WASHINGTON, January 25.
 Weather continues very thick.
 C. B. Luck, of the Spotswood Hotel is
 here to invite Prince Arthur, in behalf of
 the citizens of Richmond, to visit that city.
 Mr. Luck visited Minister Thornton and
 was informed that the Prince would go no
 further South before returning to Europe.
 House—League Island was discussed.
 Senate—The California whiskey bill was
 up for discussion.
 Robertson presented a huge bill remov-
 ing individual disabilities.
 The Virginia Senators are not here and
 no action regarding them has been taken.
 The Virginia bill has progressed some
 and is now in the Senate waiting Colfax's
 signature. Immediately upon its return
 it will go the President.
 Virginia's admission will certainly be
 completed to-day, and if the President's
 approval be returned in time, several of
 the Virginia representatives will be seated
 to-day.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 25.
 In the Legislature last night, at mid-
 night, the Chattanooga railroad bill was
 passed by the House after a session of
 nearly twelve hours of disorder and con-
 fusion.
 The Bulletin says that it is doubtful
 whether a more confused, excited or disor-
 derly Legislature has ever been seen on
 this Continent, or any where else. At
 another stage of the proceedings General
 Lowell distinctly charged that there were
 members voting for the bill who had been
 paid to vote for it. The charge brought
 upon him a large crowd of members, and
 to picture the scene of disorder and con-
 fusion at that moment, would be simply
 impossible. A score were addressing the
 Chair—some were addressing Lowell, at
 the same moment gesticulating in a men-
 acing way, and the one who raised his
 voice above the rest, signified that Lowell
 was paid in the interest of Charles Morgan.
 To-day Wilson asked leave to record his
 vote against the Chattanooga railroad bill,
 a bill which he did not hesitate to pro-
 nounce as the most outrageous and villanous
 that was ever enacted by any delibera-
 tive assembly.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.

In SWITZERLAND almost every child
 is taught to bear arms—and every
 citizen has his military duties. The
 entire force of the Republic is organ-
 ized in four divisions—the first and
 principal being composed of young
 men in the flower of their age—and
 these sections are successively called
 out as an emergency arises. On the
 rolls of the Confederation, out of a
 population of two millions and a
 half, there are about 340,000 men
 trained to fight; and it is a striking
 proof of practical excellence of this
 system, that in 1847, when eight
 cantons seceded from the Bund, and
 the majority proceeded to coerce
 them, both sides had, in the space
 of three weeks, well equipped and
 disciplined armies in the field,
 amounting respectively to nearly
 40,000 and 100,000 men, with a pro-
 portionate supply of artillery. The
 expenditure of the Confederation on
 the organization of these military
 forces is about \$675,000 a year; yet

the Federal army of 82,000 is always
 ready to take the field, and the first
 reserve of 42,000 is almost in ad-
 vanced a state of preparation.

The Democratic Party.

Yet the U. S. Government is defrauded the taxes due on these sales, the laws of the State prohibiting this business are set at defiance, and the Judges are paid to become particeps criminis!

These judicial gamblers cannot be impeached and punished, because they are democrats, and so is the Legislature and Governor of the State—the same whose marvelous learning and parity impelled the futile attempt to repeal an irreparable act adopting the Fifteenth Amendment.

We have here the evidence of the manner in which our own affairs of legislation and justice would be conducted under the rule of the Bourbons.

AB INITIO IN ALABAMA.—We take the following from the Montgomery Mail: The Supreme Court of Alabama have just rendered several decisions, the arguments leading to which, establish the important fact, that all marriages which took place in Alabama during the war are null and void, and that the issue of such marriages are illegitimate—Houston Telegraph.

The sapient editor of the Houston luminary seizes upon the above by way of justifying the arguments, used in Texas by his party against the condemnation of the villainous legislation enacted by the confederates during the rebellion and in 1866. The nullity of marriages was the convenient and almost only argument the rebels and their allies could find to frighten people from any interference with the "rights" which had grown up under the vindictive and partial legislation which was enacted from 1861 to 1864 inclusive—to say nothing of the judicial monstrosities called by courtesy the "administration of justice."

Lotteries and Gambling.

The Legislature of Louisiana have repealed the law in that State, hitherto licensing gambling institutions.

A few nights since a gambling shop in our city was very properly and thoroughly "pulled" by our police. These are encouraging evidences of improvement in the morals of the Legislature of Louisiana and the police authorities of this city. Each should have the determined and effective support of every good citizen interested in the good government of that State and this city.

Just as tares and wheat grow together in a field, so fools and knaves thrive side by side in a large city like New York. No man can be safe from the snares of the latter, for the more extensive any legitimate business is, the greater inducement it offers to knaves and swindlers to counterfeit it.

TRADE TRICKS OF THE BOGUS. Besides keeping their little shops as a make-believe of legitimate business, they usually have spotters out on the street corners to inveigle unwary strangers into their dens.

IMMENSE INCOMES OF THE BOGUS. Indeed, so extensive is the business transacted by some of the bogus watch dealers that one of them on Broadway boldly proclaims the character of his trade, and yet, we understand, sells from \$30,000 to \$40,000 worth a month.

HOW IT IS DONE. Every watchmaker understands full well that to insure a serviceable article, every plate, pin, cog, and wheel in those timekeepers must be made and finished with the utmost mathematical accuracy.

MAIL SHOW, that the confederates had no better argument than this while it undertakes to interpret the legal effect of the decisions of the Supreme Court of Alabama. It would have been far more satisfactory to us, and doubtless to the whole country, if the Mail had given us the points really decided by the court.
