WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Revenue to-day
quarter of a million.
Ways and Means Committee favor three
per cent on incomes and exemption of
\$2000 salaries.
Committee on Foreign Affairs report fa-
voring Sikes confirmation as Minister to
Spain.
The opposition to Bradley is strong. His
opponents want a Judge from the South.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—The New
Jersey Senate rejected the 15th Amendment
by a vote of 13 to 8.
The Election Committee is considering
Segar's case as Congressman at-large for
Virginia. They will take the vote on Fri-
day.
Contested elections are postponed until
the House acts on the new system of try-
ing by jury, to be drawn from the House
by ballot.
The Reconstruction Committee reported
a bill for general relief, by application
through courts.
Another bill, relieving some three thou-
sand persons, was reported.
The House did not consider Georgia's
case to-day.
Senate.—Iowa's ratification of the 15th
Amendment reported. Nothing else im-
portant.

TEXAS, N. J., Feb.—The Legislature
adopted resolutions requesting their Con-
gressional delegation to urge the recogni-
tion of Cuba.
MONTGOMERY, ALA., Feb. 8.—Mont-
gomery, Alabama & Chattanooga R. R. bill
nearly passed by both Houses by a large
majority loaning the credit of the State to
the amount of two millions.
A dispatch from President Stanton, at
Boston, thanks the Legislature and says
the road shall soon be built and makes
great promises that Alabama shall be ben-
efited instead of looting.

HAVANNA, Feb. 7.—Yesterday four citi-
zens of New York, named Henry K. Foster,
Hugh Johnson, Isaac Glenwall and Gar-
dner Wells were visiting a photograph
Gallery to have their pictures taken; they
all wore blue neck ties and when near the
Theater theatre were stopped by a man who,
pointing to their neck ties addressed them
excitedly in Spanish, which not being un-
derstood by the parties no answer was re-
turned—the Spaniard drew a revolver and
fired on the party. Glenwall, Foster and
Johnson were wounded the two latter are
in a precarious condition. Wells who was
unhurt, ran followed by a number of peo-
ple but escaped. The wounded men were
badly treated by the crowd. The party
who assaulted them disappeared. Declara-
tions of parties and witnesses to the af-
fairs are being taken by legal authorities
in presence of the U. S. Consul. The Capt.
General is very indignant at the outrage
and people of all parties denounce the act.
Capt. General DeRiodes offers a reward
of a thousand dollars for the arrest of the
culpable parties who if found will be tried
by drum head court martial and executed
within 2 hours after the passage of sen-
tence.

Volunteers who took a prominent part
in the disturbance at Matanzas, have been
arrested by order of the Capt. General,
and await trial.
PARIS, Feb. 7.—In the Corps Legislatif to-
day Crevix made a strong appeal against
the arrest of Rochefort as a wrong to his
constituents. Olivier replied and after an
excited discussion, the chamber by vote
199 to 45, adhered to the view taken by
Olivier. Up to 8 this evening Rochefort
had not been arrested.

PARIS, Feb. 8. P. M.—Henry Rochefort
editor of the Marseilles was arrested at
Bellville in the eastern part of the city.
At an early hour this evening, his friends
and partisans are assembling in great
crowds in that quarter, serious troubles are
expected.
Troubles at Bellville are serious; the
streets filled with shouting people and bar-
ricading has commenced. A detachment
of troops arrived in the vicinity of the bar-
ricade erected in Rue du Fanbury de Tem-
ple, Rue St. Mour Rue Grand Aux Belle
Saud and other streets in the vicinity of
Bellville. The scene of disturbance is near
northern and Strasbourg railway stations.
At half past 11 o'clock additional detach-
ments of troops arrived, but up to this
hour no fires had been used.

Troops in the garrisons in the city have
received orders to hold themselves in readi-
ness to march at a moment's notice.
Such are the precautions taken by the
police and military, that it is believed a
riot will not be attended with any serious
consequences.
Troubles at Bellville lasted all night,
and have extended westward to Laville,
and the extreme northeastern arrondis-
sements within the fortifications. Troops
have not resorted to the use of arms.
The police are active, and many arrests
have been made.
Beyond the excitement naturally inci-
dent to such occasions, the rest of the city
is tranquil. The Government still con-
tinues to take precautionary measures to
prevent outbreaks elsewhere.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The Queen opened
parliament and read a highly conservative
speech.
PARIS, Feb. 8.—Police attempted to carry
the barricade of Rue du Temple but were
repulsed with one killed and one wounded.
Barricades are elsewhere erected but not
defended. Troops are out in force but have
not used arms at this hour. All quiet.
Many arrested, mostly boys under the in-
fluence of liquor.

