## The Grand Council at Rome.

The correspondent of the London Morning Post mentions that from several indications, it must be the opinion of the Pope and the authorities, that the Council will come to an end some in May. The lodgings for the indigent bishops have been taken until the 31st of May. The International Catholic Exhibition closes on the first of May, and the commemorative monument in the Janiculum is to be completed about the same time. These coincidences demonstrate, says the correspondent that the Pope's idea is that the Council will not last more than four or five months.

The correspondent of the London Times represents the state of things there as "auguring ill" for the great ecclesiastical meeting to be opened on Wednesday next. Gallicanism is rampant among the French Bishops; the Austrians and Germans demur to Papal infallibility; even among the Italian prelates discord is apprehended; and that man of the world, Cardinal Antonelli, shakes his head at "a performance in which he never felt any sympathy." It will be some time, in short, before it becomes clear, whether this clerical gathering will bring the Church peace or a sword. So says the Times writer; but then the Times correspondent may now be no wiser than anybody else.—Exchange.

## Shocking Tragedy in Paris.

From the London News, Dec. 11.

A shocking tragedy has just taken place in Paris. A widow lady, in easy circumstances, resided with her daughter, aged 20, in her own house opposite the Theatre de Clary; she had for some time past shown signs of mental derangement, and frequently complained that she heard strange noises about her head, and imagined she was followed by soldiers or police spies. The young woman appears also to have been of very narrow intelligence, and completely under the influence of her mother. A few evenings ago the elder lady resolved to commit suicide, and induced her daughter to consent to die with her. They first wrote letters announcing their determination, which were afterwards found on the table, with the will of the mother; they next lighted a pan of charcoal, but, as death did not come quickly enough, they drank some bleaching fluid used by washer-women, in which they dissolved phosphorus scraped from lucifer matches. Even this poison did not produce any immediate result, and the mother then took a curtain rope and strangled her daughter. She then lighted more charcoal, but without success; and at length went down stairs and told the house porter's wife to come up for a moment. The police were sent for and the mother, on being questioned, quietly gave every detail of this horrible drama, but without assigning any motive for the attempted suicide. She is detained in custody, awaiting a medical examination as to her sanity.

The Democratic press has suddenly discovered a singular fondness for interpreting Providence. The leading journals of that persuasion hasten to assure their readers that the recent death of the Hon. E. M. Stanton was an unmistakable interposition of God, for was not the man taken away just as he had laid his hands on the prize which he had been his whole life seeking? But turn this. Was it not just as plainly a providential dispensation that before his death Mr. Stanton should have reached the high position he so desired? And, furthermore, do these Democratic papers pretend to assert that it is only in extraordinary instances that God interferes in the government of the world? Or is He always present to direct and control—as well in the crushing of the rebellion, in the election of Grant, in the defeat of Pendleton, as in the death of Mr. Stanton?

A Greater Crime.

A great crime was committed by the so-called conservative Republican politicians that almost destroyed the late constitutional convention of Texas by diverting that body from its legitimate work and employing it in the manufacture of charters. They caused the convention to violate the dictates of good faith and honor--to betray the trust reposed by the people who had elected the delegates for a different purpose--a purpose proscribed by the Congress of the United States.

But the politicians as delegates caused their dupes in the convention to cooperate with them in the perpetration of a greater crime--a crime against society, which cannot be punished by law owing to the impertinence of human law, but which merits a severer punishment than the mere reprobation of honest men. We refer to the deliberate and intentional "amendment" of Section 43 of Article 12 of our proposed constitution. That Section as proposed was "amended" by these politicians as is shown by the words italicized: "Section 43. The statutes of limitations of civil suits were suspended by the so-called act of Secession of the 28th of January, 1861, and shall be considered as suspended within this State, until the acceptance of this constitution by the United States Congress."

Now, the words "of civil suits" were inserted by these politicians with a full knowledge, that they would, and with the intent that they should, screen by implication all criminals from justice. By shielding them they have perhaps secured a claim to their political support, but they have done a great wrong to society. Had those words "of civil suits" not been inserted, all the murderers and other felons in Texas would now be in process of emigration to Mexico, or to the far West. As it is, our people are taxed and our reputation and material prosperity are weighed down by their presence. The chief necessity for the cost of government arises from the presence of criminals. We pay taxes in order that we may be protected from felons.

Yet, with a knowledge of these fundamental truths our conservative republican politicians as delegates deliberately and purposely altered a most wise and judicious section of our proposed constitution so as to make that instrument a shield to all the crimes, (that as yet have not been punished) that were committed for years.

These politicians have no graver offense against good morals to answer for, than the one pointed out. In contemplation of the moral code every one that voted for the insertion of the words "of civil suits" was as much guilty of murder as if he had killed in cold blood a half a dozen of his fellow-beings--and without cause.

In view of their action in the convention it is not strange that the people of Texas have put the seal of their just condemnation upon ex-Judge A. J. Hamilton and his associates.

From Mexico.

