recited for him in both the Catholic churches.

The Ecumenical Council will comprise 922 bishops and archbishops, of whom 600 belong to the Latin rite.

The whole Baptist Church in Germany has arisen from the Baptism of seven persons, at Hamburg, by Dr. Sears, in 1834.

Dr. Dollinger, the leading Roman Catholic theologian of Austria, has fallen under papal displeasure, and ecclesiastical proceedings have begun against him. He had severely attacked the Roman Courts, and threatened that the freemen of Germany might refuse to submit to the action of the coming council.

Enoch Parker, a colored school teacher of Bibb county, Georgia, organized a Sunday at Stone Creek Church twelve miles from town, in Twiggs county, the fourth Sunday in July last, with fourteen pupils and the second Sunday in August the school numbered 148 pupils. He has now three Sunday schools in charge, and a large day school.

A Call for a District Convention

A Republican Convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Legislature will be held in San Antonio on the 4th Monday in September next, (the 27th). The District is composed of the counties of Bexar, Wilson, Comal, Kendall, Blanco, Burnett, Llano, Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Benders, Edwards, Kimball and Menard.

Table listing delegates from various counties: Bexar (11), Wilson (2), Comal (5), Kendall (1), Blanco (1), Burnett (2), Llano (1), Mason, Kimball, Menard, Edwards (1), Gillespie (5), Kerr (1), Benders (1).

The Republicans of the District are requested to hold meetings prior to the date of the Convention, and select representatives to the Convention which will assemble in accordance with the above call. At said convention one Senator and four Representatives will be chosen.

Call for a Congressional Convention

A Republican Congressional Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress in the 4th Congressional District, will be held at the town of SEGUIN, on THURSDAY the 20th of SEPTEMBER, 1869.

The District comprises seven Senatorial and Representative Districts, and the delegates to the convention are apportioned in accordance with the representation allowed under the new Constitution, to wit: 24th District, comprising the counties of Calhoun, Jackson, Victoria, Refugio, San Patricio, Bee, Goliad and DeWitt, 4 delegates.

In all 29 delegates, who will meet in accordance with the above call. In order to facilitate the selection of the also apportioned delegates, a Senatorial Convention should be held in each District, at the most convenient place, at which candidates for the Legislature should be nominated and delegates to the Congressional convention appointed. These district conventions should be held on or before the 4th Monday in September. The points suggested in the Districts, to hold the conventions, are, for the 24th, Victoria; 25th, Columbus; 26th, LaGrange; 27th, Bolson; 28th, Austin; 29th, San Antonio; 30th, Corpus Christi.

Call for Primary Meetings in the 29th District.

By order of the Republican State Executive Committee, and in conformity with a call for a District Convention to be held at San Antonio on the 4th Monday in September, the 27th of September, 1869, the counties forming the 29th District are hereby called upon to hold primary meetings for the purpose of electing delegates to said District Convention.

The delegates to be elected to the number of delegates as set in the call for the District Convention. It is proposed that the primary meetings be held at the following time and places: In Bexar Co., at San Antonio, Sept. 25th. In Wilson " " Lodi, " 25th. In Comal " " New Braunfels, " 19th. In Kendall " " Boerne, " 12th. In Llano " " Llano city, " 15th. In Burnett " " Blanco, " 19th. In Mason " " Fort Mason, " 18th. In Gillespie Co., at Frederickburg, Sept. 19th.

In Kerr County, Kerrville, Sept. 19th. In Bandera " " Bandera city, " 18th. In Edwards, Kimball, Menard, " 18th. The county Executive Committees are ordered to make all necessary preparations for said meetings, and to see that delegates are properly elected. Where there are no county organizations, the Local Leagues are authorized to act in their stead. Only such Republicans as stand on the Platform of the Houston Convention, and intend to vote the Davis ticket, are called upon for said meeting.

