AUSTIN, Jan. 24, 1870.
Editor of the San Antonio Express:
Preparations are progressing for the re-
ception of the Legislature.
Hon. Jas. P. Newcomb has been appoint-
ed Secretary of State.
Commissioner Kuechler opened the Land
Office this morning for public business.
To-day the State Gazette establishment
passed into the hands of Messrs. Sigmaring,
Tracy & Riven. A Republican State organ
will be issued during the week.
The Republicans of Travis county elect-
ed Governor Davis at the mansion on Sat-
urday night, in the way of a torch light
procession. The Governor being called
out acknowledged the compliment and
assured the people that his adminis-
tration would be the practical carrying out of
the principles indicated by the Republican
party, during the election.
The new Secretary of State and the U.
S. District Attorney, Wm. Alexander, Esq.,
being called upon, made short speeches.
Judge Kloke has been appointed Notary
Public vice J. P. Newcomb, resigned.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.
The Democratic caucus called to con-
sider the proposition of Democratic members
of the election committee to withdraw
from the caucus, decided that it was the
duty of members to remain to watch and
protest against what they call partisan
acts of the majority.
Revel, the negro elected to the United
States Senate from Mississippi, is a native

Government Advertising.

The Herald of last Friday, in noticing the arrival of General Meigs, takes occasion to exhibit its usual mendacity in the following manner:

There is another matter we will refer to in connection with the General's visit to our city, namely the Quartermaster's advertising. There is no doubt, but the government has last many thousand dollars in the last two or three years by having its advertising done in papers having almost literally no circulation.

The Herald man knows, if he knows anything at all, that the government has never lost a dollar by advertising in the loyal newspapers of the South, for the following reasons:

First, many of the Republican newspapers have a larger circulation than the rebel sheets published in the same localities—just as the Express and Free Press exceed in circulation the Herald. And with regard to this latter fact—that is, that the Express and Free Press have a larger circulation than the Herald—we challenge the Herald man to exhibit the facts and the figures.

Second, no man interested, or desiring to interest himself in any government contract, would look for an advertisement of the kind in a sheet so flagrantly and unbecomingly hostile to the general government as the Herald has constantly been notwithstanding the fact, that it professed an inclination to become "jolly" over the order of the Commanding General in honor of S.A. of January anniversary.

Third, even if it were true, which we deny, that the Herald could give a larger circulation to an advertisement than the Express, it is evident to any one, knowing the character of its bigoted, scandalous and slanderous libellations, that the generalality of its subscribers are not of the class, either able or willing to serve the Government by any fair or honest contract.

But we can, for once, agree with the Herald, when it says, in the same article: "We cannot but believe that San Antonio possesses advantages for the transportation, storage and forwarding of government supplies over any other point in Texas," but when it adds, that "San Antonio has been denied her

ness for a long time past," we are at a loss to comprehend its meaning, unless it be, that the Herald has not had the Quartermaster's advertising. "Just!" Just to whom? That is the question. What are the just demands of San Antonio, or any other point, when the economical and proper execution of the functions of the government are concerned? Simply that economy, dispatch, and a thorough accomplishment of the objects desired are secured.

Republican Constitution.

At the request of many of the oldest and most consistent Republicans of the State, from different sections, a call is hereby made upon the National Union Republicans of Texas, who supported in good faith the adoption of the Constitution, and the claims of Governor Hamilton in the recent election, to meet in consultation, at the city of Austin, on Monday the 7th day of February, 1870, for the purpose of giving expression to our satisfaction at the almost unanimous adoption by the people of the liberal Constitution framed by the friends of Governor Hamilton, in the Convention, and the prospect of the early restoration of our State to a government of laws and of the people; and also to present to the people a vindication of our action in the recent canvass against the misrepresentations that have been so actively disseminated against us as National Union Republicans, and to respectfully petition the Congress of the United States to order an investigation of the irregularities and frauds which are known to have been practiced and allowed in the late election, and to take such other steps as may be determined upon for the benefit of our State and People.