Afternoon at 3 o'clock—the police and
the military have the riot under control,
City tranquil.

WASHINGTON, February 9.

The retrenchment committee will report
in favor of placing the educational por-
tion of the freedman's bureau in the hands
of the commissioner of education.
House—Covode was seated by a strict
party vote.
The Legislative and Judiciary appropria-
tion bill was discussed without final
action.
The President was requested to furnish
information concerning the recent murder
of Americans in Havana.

Senate—The resolutions introduced took
the ground that the present Legislature is
illegal, constituted in account of the ad-
mittance of minority candidates, and de-
manded a reorganization.
Bullock and others spoke in opposition.
Senator Carpenter, Edmunds, and Conk-
ling remembered that at a former speech
Governor Bullock said that the expulsion
of negroes and the seating of the minor-
ity candidates in their stead, was consid-
ered.

will be allowed to explain his apparently
contradictory statement.
Nothing important doing in the other
committees.

Senate—A bill was introduced increas-

Judges.
Judiciary committee was directed to

required in accordance with the recon-
struction acts.
Morton discussed the neutrality ques-
tion.
NEW ORLEANS, FEB. 9.
The registration bill passed the Senate,
yeas 15, nays 12.
The impeachment trial of Wickliffe,
State Auditor, commences to-morrow.
This morning's bulletin contains a state-
ment of Judge Cooley, charging the State
Treasurer, Dubatist, with defrauding the
creditors of the State by discounting their
warrants and using the funds of the State
therefore.

PARIS, February 8.
Noon Rochefort was arrested as he was
entering a political meeting, he made no
resistance, or appeal to the crowd, when
the arrest was known at the meeting, the
wildest scene occurred, and Gustave Flow-
ers, who presided, drew his sword and fired
a pistol, declaring that the insurrection
had begun.
Barricading commenced and omnibuses
and other vehicles from neighboring
streets were appropriated for this purpose.
The Commissary of Police, who accom-
panied the guard which arrested Rochefort,
was carried with the crowd and mal-
treated.
The district lying between Rue Fanbury,
De Temple and the fortifications, a dis-
tance of about two miles, is held by the
rioters, and the insurgents pillage the ar-
mories.
At 3 o'clock this morning about three
hundred arrests were reported.
Gustave Flowers is in custody.
Evening.—In the Corps Legislatif, Ket-
ary, (a liberal) demanded why Rochefort
had not been arrested before five thousand
partisans had gathered. It was not ne-
cessary this meeting should be disturbed,
and the people participating aroused to
violence.—The sentiment of the government
was productive to disturbances.

The Ministry replied that the arrest of
the chambers was forbidden, to avoid the
scandal which his arrest here would cause
friends of Rochefort; were prepared to
make the demonstration which they had
made, and on this fact the Ministry would
rest the responsibility of what had occur-
red.
LONDON, February 8.
Rochefort's arrest and its consequences
make quite a sensation. The rumors
which are about that the troops fired upon
the people, are discredited.

TROUBLES IN FRANCE.—The arrest of Rochefort has, as we expected, resulted in serious troubles. Things and matters look as in February, 1848 and a serious outbreak may hourly be expected.

Organization of the Legislature

Our advices from Austin state that General Reynolds has taken the organization of the Legislature into his own hands. The following order will explain:

I. In compliance with the requirements of the 6th Section of the Act of Congress of April 10, 1869, the members elect of the Legislature, will each take and subscribe the following oath, &c. The oath reads as follows:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that I have never held the office, or exercised the duties of a Senator or Representative in Congress, nor been a member of the Legislature of any State of the United States, nor held any civil office created by law for the administration of any general law of a State, or for the administration of justice in any State or under laws of the United States, nor held any office in the military or naval service of the United States, and thereafter engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or gave aid or comfort to its enemies, or rendered, except in consequence of direct physical force, any support or aid to any insurrection or rebellion against the United States, nor held any office under, or given any support to any government of any kind organized or acting in hostility to the United States, or levying war against the United States. So help me God, (or, on the pains and penalties of perjury, as the case may be.)"

