The New York Union League
Club and Edwin M. Stanton.

At a meeting of the New York
Union League Club on Saturday
evening, a series of appropriate res-
olutions were offered by Wm. Cul-
len Bryant, in recognition of the
public services of Mr. Stanton, and
unanimously adopted. Mr. A. T.
Stewart, a man who always has an
eye to substantial business results,
then took the floor, and moved that
the same committee be requested to
report any way of offering a further
testimony of esteem to the deceased
they may think fit. The New York
Herald interprets in the following
paragraph the meaning of this move
on the part of Mr. Stewart:

It means that our late War Min-
ister, who was entrusted with the
disposition, and who disposed of a
thousand millions and more of the
public money, died comparatively
poor; that he made no money in his
great office; that while living he
declined the offers from his fel-
low-citizens which we think, he might
wisely have accepted, and that Mr.
Stewart is willing to cooperate in a
movement to make comfortable in
their circumstances the widow and
children of the deceased.

This, we think, is what Mr. Stew-
art was aiming at in his resolution.
The proposition is that of a patriot
and a public benefactor; but we
hold that something more than this
is due in recognition of the public
services of Stanton. We hold that
Congress, in a generous pension to
his family, can best express the re-
spect of the two houses for the mem-
ory of the faithful public officer, and
that such a pension should be voted.
We consider it a disgrace only to
the Government that General Grant,
in order to make both ends meet at
the end of the war, felt it a duty, as
it was under the circumstances, to
accept the generous offerings made
him from his fellow-citizens. It is
a disgrace to the Government that
the widow of ex-President Lincoln
has been compelled to make her
home in Germany for the sake of
economy, when a pension of a few
thousand a year would have enabled
her to live comfortably in her own
country. Congress should avoid a
similar disgrace in the case of
Stanton; nor should Senator Sum-
ner abandon his bill for a pension to
Mrs. Lincoln. Fidelity in office is
not rewarded, and that is one great
reason why public officers are so nu-
merous in this country.

OFFICIAL
LAWS
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Second Session of
the Forty-First Congress.

[PUBLIC—No. 3.]
An Act making a temporary appro-
priation for the prosecution of the
work upon the improvement of the
Des Moines rapids in the Mis-
sissippi River.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States of Amer-
ica in Congress assembled, That there be, and
is hereby, appropriated, to be paid
out of any money in the treasury
not otherwise appropriated, to be
expended under the direction and
superintendence of the Secretary of
War, for the purpose of continuing
the prosecution of the work upon
the improvement of the Des Moines
rapids in the Mississippi River, the
sum of two hundred thousand dol-
lars.
Approved, December 23, 1869.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 3.]
Joint Resolution disapproving of a
contract for leasing the custom-
house block in San Francisco.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States of Amer-
ica in Congress assembled, That the certain
agreement made the eleventh day of
February, eighteen hundred and
sixty-nine, between the United
States acting by Hugh McCulloch,
Secretary of the Treasury, of the
one part, and John R. Buckbee and
Henry F. Williams, of the other
part, for the leasing of the lot in
San Francisco, California, known as
the custom-house block, for the pe-
riod of twenty-five years, for certain
considerations therein named, be
hereby disapproved and annulled.
Approved, December 22, 1869.

[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 4.]
A Resolution suspending existing
provisions of law for taking the
census.
Enacted by the Senate and House of Rep-
resentatives of the United States of America

in Congress assembled, That all existing
provisions of law relating to taking
the census required by the Consti-
tution of the United States be, and
the same are hereby, suspended and
postponed until the first day of
February, anno Domini eighteen
hundred and seventy.
Approved, December 22, 1869.

JANUARY 10, 1870. Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present—His Honor Mayor Thielepape.

The minutes of the meeting of January 5th, 1870, were read and adopted.

The City Corp for \$4 issued in 1867, deposited by John James, moved and carried that said scrip be disposed of as the ordinance of November, 1867, directs.

The petition of numerous citizens on Avenue E, praying to have said Avenue graded, read and referred to Committee on Public Improvements.

The petition of sundry citizens regarding the ford at Lewis' mill, read.

The Mayor was authorized to answer said petition as to the city obligations to repair fords.

The recommendation of numerous citizens to appoint J. D. Wyrabach Ditch Commissioner for the present year, read and referred to committee on Petitions and Ordinances.

The petition of numerous citizens to have reduced the minimum price set upon Hard Rock quarries, was read; after considerable discussion on the subject, said petition by motion, was referred to a special committee composed of aldermen Gross and Norton, to report on same tomorrow.

The resignation of alderman Dr. T. Hertzberg, read and accepted.

The legal opinions of J. B. Murphy, Esq., on matters referred to him, were read and ordered filed.

The Finance Committee reported on the several matters referred to said committee, report read and adopted.

The resignation of H. P. Bourne, Chief Marshal, accepted.

Capt. Kempton was appointed Chief Marshal and Wm. Lyons was appointed Assistant Marshal.

Board adjourned till January 11, 1870.