J. L. HAYNES, Ch' Rep. Ex. Com. We publish the foregoing, which we find in the Austin Republican of the 19th inst., without charge, because we have a word or two to say, not only upon the "call," but upon the Republican's comments thereon.

The call professes to be made "at the request of many of the oldest and most consistent Republicans of the State"—taking care to say—"from different sections." Our cotemporary explains who these "consistent" men are when it says, "but for such men as Hamilton, Pease, Caldwell, Paschal, Stribling, Bell, Turner, Haynes, Mills, Jack Evans, Cooper, Bacon, and a host of other Spirits, there would never have been a Republican Party in Texas."—These are the very men, and none others, with a few trifling exceptions, at whose request this call is made. They are, indeed, "from different sections," but in no sense are they representatives, unless it be of the fungus growth which attaches itself to every live political party merely for the sustenance they can draw from its success, and not from any principle. These are the very men who so recently sold themselves to the most unscrupulous agitators in the so-called Democratic Party, for the sake of office. They were not only willing to rupture the Republican Party in our State, but also to endanger the hopes for readmission, entertained by every true friend of the State, in order that they might obtain a temporary control of the offices. Their intrigues among themselves, and back-door communications and bargains with the enemies of the present administration, with the enemies of the well settled plan of reconstruction are well known, not only to the really "consistent" Republicans of this State, but to the President and to the Congress of the United States. Their bargains and promises were, and are, so notorious, that even the most unscrupulous enemies of the Republican Party became disgusted with their dishonesty and weakness, and failed to give them that support they had won by treachery, because it was apparent how little trust could be reposed in them.

Now, it is evident for what purpose this call is made. No doubt they deceived a good many honest and well meaning Republicans, and obtained their support during the late canvass; and so unwilling are they to recognize their complete degradation, they still imagine they will be able to delude and deceive a number sufficient to give them respectability of influence in the bestowal of patronage.

They desire to "vindicate themselves and their course" before the world—for what purpose? Is it to strengthen the Republican Party and principles? No one believes it. It is not by any vindication of themselves that the interests of the State are to be promoted. The fact is, they die hard, being so hungry for a little public pap, and have appointed the 7th of February as the day to publish to the world their own epitaph.

Flake seems very unwilling to acknowledge the fact that his old favorite, Col. Haynes, is defeated. If we were permitted to make a suggestion to the Bulletin, we would advise that he next time take an outright rebel or a true Republican for his candidate. These milk-and-cider men never succeed with people. They want one or the other mixed.—Tyler Index.

We are skeptical about the powder and lead man of the Bulletin; for, after the most careful inquiry we can find no evidence of his firing at confederates at all either with or without powder and ball, while we know the Bulletin has been quite as unsuccessful in the search after proof of the charge made against the Republican candidate.

South Carolina has taken "a jump ahead" on the woman question. A bill has passed to the third reading in the Legislature, which provides that no real or personal property held by a woman at the time of her marriage shall be subject to levy or sale for her husband's debts, but shall be her separate property; that a married woman shall have power to bequeath, devise, or convey her separate property in the same manner and to the same extent as if she were unmarried; that she may purchase any species of property in her own name, and may contract and be contracted with in the same manner as if she were an unmarried woman; that in all matters relating to her separate property and her separate contracts she may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, and in every respect be entitled to and be subject to the same legal rights and remedies as if she were unmarried; nor shall any jointer of her husband as a party with her be necessary in any action brought by her, or against her, in matters relating to her separate property, or arising out of her separate contracts.