The Ranchero says: Our advices from the city of Mexico are up to the 5th inst. The "Iberia" says: A telegram was received from Queretaro day before yesterday, in which it is stated that the forces headed by Gardias and Duenas have taken a hostile attitude and cause a great alarm in the city. While this telegram was being received the electric current gave out; it is believed that the malcontents cut down the wire.

The "Sigla" published the following telegram. QUERETARO, Dec. 2.--The city is in great alarm. The troops of the State occupy the heights and the center of the Plaza de Armas, also the Congregation, and the Cathedral. The Federal troops remain in their quarters. From one moment to another it is expected that the blood of the good Mexicans will flow. Another telegram was received at the City of Mexico, on the 3d inst., from Queretaro:

QUERETARO, Dec. 3.--The State forces have placed a piece of artillery on top of the Congregation, and are busy fortifying themselves. The streets of the city are patrolled by forces of both parties. Ex major Leon with a few men was expelled from the plaza. Colonel Contreras is conducting himself well.

The "Constitution," received on the evening of the same day a telegram as follows: The situation is still the same. Duenas and Gardias are in a hostile attitude.

The hacienda of Senor Maria has been occupied by Doroteo Leon with his soldiers. Carlos Chavez entered the house of Mr. Cuevara and took out whatever he needed. When asked for the order he showed his revolver.

Caleras is occupied by Chagollan with his bandits. Gardias and Duenas are fortifying themselves here against the Federal authorities.

PUEBLA.

Under the title of "Scandal--Intolerance" the "Teatro Politico" of Puebla says that the ruins of the Chapel of Doiores was given by the authorities of that city to the Protestants, to repair it at their expense and then use it as their temple to worship God.

Without concluding the repairs, and yielding to their religious spirit they met for the first time on Sunday the 28th ult., but while they were attending to their worship, they were attacked by a crowd of mad fanatics, headed by a gentleman, and provoked by a few ministers of the God of Peace and Mercy, and by the Neophyte old woman of Cavalieri. They wounded several of the offending Christians, and attempted to burn them by setting fire to the Bibles which they tore to pieces. The police put a stop to this outrage and conducted to jail several of the Catholics a la Barlotomé.

On the same evening, a Mr. Rojas, an ex-Imperial officer, on horseback, went and insulted several persons in their houses, whom they supposed to be Protestants. They were pursued by the police, and several shots fired, but only Rojas's horse was captured.

During the pursuit, news to the Empire and Religion, and death to the government, were heard. The "Teatro," concludes by calling on the authorities to punish the criminals severely.

This is not the first time that an outrage of this kind has happened in the city of Puebla, some time since a Masonic lodge was forcibly entered while the member of the mystic order were holding a meeting and the Tyler in attempting to impede their intrusion with his implement of office, was severely wounded, but fortunately, the Governor of the State was in the lodge at the time and the bandits beat back a hasty retreat.

CHIHUAHUA. The "Republic" of Chihuahua says that more new gold placers have been discovered, at a distance of twenty-five miles from the old ones; that the precious metal is so abundant that it is seen on the surface of the ground, shining in the light of the sun. A company has been organized to work the new placers. A force of fifty men is to be demanded from the State government, which will be paid by the company.

The Yosemite Valley.

One of the most discreditable transactions that ever took place in a legislative body was the passage of an act by the California Legislature over the Governor's veto, ceding to two private individuals the best part of the Yosemite Valley. This marvelous gorge in the Sierra Nevada range was ceded by the United States Government to the State of California, on the express condition that it should be an inalienable estate, and that it should forever remain open to the people as a park and a place of public resort. This fortunate provision in the act of Congress rendered the act of the California Legislature inoperative; but the parties who were interested in grabbing the valley for the purposes of private gain took it to Washington, and exhibited it as evidence of the desires of the people of California in the premises, and, strange to say, they induced the House to pass a bill confirming and ratifying the vandalism of the Legislature. The bill was not passed by the Senate, however; we believe it was not voted on there.

We learn from the San Francisco Bulletin that this scheme is to be again pressed upon Congress. The individuals claiming preemption rights, and the proof that they never had any is shown by the fact of their going to Congress and the Legislature to obtain claims which cannot otherwise be substantiated. The portion of the valley which they are seeking to grab is about one-half of the available land embraced in it, and its possession in fee simple would give them or their assignees the right to extort money from the public to any extent they might choose. We trust that Congress will treat the proposition as they would any others attempt to deprive the public without consideration of a most valuable franchise.

Horrible Tragedy--A young man Murdered by his Brother.

Jacksonville, Ill., Dec. 27. On last Saturday night a most brutal murder was committed in this city. It seems that two brothers by the name of Thomas and Samsom Cantrell, in company with a young man by the name of Smith, came into the city in a sleigh. During the day the Cantrells got pretty drunk. A short time after dark the whole party started home. When they were about opposite the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, a dispute arose between the two brothers, as to which of them possessed the best term. After exchanging some words they came to blows, both of them getting out of the sleigh, and during the struggle Thomas stabbed Samsom five times. They young man who was with them finally separated them and assisted the wounded man into the sleigh. He was taken home, and died the next day at 1 o'clock. The murderer gave himself up, was to-day examined before Justice Taylor, and committed to jail to be tried for murder.