Report of one of Gen. Reynolds Officers--Flakes Bulletin Coincides--Insidious Measures for the Overthrow of Loyalty in Texas.

Flakes Bulletin, in keeping with its uniform line of policy, finds another occasion to manifest its impartiality and illustrate its veracity in alluding to the late troubles in Fort Bend county. It says: "Shortly after the occurrence of the late disorders in Fort Bend county Gen. Reynolds sent a military officer of prudence and discretion to investigate and report upon the social condition of that section. A portion of his report has come to light and is appended to this paragraph. Its statements are startling and demand the most serious reflection. They are a sufficient comment unto themselves."

"Its statements are" as stupid as any other calumny or blunder which has been perpetrated by the rebels since the close of the rebellion or even during the rebellion. This military officer "of prudence and discretion" makes statements which the Bulletin would fain startle the whole country by pretending to endorse. Fortunately this veracious enquirer after truth, and the "social condition" of that section informs the public the precise manner in which he acquired his information, thus:

I have passed through nearly the whole length of Fort Bend county, and have made the personal acquaintance, and conversed with nearly every citizen of standing and respectability, and have familiarized myself with the condition of affairs generally and have arrived to this conclusion, viz: That the freedmen, as a general thing, are treated with more consideration and fairness, and that there is a firmer and more honest purpose and desire to conciliate them, and do them impartial justice, and a more faithful and rigid observance of the contracts made with them for labor than elsewhere, and they have very little occasion to find fault, or just cause to complain of their treatment; irregularities exist, but of minor importance and to no greater extent than arise everywhere between the employer and employee.

This is evidently a model county; and we are surprised that Gen. Reynolds should have wasted the money of the Government, to say nothing of the valuable time of this officer, in collecting information which any rebel in the county could have furnished at a moment's notice—quite as accurate and no less "startling".

"There is," says this discoverer of *mine's* nests, "among the Freedmen a feeling of uneasiness, a distrust of the white man, a desire to do some thing for which they have no precise knowledge) to convince every body that they are free".

They, the Freedmen, are an ungrateful set of scamps after the "consideration" with which they have been treated and the honest "purpose and desire" of the old planters to "conciliate" them and see that they have "impartial justice" meted out to them to require such advances by "distrust, and uneasiness" in look and manner saying *we will do something terrible but do not choose to say what, and in fact do not know.* But they are prepared for the worst. Listen to the preparations for a rising among the Freedmen which this energetic officer has unearthed. It is equal to any discovery ever made in the days of slavery by excited vigilance committee men when a victim was demanded:

Their idea of freedom being the right to do as they please at all times, under all circumstances, and the customs of the country notwithstanding. They are too much disposed to take the law into their own hands, as it results, they think, in more speedy justice. Perhaps they are not to be blamed for this, inasmuch as they have had a fearful and quite recent example set before them

by white men, viz: The hanging of May, the horse thief at Richmond, and through their utter ignorance of law, and inability to discriminate between right and wrong, are very likely to be led astray.

They require close watching, and should be handled with gloves on, the first aggressive act of a white man will instigate and excite them fearfully, I am perfectly satisfied that they are armed, they are thoroughly organized and bound by oath to smother each other defensively or offensively.

I am also satisfied that they "drift" particularly in the bottom in the Southeastern part of Fort Bend county, and Northwestern part of Bexar county, and that their organization extends through portions of Wharton and Matagorda counties. I do not apprehend any immediate danger of their uprising or resorting to violence, but they are strongly suspicious, and easily excited and have strange and fanciful ideas of freedom, and the rights of man, and are easily led and influenced by bad designing men, for evil purposes.

The reporter of "startling" discoveries does not apprehend "immediate danger of their uprising," but they are "suspicious" and easily "influenced by bad designing men"—This is the gist of the whole report. It is a studied and premeditated attack upon radicals, Freedmen and "carpet-baggers."

