TROUBLES IN FRANCE.—The arrest of Rochefort has, as we expected, resulted in serious troubles. Things and matters look as in in February, 1848 and a serious outbreak may hourly be expected. Barricades have, since the coup detat of December, 1852, been unheard of in Paris. but barricades are a fact, and the fate of Napoleon is now mainly dependent upon the action of the army. Nobody doubts that Napoleon's popularity is gone, and that he is no more at present but a despot in the fullest sense of the word, supported by bayonets alone. How long they will protect him, is now the exciting question. And all this is done by one man, Rochefort, who a short-time ago, was pronounced by our wisest men a fool.

Organization of the Legislature

Our advices from Austin state that General Reynolds has taken the organization of the Legislature into his own hands. The following order will explain :

I. In compliance with the requirements of the 6th Section of the Act of Congress of April 10, 1869, the members elect of the Legisla ture, will each take and subscribe the following oath, &c. The oath reads as follows :

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that I have never held the office, or exercised the duties of a Senator or Representative in Congress, nor been a member of the Legislature of any State of the United States, nor held any civil office created by law for the administration of any general law of a State, or for the administration of justice in any State or under laws of the United States, nor held any office in the military or naval service of the United States, and thereafter engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or gave aid or comfort to its enemies, or rendered, except in consequence of direct physical force, any support or aid to any insurrection or rebellion against the United States, hor held any office under, or given any support to any government of any kind organized or acting in hostility to the United States, or levying war against the United States. due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the löth day of January, a. p. 1835. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, s. p. 1866, and herafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit:

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on princi-

SEC. 2. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on lifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said inferest, from and after the lat day of May, a. p. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

SEC. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

D. 1861, intill the night day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of said city, the Bonds, Transury Notes or currency of the last Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time is payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SEC 2. That to avoid any seeming instruments of these sections and the lates of the section of the said city in the said city in the said city in the said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended payments, and that all such pretended payments are set of the said city in the said cit

All such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasofficers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts, for such payments, together with such instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from this city, within three mouths after the passage of this ordinance and shall at the same time surrender such instruments of writing for cancellation, shall receive from the Mayor of this city a receipt on account of the actual market shall peceive from the Mayor of this city a receipt on account of the actual market value of the bouds, treasury notes, currensons at the time of the payment thereof; provided, that such person or persons shall at the same time execute, and deliver to the Mayor, an instrument of writing wholly cancelling and annulling the writings heretofore executed and delivered to such person or persons by persons acting in the name of this city, as aforeasid, and putting. name of this city, as aforesaid, and putting this city in the same position, with the same price and charge upon such lands as

That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d. section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereon, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a feccipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing; then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original back to such peron, or perons, the origi-nal receipts, and instruments of writing the period of the nal receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesald, and that thenceforth such receipts and in-struments of writing shall be null and


