The Terrible Trichinosis.

John C. Dawson, M. D., Professor of Physiology and Microscopic Anatomy, publishes a long and ex-ceedingly interesting paper on this subject, from which we make the following extract:

The pig seems to be the animal naturally the most liable to trichinosis. He is certainly more liable to this disease than any other animal used for food, neither the sheep nor the ox being subject to it. It has been found in this country, by investigations in Chicago in 1866, that of all the pigs brought to market in that city, one in fifty is infec-ted with trichina. This shows that we are all in danger of becoming infected by the use of pork, unless meat, to destroy the vitality of the the number is fast increasing. not do this effectually. Only thorough cooking is to be relied on as a safeguard. It is remarkable that most, if not all of the cases of trich insis in this country, thus far have occurred among the Germans. This is because they have the habit, not otherwise common here, of eating ham, sausages, and even sometimes fresh pork, narly or quite in the un-cooked state. To kill the worms the ham must not only be salted and smoked, it must be cooked, and and cooked thoroughly. Now, if you bear in mind that one pig in fifty is infected with trichina, you the organ pealed forth in loud will perhaps think many times before putting between your lips a piece of pork, or ham or sausage in the raw state; you will be certain that it is cooked; and not only that, but thoroughy cooked. One of the worst cases of trichinosis that has come under my observation was caused by eating pork chops which were rare or slightly underdone. Now, these chops were probably well enough cooked on the outside; but on the insid they were red and and juicy, and the danger was precisely the same as if they had taken the meat entirely raw. In order to destroy the trichina the meat shouldbe subjected to a temperature of 2120 F. Now, if pon boil a ham for half an hour, or even an hour, you do not necessarily subject all parts of it to this temperature. In the central parts of the ham the temperature will not rise to that point unless the boiling has been long continued. I speak of this particularly, it is a very important mat A temperature of less than 160° F. does not destoy the trichino. As shown by direct experimen, therefore, a piece of trichinous meat, any part of which has not been raised to or above this point, is just as dangerous as if. it were taken in the raw state.

These are the chief points of importance in regard to the tricking and trichinosis. The disease is ta tal enough, frequent enough, and revolting enough to induce us to take all possible measures to prevent it, and I do not think anything is sufficient for this but a personal examination of every piece of pork, ham, bacon or sausage used as food, subjected to a thorough cooking Life Insurance process.

There are other hints of considerpidity with which the human subber of persons who may become infeeted by eating the product of a single slaughtered animal, and the ease. Enough, however, is known to convince us that the affection is a very frequent one, and liable to be exceedingly fatal, or if not fatal, to produce prolonged and exhausting Daily Revenue, disease.—Exchange.

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confed-erate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Autonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio :

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the follow ing modifications and amondments thereof

o wit: That all persons interested, their agent That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1851, with whom, said Davis April, A. D. 1831, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the pre sentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U.S. cur-rency, the city will execute the final title

rency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SEC. 2. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, a. p. 4870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city up to said date.

That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the act or acts of any person of persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of April, a. D. 1861, until the minth day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of asid city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or currency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time in payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in in assuming to act in the name of said city in in assuming to act in the name of said city in city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SEC. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice te those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, a. 0. 1861. All such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as

paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said-city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands herelofors sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts, for such to his own statement, had passed through several settlements without being observed, and not having had the courage to wrap at a door, even when he was in a starving condition.