We wonder if Gen. Reynolds can be imposed upon by this sort of stuff? and whether he is employing the same class of discreet and prudent conservatives to seek out proper persons for Registrars for the different Districts? We have made diligent enquiry and cannot find that the General has ever conferred with any loyal man with respect to the status of candidates for these positions, while we have heard of petitions going up to Headquarters from rebel sources for the appointment of their friends on the boards. If this Fort Bend reporter has given satisfaction to the Commanding General, and is a fair sample of the officers being employed in the Registration business, the white man's party will not have any complaints to make of the want of fairness in revising the lists of voters.

THE JEFFERSON RADICAL.—We are glad to note that we receive regularly the Jefferson Radical; over which the Austin Republican and other Democratic papers preached funeral sermons a few weeks since.

ALMOST every rebel and rebel sympathizer has opposed the reunion at Gettysburg.

NINE thousand Chinese laborers have already been contracted for in South Carolina.

THERE is said to be no cure for red hair but death.

A MAN whose wife hung herself in his presence was asked why he did not prevent the tragedy, replied, "I cut her down three times last week, and I can't be always cutting her down."

"J. W. McC." an "ex-Conf." writes to the Chicago Tribune that he was three years a prisoner at Camp Douglas, and while there "I was better fed, clothed, and cared for generally than while I was in the Confederate ranks."

THE "debased negro rule" has forced the Charleston News to admit that "In 1869 'he twelve cotton States will show more true prosperity than any other section of the world.'" What next?

THE parents of the Hebrew maiden of the Rhine having withheld their permission to her marrying a young Christian, she drowned herself and her lover blew of his brains out. This tragedy occurred near Camb, a picturesque locality well known to tourists.

A Few weeks ago a fine-looking, fair-haired young man was sentenced to death by assizes of Naples. His name was Luigi Sala. He was a married man, and had been living for many years past on terms of intimate friendship with a young man, a playmate of his, who was likewise married. One day the two wives quarreled; the husbands interfered, commenced quarreling with one another, and Sala was stabbed by his friend in such a manner that he sank to the ground. The courts took notice of the affair, but the wounded man stubbornly refused to give the name of the person who had stabbed him, and so the matter was dropped. The friend who had wounded him, touched by his magnanimity, repeatedly begged his pardon. Sala, however, in reply, constantly uttered the following mysterious words: "Everything comes in due time." Several months elapsed in this manner. The criminal remained at a place of concealment, and Sala seems to have forgotten the whole affair. On All-Souls' Day, the 2d of November, however, Sala suddenly attacked his former friend with his knife exclaiming, "Vengeance! Vengeance!" he stabbed him seven times with it.

The stabbed man died. Sala fled to Egypt, but was arrested at Alexandria, and delivered up to the Italian authorities.

DOMESTIC RECIPES.

VERY AICO OIL. A very aico article is made by using one pound of bar soap containing olive oil; one pound of glycerine, one pint of alcohol, and one pint of water. Shake the soap fine, put the alcohol and water in a kettle over the fire, add the soap, and when dissolved and a greater part of the alcohol has been evaporated, add the glycerine. Continue stirring for two or three minutes, and add any perfume you like.

COMMON HARD SOAP. Seven pounds of soda, three of lime, four gallons of water, boil together till dissolved. Let this stand to settle, then pour off as long as any remains clear, add water to make four gallons. Boil this, adding four pounds of grease and two tablespoonfuls of borax; boil till thick. Take up and put away to cool.

PUT in an iron kettle five pounds unstacked lime, five pounds soda and three gallons of soft water; let it soak over night; in the morning pour off the water, then add to the water three and a half pounds of grease, boil till thick, turn into a pan until cool, and then cut in bars.