Or the following oath or affirmation, namely: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be.) that I have been relieved, by an act of the Congress of the United States, from disability as provided for by Section 3 of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. So help me God, (or, on the pains and penalties of perjury, as the case may be.)"

II. Hon. B. Rush Egan, member elect from the Twelfth District is appointed temporary Speaker of the House of Representatives.

III. Cases of contested seats will be referred to District Headquarters; each contestant stating clearly his grounds of contest, whether the same be for ineligibility of the party holding the certificate, or for other cause.

Any member holding the certificate of election and declining to take and subscribe the above oath will vacate his seat.

IV. Until all the members elect shall have had an opportunity to qualify, both Houses will adjourn from day to day, assembling daily at 10 o'clock, a. m. The organization of each house will be perfected as soon as action on contested cases shall have been taken by the District Commander, of which due notice will be given.

France. Rochefort's sentence is six months imprisonment, and a fine of three thousand francs. His position as deputy in the Corps Legislatif is not affected thereby.

The Paris Figaro, of the Victor Noir demonstration, on the 12th inst., says that, at a moderate calculation, 150,000 workmen lost a day and a half. Many stores were closed, and those that kept open only incurred still greater losses.

THE GOVERNOR OF GEORGIA has appointed the Atlanta German Gazette, one of the Official Journals of the State.

OUR GERMAN FREE PRESS, the oldest Republican paper in the State of Texas, has for the last five years fought hard for the Republican party, and liberty to all, and not without success, but there is nothing official about it yet. Still we hope.

Legislative Proceedings.

CAPITAL, AUSTIN, TEXAS. Feb. 8, 1870. SENATE.—In accordance with orders promulgated, the Senate met at 12 M. L. Gov. Plamagan, presiding. The Oath prescribed was administered by Judge Glenn, of the 17th Judicial District, to 24 members, 3 members elect were unable to take the required oath.

Adjournd until tomorrow at 10 A. M.

HOUSE.—Called to order at 12 M. by Hon. J. P. Butler Speaker pro tem. The oath was administered to 37 members by Hon. T. H. Doyal of the United States Court. There were nine contested seats, two members failed to qualify, and 13 were absent. Adjournd until tomorrow at 10 A. M.

The Muscatine Journal says: "We read the other day of the discovery, Page County, this State, of a strange and ferocious animal, somewhat resembling a coney, which had been committing depredations on stock, and were inclined to doubt the story. It seemed improbable. It appeared inconsistent with a civilized community, and especially with a locality so thickly populated. But we are skeptical no longer. Our disbelief in regard to the statements has departed. The reason thereof is, that a similar story comes to us from our very next door as it were, and being backed by the most authentic evidence, we can but give it credence. The scene is in Oakland Township, Louisa County, adjoining Muscatine County. Mr. Peter Hosts, a resident of that locality, and who for thirteen years lived near this city, and is known as a gentleman of veracity, informs us that for several months past, an animal of singular aspect had been prowling around the township, frightening men, women, and children, and attacking and killing dogs, though strange to say, it has never been known to injure or destroy stock. It was first seen last August by Mr. Keys, near the residence of Cyrel Carpenter. Since that time, different parties have run afoul of it, but none have either been prepared, or could muster sufficient courage to attack it. When finding itself discovered, it manifests no disposition to fight, but, on the contrary, trots off to more salubrious quarters. Last Friday Mr. Daniel Bedwell, a resident of the township, while out hunting, encountered the animal, and pursued it about five miles, but was unable to overtake it. During the chase, it leaped across Crooked Creek a distance of some 18 feet, with the agility of a cat. Mr. Bedwell, who had a very near view of it several times, and who has lived in the West several years and is familiar with the various animals that have inhabited this part of the country, says it is neither a lynx, panther, nor any other kind of a quadruped that he ever saw. He describes it as being of a color between a red and a gray, nearly the size of a panther, and with hind legs about one-half as long as the fore legs. It has a hissing, screeching cry, quite terrifying to persons not accustomed to hearing it. A grand hunt is being organized among the residents of the neighborhood it infests for the purpose of capturing it. Its presence in Oakland Township is, of course, a mystery. Some account for it on the supposition that it is one of a cage of animals which, according to a current report, recently broke loose and escaped from a circus in Missouri."