THE TEST OATH IN TEXAS.—WASHINGTON, Jan 10.—General Reynolds, commanding the military district of Texas, has forwarded to Gen. Sherman the petition of certain citizens of that State, asking that a law be passed by Congress to punish persons who are guilty of wilful false-swearing in taking the iron-clad oath. It seems that there are a large number of disqualified persons who, for the sake of obtaining office, have subscribed the test oath, and there are no means of punishing them under the laws of Texas. What the Texans ask is, that Congress pass a general law on the subject which shall be applicable to all the late rebel States, and place the execution of it in United States Courts. Gen. Sherman has laid the matter before the Reconstruction Committee.

GOLD EXCITEMENT IN MONTANA.—Mr. Cavanaugh, delegate from Montana Territory, has just received a letter announcing very rich and extensive gold discoveries on Cedar Creek, which runs down the eastern slope of the mountain range separating Montana and Idaho Territories. These deposits are said to rival anything in California. Three hundred and twelve dollars are said to have been panned out of one hole

and the writer alleges that he has seen \$2 to the pan taken out with great regularity. There is great excitement in Montana and thousands are already on their way to the new diggings.

Petition for the Removal of Disability.

For the benefit of those who may desire to apply to Congress for the removal of disabilities, we have drafted and published the following form of petition:

To the Hon. Congress of the U. S.:
The petition of A. B., a citizen of _____ in the county of _____ and State of Texas, respectfully makes known that he is by the Constitution and laws of the United States laboring under political disability, from the fact that he took part with the Confederates in the late war against the government of the United States.

Your petitioner further represents that since the close of the war, he has performed all the duties incumbent upon him as a citizen of the United States and has discountenanced any and all disloyalty thereto, and that he has since that time and now is, a loyal citizen of said Government, in favor of its perpetuity and is ready, willing, and determined to labor therefor.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that his disability may be removed and that he may be also exempted from taking the Test Oath, and so will ever pray, &c.

Take care to acknowledge your signature before the County Clerk, County Judge, or Notary, and have him to certify to your identity and that he believes the statement in the petition to be true; and also obtain if convenient, the recommendations of influential Union men, to be written upon the petition, or attached thereto, and have their signatures and identity certified to, by one of said officers. Send your petition on to some one of the Texas newsgone to Washington, or to some friend there, or address it to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The form of petition may be varied to suit the taste of the applicant.

The famous *Com-Pearl* has reformed. Chinese Jugglers.

The Chinese jugglers and their curious tricks are often a matter of great interest to a stranger. Unlike the modern prestidigitator, he has no apparatus, no tables with drawers, no baskets and boxes with false bottoms—therefore his tricks seem all the more wonderful. One trick I remember that I was never tired of seeing, it was so curious, and at the same time so beautiful.

The juggler is furnished with a square tile of white porcelain, apparently not different from any other piece of white ware. He asks you what flower he shall make appear on the surface. Perhaps you say a red rose. He waves a brush over the plate a few times; the brush has apparently no color in it, and he has no color near him, and in a moment the flower appears on the tile, with its appropriate leaves, as if painted by a most skillful hand. When you have admired it sufficiently, he passes his hand once more across the picture, and it is gone.

You ask to see a water lily next, and with a few waves of the same brush he produces it, without a moment's hesitation, and wipes it away in the same manner. No matter what flower you ask for, so long as it is one with which the juggler is acquainted, he will paint it for you. The growth, blossoming, and fruit bearing of a seed planted before your eyes, in a little mound of earth on the pavement beneath your window, is another of the inexplicable tricks of their jugglery; and it becomes peculiarly difficult of explanation when the fruit you see grow, and are afterwards showed to eat, is not in season, and therefore not to be procured in the market.

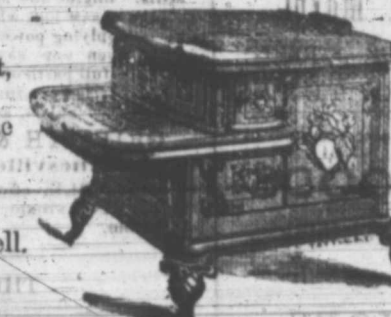
