A Denunciation From the Peabody Fund--Letter from Dr. Sears to Mayor Thielepape.

The existence and condition of the city free schools having been properly represented to Dr. Sears, General Agent for the Peabody educational fund, Mayor Thielepape has received the following letter from him:

Dear Sir--In response to your request, I hereby promise to give to your city \$1000 to aid you in extending the benefits of your public free school to the largest number of children practicable.

Very respectfully, J. G. SEARS, General Agent Peabody fund. We can say about the middle of the year, reckoning from this time, or even a month or two earlier, if your school year began then. So far very good. Dr. Sears has lent a helping hand to the city free schools in the State, and although \$2000 would have come nearer meeting the necessity, one thousand will be a great assistance...

THE RUINS.—The old mission San Jose, the finest in point of architecture, is a ruin in fact. The first performance is a good advertisement of the show.

On Saturday night, in spite of the fact that both actors and animals were tired after a days journey, the interest was kept up from the opening until the concluding performance—from the appearance of the "cloth of gold," to the pranks of the little "January," the trick mule. The clowns, who are thought by many to be the best part of a circus, were not entirely set in their wit, and no time was fooled away by the company. The brothers Wilson performed all their acrobatic feats with a finish, grace and ease seldom seen. The three double summersault men are a feature—Adolph Gonzalez is the smartest man in his line now in the business. Master Woods Cook, is the best boy rider in the world, and we doubt if his bare back just can be beaten. Mr. Fred Barclay is also a fine rider, and Miss Annie Worland does finely on horseback and on the slack rope. And Miss Turner, called in the favorite language of the ring, the "Queen of the Air," does some startling balancing on the trapeze, her beauty and girlish form give a fairy-like character to her performance; there being something so fearless and yet so graceful, and at times an appearance of timidity in her poses. She elicited the devoted attention and admiration of the spectators.

There are other features of this circus worthy of note; and altogether, it is the best that has yet visited us.