THE EFFECTS OF TEA ON THE SKIN.—If you pour a few drops of strong tea on a piece of iron—a knife blade, for instance—the tannate of iron is formed, which is black, you mix it with human blood, it forms with the iron of blood, the tannate of iron. Now when we consider that the liquids which enter the stomach are rapidly absorbed by the veins and absorbents of the stomach, and enter into the circulation, and are thrown out of the system by the skin, respiration and the kidneys, it is probable that a drink so common as tea and so abundantly used, will have some effect. Can it be possible that tannin introduced with so much warm liquor, producing perspiration, will have no effect upon the skin? Look at the tea-drinkers of Russia, the Chinese, and the old women of America, who have so long continued in the habit of drinking strong tea. Are they not dark-colored and leather-skinned? When young they were fair complexioned.—Health Reformer.

Proceedings of the City Council.

Present—His Honor Mayor Thielepape, Aldermen—Messrs. Elmendorf, Gross, Norton, Pentzrieder, Bell and Gamble.

The minutes of the meeting of January 31st, 1870, were read and adopted.

The monthly rent for fire company No. 1, \$10 coin, was paid.

The city officers reports for the month of January, 1870, as well as the several bills were referred to the Finance committee for examination.

The committee on Public Improvements for the present, except in case of utmost necessity, as the erection of an iron bridge over the San Antonio river, on Paseo st., the most necessary and important improvement to be made, do not recommend any improvements of less importance for the present.

Report of Finance Committee read and adopted as follows:

Recommend the payment of account of P. Ramball.

In regard to the petition of W. A. Menger, that if fire company No. 2 are willing to deduct from the capital on which the city is paying interest to them, any payment which may be made by the city to said W. A. Menger, that then the city collector be authorized to receive from said W. A. Menger, in place of his tax on real estate for 1869, a receipt to be given by said fire company to the city, as above set forth, for each amount as said tax may come to.

Your committee recommend the appointment of W. Schenke, as city assessor for the present year, at a compensation not exceeding \$50 U. S. currency, for the whole labor to be performed.

The petition of Catharine Schneider for the care of pauper C. Arnold, ordered that she be allowed \$16 U. S. currency per month.

Upon the affidavit of Charles Frames, that the deed to a certain lot of land to the St. Mary's college, donated by the city, had been lost, the Mayor was authorized to execute a deed according to the donation made August 1860, to said college.

The petition of ——— to open a pent on ——— street, to commence along east bank of the river, referred to Improve ment committee.

The petition of citizens in regard to the condition of Garden street, referred to the committee on Petitions and Ordinances. The board adjourned.

JACOB SCHNEIDER, of Jasper County, got mad and swallowed a pen-knife, with all the blades open, the other day. Since then, he has complained of cutting pains in his stomach.

An Ordinance.

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1868.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio: SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit:

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate money, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SEC. 2. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

SEC. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed, January 31st, A. D. 1870. Published February 2, A. D. 1870.

The ordinance above referred to had passed on January 16th, 1866, reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE.

Concerning payments made in Confederate money or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to divers persons, declaring the instrument of writing purporting to be deeds from the city of San Antonio for said lands, to be null and void, and allowing credits on account of said principal and interest for the market value of the amounts paid at the time of payments.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio do not recognize the act or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, until the sixth day of October, 1865, in asserting in the name of said city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or currency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time in payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SEC. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, all such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts, for such payments, together with such instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from this city, within three months after the passage of this ordinance and shall at the same time surrender such instruments of writing for cancellation, shall receive from the Mayor of this city a receipt on account of the actual market value of the bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip so paid by such person or persons at the time of the payment, there provided, that such person or persons shall at the same time execute and deliver to the Mayor, an instrument of writing wholly cancelling and annulling the writings heretofore executed and delivered to such person or persons by persons acting in the name of this city, as aforesaid, and putting this city in the same position, with the same price and charge upon such lands as before such payments.

SEC. 3. That in case any person or persons, having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing, then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that therefor such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provisions hereof, and for the recovery of the principal and interest, due to this city upon such bonds.

SEC. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed Jan. 16th 1866. Mayor's Office San Antonio Jan. 16th 1866. (Signed) D. CLEVELAND, Mayor.