DRIED SCENT FOR DRAWERS. Half pound of lavender flowers, half ounce of dried thyme, half ounce of dried mint, quarter ounce of caraway seeds, one ounce common salt. The lavender flowers must be rubbed from the stalk, the thyme and mint reduced to powder, and the cloves and caraway seeds bruised in a mortar. The whole should be mixed with the salt, which must be well dried before it is used. When the ingredients have been thoroughly mixed, the compound may be put in to silk or muslin bags for use.

TO WHITEN RED HANDS. Procure a pair of kid gloves that are much too large for your hands, smear the insides with a mixture prepared as described below, and wear them occasionally at night, while you are sleeping. Fresh eggs, two; oil of sweet almonds, two teaspoonfuls; rose water, one ounce; tincture of benzoin, thirty six grains. First beat the eggs and then add the rose water and tincture.

RINGS can be readily cured by the following simple process: Burn a bit of linen rag on the bright portion of an axo blade; on blowing away the ashes there will remain a small quantity of thick oily fluid, one or two applications of which will effectually end the ringworm.

TO PRESERVE THE TEETH.—To wash the mouth is serviceable, not only to keep the teeth clean and prevent decay, but in strengthening the gums and making them adhere firmly to the teeth, which is of great importance in preserving them sound and secure. Use a brush in the morning, and when powder is necessary, the prepared chalk is good; or, if the gums are becoming spongy, a mixture of Peruvian bark is better. If tartar accumulates on the teeth apply to a dentist.

**SUDDEN DEATH.**—We learn that Mrs. Lockwood, a lady living on the east side of the river, died on Thursday very suddenly, having just returned from dinner at a neighbor's. She was afflicted with heart disease.

**DEATH OF CAPT. GREGORY AND SERVANT.**—Capt. W. S. Gregory of Corpus Christi, died in this city on the 9th inst. His servant, an Italian boy, was sick at the same time and being told of his employer's death, was so affected that he died instantly.

**BUSINESS.**—The past week has been generally a moderately lively one among business men. Goods have been daily discharged from coast trains, and sent forward to merchants in the interior. Repairing and building is going on in all parts of the town, and no idle men are seen upon the street corners. Our business men are preparing for a brisk Fall trade, and we hope they will not be disappointed. As yet there is no appearance of Mexican cotton buyers, who generally make this city their rendezvous. The high price of cotton may be one reason for the tardiness of these buyers.

**Real estate.** While ruling quite low under the hammer, evinces the hopefulness of our city in the future, in its steady appreciation in value, taking a ten or five years retrospect as a standard. A city returning \$3,000,000 as the valuation of its real estate, languishing for the need of a railroad that will cost \$2,000,000. Another year cannot pass in unproductive waiting for a railroad to turn up.

**POSTAL MONEY ORDER SYSTEM WITH SWITZERLAND.**—Mr. Gamble, our postmaster, has received notice from the superintendent of the money order office, that the postoffice money order system is now in operation with Switzerland. Money orders will be sold in sums not exceeding fifty dollars, U. S. currency, drawn on the international exchange office, New York, where the currency will be converted into gold on the day of receipt, and the Exchange office at Basle, Switzerland, directed to cause to be paid to the beneficiary, the amount so realized in coin, payable at the nearest money order office to his or her residence.

This will be a blessing to all of our citizens who have business with Switzerland, and we hope the same arrangement will be made with Prussia and other German

**THE MURDERER SALDANA.**—The Mexican, Francisco Saldana, who murdered Watson in Comstock, was brought in and delivered over to sheriff Fisk for more secure keeping. Some fears of lynching were entertained at Comstock.

**FOUND.**—The money lost by old uncle Isaac Horn, on Tuesday, has been returned to him. It was found by Mr. Kirchner's little girl who took it to her mother, who seeing the item in the Express returned it to uncle Isaac, through Capt. Bonnett, chief of police.

