TEXAS ITEMS.
ROUGHS.—The Houston Telegraph calls those Democrats or Conservatives who refuse to join the Hamilton coalition, "Roughs" of course this will convince them that the Telegraph is right.

THE Marshall Republican calls for a Democratic Convention, to meet at Waco on the first Monday in October.

A MODERN SAINT.—Rev. E. M. Wheelock, who receives a salary as Superintendent of Public Instruction—while we have no public schools in the State. Piety and population have crossed palms.—Galveston Dispatch.

NO CHANGE IN ONE PARTICULAR.—Jack Hamilton has changed or swaffed off his political principles, but his love for the bottle sticks to him,—no change in this particular. A NEW YORK conservative paper calls the Pennsylvania German Republican "foggied Dutchmen" and Jack Hamilton's organ's in this State repeat the epithet.

VENGEANCE follows in the path of Military retribution. Two citizens who engaged with the military in ferreting out and killing Bob Lee the desperado, we learn, by the Waxahachie Argus have been murdered. One fell by the hands of Bob Lee's son, 12 years of age, and the other by one of Lee's friends.

A REAL TEXAS ITEM.—The papers publish the account of the murder of a man in one of the eastern or lower counties by a man named Cole, who was a carpenter and next day after the killing made his victim's coffin; and it is further announced, "Cole is at large.—Politics had nothing to do with the killing."

A RAILROAD meeting was held at Kaufman on the 13th ult., when it was resolved to raise the sum of \$500,000 in the bonds of the county, as stock in the Southern Pacific Railroad, and the amount in the Central Railroad. The bonds to be issued to said Companies, whenever such roads reach the limits of county. The money, however, to be expended on the roads within the county.

THE Bonham News of the 21st inst., says: McKee, the young man who was wounded in a shooting affray at this place a short time ago, died on last Saturday morning at 4 o'clock.

SHOOTING.—On last Saturday evening, after dark, a freedman named John Womly was shot twice and dangerously wounded. The shooting occurred on the public square near the Methodist church, where divine service was going on at the time.—Lockhart Plow Boy Aug 28th.

THE Brenham Enquirer of Sept. 1st gives an account of a shooting affray at Roundtop, in which a man named Holt was dangerously wounded by a man named Rankin, and in turn shot and killed Rankin.

THE up freight train from Galveston met with an accident, yesterday, while crossing the trestle bridge over Clear Creek. Fifteen cars were precipitated into the creek. No lives lost.—Houston Union Sept. 8th.

POLITICS in Texas, like Northern railroad stock, are very much watered now-a-days by the mixture of isms and ites. The Fed. and Confed. are "so delicately blended, you scarce can tell where one begins or where the other ended."—Galveston Dispatch.

SIXTY-FIVE beavers per day are slaughtered at the beef packing establishment at Victoria.—Galveston Dispatch.

A NEW survey of the Waco Tap Road has straightened and shortened it six miles. The contractors intend to commence work on the 20th of September, with a good number of hands. THE Examiner, of last Tuesday, learns from parties just arrived at Waco, on the Belton stage, that it was reported in that town that the Early party had a fight some five or six miles below town, which resulted in the killing of six of Early's men, but nothing positive had been as

certained in regard to the fight. The sheriff had called out twenty or thirty citizens to go and arrest the men who did the fighting.

A WRITER in the Goliad Guard says:

Helm's party is composed of the best citizens of the country, and he is only endeavoring, by authority of the law, to bring to justice those outlaws and thieves whose audacity has become such that the whole country between the Guadalupe and Nueces has been, in a manner, given up to them for two years past.

Letter from Gen. E. J. Davis.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., August 28, 1868. Editors Houston Union: Gentlemen—I have been shown a letter from Col. J. L. Haynes, to the paper called "Austin Republican," in which, in connection with a supposed very "costly and select library," said to belong to Rebel Governor McCrea, at Pensacola, Mississippi, Colonel Haynes says of Capt. A. J. Bennet—"but it is true that Bennet had the costly and elegant library boxed up and sent to New Orleans." This statement concerning Capt. Bennet is impossible to be true and is not true.

There was no such library at the house when we occupied it. The house, said to belong to McCrea had apparently been abandoned by the family for a considerable time before our forces reached there. There were some books and articles of furniture scattered about the house, all in a very dilapidated condition, which were left substantially in the same state, when our forces evacuated.

Col Haynes makes other charges concerning Capt. Bennet, which while having a semblance of truth, are totally false in inference. Captain Bennet was a brave and good soldier, and did his duty zealously and fearlessly.

I call Col. Haynes attention to the fact, that his social intercourse with Capt. Bennet, up to the time Haynes left the Republican party, (last winter,) has been inconsistent with the idea that Haynes believed Bennet "was not a fit associate for officers and gentlemen."

