**Deferred Dispatches.**  
—France.  
**AN EDITOR KILLED BY PRINCE**  
**BONAPARTE.**  
PARIS, Jan. 11.  
Rocheport's Marseilles newspaper  
attacked Prince Pierre Bonaparte.  
Two editors of Marseilles visited  
Prince Pierre Bonaparte to arrange  
a duel. During the interview Bona-  
parte, becoming enraged, fired twice,  
killing Victor Noel. The tragedy  
causes great agitation. Bonaparte  
surrendered himself. A rumor pre-  
valued that a coup d'etat occurred.  
Rocheport's paper at Marseilles  
has been seized. Prince Bonaparte  
states he received a slap in the face  
from Noel before firing. A decree  
has been issued convoking Cham-  
bers, from the high court justice.  
The Prince belonging to the Empe-  
ror's family, can only be tried before  
it.

—Spain.  
**MADRID, Jan. 11.**  
Last night the new Minister was  
installed. The Cortes will recon-  
vene tomorrow. Additional distur-  
bances are reported in the Provin-  
ces.

**TEXAS ITEMS.**  
A man was arrested in Marlin a  
short time since for horse-stealing,  
and confessed that he belonged to a  
gang in Falls and Robertson coun-  
ties, and that they had stolen 25  
horses this last fall.  
The Examiner learns from Capt.  
Snead that T. J. Brooks was killed  
by L. R. Basham at Waxahatchie,  
on the night of the 14th inst, Bash-  
am escaped and is pursued.

The Examiner hears that in a diffi-  
culty between two wagons on lit-  
tle Brazos, one was killed and the  
other dangerously wounded.  
Walter Holt, who killed Patton  
Rankin at Round Top some time  
since, was killed by Mice Zapp at  
Wilson's store, Washington county,  
last Friday.

**CHICKEN.**—Last night as we anti-  
cipated in our evening edition, ye Ce-  
lestials did arrive. They got in  
about 7 o'clock, and we duly attend-  
ed to see. A good number of them  
can converse in broken English, and  
withal they seem to be a lot of good  
natured fellows. And though their  
slumbers were broken in upon they  
appeared to enjoy the visit of the  
barbarians and laughed and talked  
and showed off their pig tails upon  
the slightest provocations. There  
were about 247 altogether, and we  
heard of but one sick man among  
them. They seem anxious to get  
to the end of their journey. No won-  
der at it by this time after so many  
weeks of travel they must be com-  
pletely used up.

Their destination is fixed at a  
point above Chert, for which they  
left last night. They appeared well  
provided, both in respect to larder  
and clothing. A special freight  
train conveyed their stores. The  
queues of some of them were long  
enough to be mistaken for a team-  
ster's whip. The hair was done up  
in flat plats, and entwined into silk  
plaiting. Some few of them have a  
sort of blouse, but the most part of  
them were dressed a la mode Ameri-  
can, and except the appendage,  
looked quite presentable—though it is  
not always as conspicuous as might  
be, many wearing it rolled around  
their heads.—Houston Telegraph  
Feb. 14th.

The Greek text of the polyglot in-  
scription for the monument in honor  
of the completion of the Suez Canal  
has been composed by Dr. Reinhold  
Klotz, Professor-Eloquentiae at the  
University of Leipzig, in consequence  
of a commission to that effect, which  
he received from Paris. This text,  
literally translated is as follows: "In  
the year of the Hegira 1282 (1369),  
under the renowned government of  
the illustrious Padisha Abdul Aziz  
Chan, Emperor of the Ottomans, and  
under the wise rule of the noble  
Immael Pasha, Viceroy of Egypt,  
this monument was erected to cele-  
brate the excavation of the Suez Can-  
nal, which is destined to approxi-  
mate the nations of Europe and Asia,  
to multiply their commercial rela-  
tions, and favor a more intimate  
union between all the members of  
the human family. This great work  
of peace owes its origin to the courage-  
ous perseverance of Ferdinand Les-  
sops, with the cooperation of the  
principal maritime nations, and under  
the patronage of the Emperor  
of the French.