**Capture of Confederate Soldiers.**

Lieut. Creason, recently caught in two men, named Giles and Wilson, from Kendall county, on charges of being engaged in some of the hanging of Union men during the war. Giles was wounded by the Lieutenant's party, who were fired upon when they surrounded the house of Giles, and retained the fire. We learn from a man from that section, that the Lieutenant had shown the list, and that it was likely some of the worst characters will escape. On the list are the names of Wm. Horton, McCann, Benson and others. Horton volunteered to kill the wounded prisoners at the Nueces Massacre. McCann was one of the crowd who whipped Mr. Turknett's son, a lad of sixteen years, to death, to make him tell his father's hiding place; the poor boy had his entrails cut out by the whips of his rebel assassins, rather than betray his father. Benson was with the same crowd and helped to burn Turknett's house.

Many of the men who were engaged in perpetrating the horrors of Confederate times, have been so encouraged by the indifference of the military and civil authorities, that they have remained quietly at home unmolested, almost in sight of the scenes of their crimes. If the God of justice, with unsleeping vigilance, will only pursue the guilty, not only those who did the murder, but those who planned and encouraged an abetted it, our community would soon be rid of those men who curse the very earth they tread upon. Could the treachery and crime of the rebellion be laid bare, it would reach beyond the Giles and Wilson's and McCann's and Duff, to others who step about our streets as arrogantly as if they had never rebelled, never persecuted, never robbed, never confiscated, never murdered Union men. We hear some cry out: "do not bring up the past; the lessons, the unnumbered crimes of the past cannot be forgotten, and we advise those whose nerves are tender to remember that the history of the past is yet to be written and will even live after them."

*Editor of the San Antonio Express:*  
As there appears to be some interest manifested by this community as to the merits of Gas Machines for making gas from "Gasoline," a few facts on Gas Machines, by one who has endeavored to bring them as near perfection as possible, may not be a miss.

Being acquainted with different patents of these machines, of which there are or have been many in the Northern States, and finding them more or less defective, I constructed one on an entirely new principle.

This machine evaporated a greater amount of gas from the oil, in proportion to the air contained in the holder, than any machine I have yet seen, and the light produced by the gas thus manipulated was eminently satisfactory and by the use of proper burners could be used with or without glass cylinders and globes.

Having now satisfied myself that I had as good a machine as could be desired, as far as the manipulation of the oil was concerned, I had but one difficulty to overcome. A difficulty which my knowledge of the laws of Natural Philosophy warned me must certainly exist.

I was well aware, as probably most of your readers are, that "Gasoline" is the lighter oil extracted from the crude mineral oil by distillations. The crude oil is first heated to a proper degree when the light, highly combustible, oils pass from it in the form of vapors or gas. These vapors are conducted to a vessel which is subjected to a low temperature, say 40° Fahr. Under this temperature the vapors are reduced by condensation to a liquid known to the commercial world as "Gasoline".

Being aware of this fact, and also of the effect of a low temperature on all vapors, I greatly doubted whether my machine which operated so satisfactorily in warm weather, would do so under the low temperature of the winter months, and this was the difficulty which presented itself to my mind.

To settle the question beyond a doubt, I reduced the temperature of the water contained in the tank of my machine, to 50° Fahr. and cooled the holder as far as possible by covering it with ice, the result was as I feared, I could not produce gas enough to make a flame greater than a candle flame.

In order to satisfy myself that there was no fault in the oil, I let the holder stand till the water returned to its natural temperature, 82° Fahr. I then found that with the same oil which would not evaporate when the water and holder were cold, I could produce, under this higher temperature, a gas that gave me at least a 15 candle flame. After a careful study of this subject for over two months and obtaining the above results to my experiments, I feel confident that no gas machine can produce gas from Gasoline the year round in our latitudes unless some safe means are discovered by which the whole apparatus, from the holder to the burners can be kept under a temperature of, at the lowest, 65° Fahr. Even if the machine is placed in a heated room, during cold weather, hereby insuring evaporation, the gas is sure to condense to a liquid state while passing through cold iron pipes to the burners.