I remind Col Haynes, that during last summer I often met Capt. Bennet at his house, the intimate friend and confidant of Col. Haynes and his family. I respectfully warn that gentleman that he is in danger of falling into the common error of trying to please his new friends by blackening the character of his former comrades and associates. 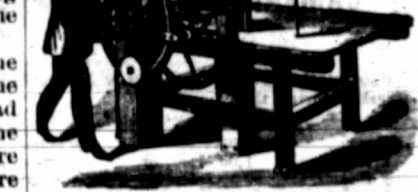

A Call for a District Convention

A Republican Convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Legislature, will be held in San Antonio on the 4th Monday in September next, (the 27th). The District is composed of the counties of Bexar, Wilson, Comal, Kendall, Blanco, Burnett, Llano, Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Banderas, Kimball, Menard, and Edwards.

Call for a Congressional Convention.

A Republican Congressional Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress in the 4th Congressional District, will be held at the town of SEGUN, on THURSDAY the 30th of SEPTEMBER, 1869. The District comprises seven Senatorial and Representative Districts, and the delegates to the convention are apportioned in accordance with the representation allowed under the new Constitution.

Jack Hamilton's Record.

NO. TWO.

He is the Father of the "Ab Initio" Doctrine!

It was a "mistake" in the government not to punish leading traitors.

Five thousand and upwards ought to have been hanged!

More "stringent measures" must be worked to ensure the safety of Loyal men.

CHOICE READING FOR DEMOCRATS!

In our weekly of the 29th ult., we published extracts taken from circulars, pamphlets and speeches, which "A. J." Hamilton, the rebels candidate for Governor, issued and delivered at the North, during the period the other "A. J." of Tennessee, who was then, unfortunately President, was attempting to reconstruct the rebellious States by, and through the instrumentality of the old effete Democratic leaders thereof.

At that time (1867-7) the Democracy of Texas had control of the State under Johnson's "policy." Hancock, Hamilton, Poase, Bell, Hynes, Long, and other professed Union men, seeking office, had been snubbed by the State government and the Loyal Legislature, elected under that traitorous regime, and seeing no prospect of appeasing the rebels of Texas, upon their plan of a "division of the offices," they grew furious, and reluctantly, at the last moment, shifted round and sided with Congress, and became the most vehement and blood thirsty set that were ever turned loose at the North!

Every imaginable argument was ingeniously "got up," to show the justice and propriety of executing the "leading intelligent, conscious traitors." They were to be murdered upon the simple proof of their identity! Justice was to have been swift, Hamilton, (our "A. J.") wanted them immediately executed; made "infamous," "odious" and "disreputable" for their past crimes, and forever "degraded," so as to "strike terror to others, and serve as an example and warning in all future time!"

He, ("A. J.") also declared "universal suffrage and universal amnesty," to be a "catch word, senseless and pernicious," and was equally emphatic in declaring that "disloyal reconstruction," would be "a failure and a sad calamity!" "A failure and sad calamity." He was right! We have never doubted this last proposition, nor do we doubt it now. Disloyal reconstruction under "A. J." of Texas, will prove as great a failure and sad calamity, as it did under "A. J." of Tennessee.

That Hamilton is a traitor and an apostate to the great Republican party of the Nation, which has honored and maintained him for the last six years, none can deny. He has used rebel money to defeat Republican measures. He has denounced the ever faithful friends of the government as "carpet-baggers, scall-wags, and Yankees," and he dare not, although "the situation" is unchanged, declare, as he did a thousand times at the North, that "treason should be made odious and traitors disreputable." If he were to, the spacious rebel "People's Ticket," would be spurned and scoffed at, from one end of Texas to the other. Try it "A. J."

But it is the intention of this record, to convict Hamilton of treachery, out of his own mouth, and to put him square before the Democracy, as a "speckled progeny of many confutations," who devised many methods for punishing them for their past crimes and earnestly proclaimed there could be no permanent peace; no safety or security, if they were permitted to assume the "power of ruling" in Texas. Hamilton is attempting to win the rebel vote for himself and his "People's Ticket," by charging that Gen. Davis, is an abject man. This simply proves his own dishonesty, and the honesty of purpose of General Davis; for, Hamilton was a proclaimed advocate of that doctrine, until Bell told him there was money in being anti-ab-initio, as the railroads of the State would owe the State about \$700,000 for interest, which was once paid, contrary to law, in rebel money, and if rebel laws were declared null and void, ab initio, the railroads would have to pay this interest in lawful money! This was enough, Jack

Hamilton, on this point, we give his own evidence, of being the "Father of the ab initio doctrine!"

It is well known that in 1865, Hamilton, as Military Governor, (his never was elected Governor) issued a proclamation, binding aside all rebel legislation and did not recognize their Acts, no more than if they had never existed, and on the 19th November, 1866, at a stated meeting of the soldiers and sailors Union of Washington, D. C. (the same body of men who would not hear Bell fulminate "Conservatism" last winter) we hear him publicly declaring that Mr. Johnson's State government must be declared "null and void ab initio, or it would be a fatal mistake!"

The Washington Chronicle of the 29th reports him to have said: "He deplored the fatal mistake which had been made in entrusting men who attempted to destroy the government, with the power of ruling in the States so lately in rebellion, and that no permanent peace or prosperity; no safety or security could be enjoyed by those of the South who upheld the government of the United States, until those governments were now constituted, were declared null and void ab initio."

This is strong language, Democrats, and if this was the case in 1866, what irreparable guarantee have those of Texas, who upheld the government of the United States, that there will be "permanent peace, safety and security," if the "People's Ticket," supported almost exclusively, by those who attempted to destroy the government, should come into power in 1870? None!

In 1866 the men who upheld the government of the United States, were only murdered at the rate of about 150 per annum, while in 1868, according to a report on "Lawlessness and Crime," reported to the Convention, (for the adoption and printing of which, Hamilton voted ye!) there were 319 murders known to have been committed! Can any loyal man in Texas explain how it is that Hamilton is now so willing, under the thin guise of a "People's Ticket," to give the "power of ruling" into the hands of those so lately in rebellion? What "safety and security," would there be for even him, when the disloyal Legislature he is aiding to elect, and the disloyal officers he must appoint, shall grasp the ruling power? Were he to die, a month after his election, in the forcible language of Mr. Poase, of the 1866 rebel legislature, his "rile dast," would be declared "unworthy" to be buried in the State Cemetery, and to "mingle with that of the distinguished heroes and statesmen of the Lone Star State," (A. S. Johnson, Ben. McCulloch, McClond, et al.)

Attachment for Contempt.

We learn that S. A. Maverick, Sr. has been taken by the U. S. Marshall, to Austin for refusal to obey a decree of the U. S. District Court, or rather, that Mr. Maverick has business in Austin and could not well obey the decree without visiting the Land Office. The following is the law in the case in general terms:

ATTACHMENT FOR CONTEMPT.

The practice on the Equity side of the Circuit Courts of the United States is, in almost every essential particular, similar to that of the High Court of Chancery of England, prior to the enactment of the comparatively late acts of parliament on that subject, where a decree is rendered for money, it is enforced by an execution just as in cases at law. Where it is for the performance of a specific act, or acts, it is enforced by the attachment of the person of the individual, who is decreed to perform the specific act or acts, who can only get discharged from arrest by doing what is required by the decree to be done, and by paying the costs of the proceedings had against him.

If the person against whom the attachment for the non performance of specific acts has been issued cannot be found, a sequestration is issued, which causes all his property to be seized and held until he performs what has been decreed. Where a party is in contempt (and he may be doubly in contempt for disobedience of some former order or orders of the Court as well as of the final decree or subsequent orders) he cannot make any application to the court that can be entertained, unless he first clears himself of the contempt or contempts he may have committed by performing the specific act or acts he is decreed to perform, and then making affidavit that he has done so, and disavowing any intention to commit contempt.

While in contempt, he cannot appeal; and were he to sue out a writ of Habeas corpus, would only be remanded to custody, and perhaps fined for the further contempt of applying to the court for a release while in a state of persistent disobedience of its authority.

Letter from Seguin. Davis gaining ground. Compliments Mr. Degener - Storm, packeries, etc.

Refugio, Refugio Co. Tex. Sept. 10, 1869. Editors Express.

All quiet along our lines just now, the excitement created by the murderous gang, that have trumped the counties adjacent to us, has partially died away, as we learn that Gen. Reynolds has sent an officer to inquire into their doings, after which they arrested and ceased to murder.

With Major Crossman commanding post of Helens they will hardly dare to commit more atrocity; those already perpetrated, they will undoubtedly be called upon to answer for.

In the political world, all goes well here; Gen. Davis is daily growing in grace with the people, and they begin to think that there hardly will be any opposition to him by the day of election. The many rebel candidates for all the offices this way are looking a little wild over the last news from Washington via Richmond; the enforcement of the iron clad, is a little more than they bargained for, alas, that their hopes of speedy spoils should be nipped in the bud.

Gen. Davis will probably soon show himself to the people of the State, and announce to them his views of the situation; his honest and fearless bearing, his steady and persistent republicanism is well calculated to favorably impress all, except the bitter-dyed-in-the-wool rebels. As between him and the apostate Hamilton, who can doubt for one moment, except as before said, the still bitter-rebel, and perhaps those who have been promised part of the spoils in the event of Hamilton's election.

We were gratified to see the announcement of that old, well tried, and suffering republican Degener of your city, for Congress. We have not the pleasure of a personal acquaintance with Mr. Degener but his record is sufficient to carry every true republican vote this way, and these he will get beyond a peradventure. He takes the true ground and submits himself to a convention. All those that do not, must go to the wall, in spite of friend Flake of the Bulletin.

An army officer, at the head of every band of registration is a good move, provided they be not of the Andrew Johnson school, from all such, may our good Lord deliver us.

The late storm here played sad havoc in some localities. In the town of St. Mary's it blew down or unroofed or otherwise damaged one half of the buildings. At Rockport but little damage was done except to the shipping which was blown ashore and some vessels entirely broken up, it was a regular West India hurricane.
