SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.

The small pox is abating.  
McClellan has been tendered the first  
and Hancock the second office of the Grand  
Army of the Constitution.

Orders have been received from Wash-  
ington to clear the docks for the Spanish  
iron clads.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 14.  
Two slight earth quakes have been felt  
here.

Three steamers left New York this week  
with arms for the insurgents.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.  
The Ways and Means committee consid-  
ered extending the whiskey bonds to three  
years; also a memorial from the New Or-  
leans Chamber of Commerce, presented by  
Gen. Sypher, against the sugar tariff.

House—The memorial of the New Or-  
leans Chamber of Commerce regarding  
the sugar tariff, presented by Schenck,  
was referred back to the committee.

Various disability bills were presented.

The yeas and nays were called and  
progressing, on the resolution that Wash-  
ington and Georgetown should support their  
papers without Federal aid.

Senate—The President transmitted the  
report of the Secretary of War, regarding  
Georgia.

Revenue three quarters of a million.

The District of Columbia is included in  
Canby's military department.

The President accepts the resignation of  
Clark, Assessor of the 1st Georgia District.  
C. T. Watson is nominated for the vacancy.

The Judiciary committee reported favor-  
ably on Streng and Bradley by one  
majority.

No action has been had on the plan of  
trying contested election cases by draw-  
ing. A committee or jury, from the House  
was defeated on the motion to suspend the  
rules by a vote of 78 to 104. The com-  
mittee are opposed to the plan.

In the House a resolution was intro-  
duced declaring it to be the sense of the  
House that the business interests of the  
country required an increase of the value  
of the currency, and the introduction of  
the committee on banking and currency,  
a report as soon as possible.

A bill increasing the currency at least  
fifty millions.

A motion to table this failed by a vote  
of 93 to 73. It comes up Monday next.

Logan spoke in favor of the recognition  
of the belligerency of Cuba.

A resolution was adopted requesting the  
President to inform the House whether the  
order given to clear the docks at New  
York, was for repairing war vessels, and if  
so, by what authority.

Appropriations were resumed. Adjourned.

Senate—A communication from the Sec-  
retary of War, upon affairs in Georgia,  
with credentials of the Senators elect,  
Hill and Miller, were referred to the Judi-  
ciary committee.

The Secretary of the Treasury directed  
a report asking whether the public inter-  
est would not be subserved by removing  
the branch mint from New Orleans to New  
York.

A bill has been introduced to enforce  
the fifteenth Amendment by granting suf-  
frage of State and county elections, and  
punishing any neglect or refusal to assess  
and collect a tax when its payment is a  
qualification of an elector.

The Mississippi bill was considered  
without definite action. A motion to post-  
pone it resulting in the vote determined in  
the negative by the vote of the Vice Pre-  
sident. Adjourned.

The Supreme Court decided against  
McClellan in the great New Iberia quiet  
silver case.

The President appointed Wm. T. Price  
postmaster at Augusta.

ATLANTA, Feb. 14.  
A resolution to elect to-morrow United  
States Senators for the terms ending  
March 4th 1873 and 1877, passed both  
houses.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 14.  
Gallagher whipped Curley in nineteen  
rounds. Genl. Ewell is at the St. Charles  
Hotel.

In the Legislature a resolution was in-  
troduced, forbidding E. S. Jewell of the  
Commercial Bulletin from entering the  
House of Representatives. The cause al-  
leged is Mr. Jewell's language regarding  
the members, and his political course. A  
safe in the residence of J. S. Clarke, was  
blown open and robbed of \$20,000 dollars.

## Legislative Proceedings.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—THIRD DAY.  
AUSTIN, TEXAS, Feb. 11, 1870.

House met pursuant to adjournment.  
Roll called, quorum present. The Journal  
of yesterday was read and approved.

Hon. W. B. Strimman of 4th district then  
came forward and took the oath.

The next being the Report Committee.  
Hon. Geo. H. Slaughter, Chairman of the  
Committee to wait upon the Command-  
ing General, Governor and Senate, report-  
ed back to the House that they had dis-  
charged their duties, and asked to be dis-  
charged.

On motion of Hon. F. G. Franks the  
Committee was discharged.

The following communication was then  
received and read:

On the first ballot Mr. J. F. Stokes re-  
ceived a majority of votes, and was declar-  
ed duly elected.

Hon. M. L. Armstrong offered the fol-  
lowing which was adopted:

Resolved, That the clerk number the  
seats of this House, and the same be de-  
termined by ballot at 11 1/2 o'clock to-day.

The Hon. B. F. Williams offered the fol-  
lowing resolution which was laid on the  
table.

Resolved, That this body proceed to the  
election of a Chaplain to wait on this  
body.

Resolution offered by the Hon. T. J.  
Chambers.

Resolved, That the House proceed to the  
election of a Chaplain for the House of  
Representatives—Ruled out of order.

The following motion offered by Hon.  
Mr. McLean:

That the vote tabling the resolution be  
reconsidered and that this motion be  
tabled.

Mr. Franks offered the following which  
was adopted.

Resolved, That the Roll be called, and a  
page appointed by the Speaker who shall  
proceed to draw for seats, as the names  
are called.

Adjourned to 10 A. M. to-morrow.

SENATE.

Senate met pursuant to adjournment,  
Lieut. Gov. J. W. Flanagan, presiding.

Roll called—quorum present. Absent,  
three members. Minutes of yesterday  
read. Senator Bowers suggested a correc-  
tion therein by inserting his motion of yester-  
day, "to dispense with services of a sec-  
ond Assistant Secretary for the present,  
which was, on motion of Senator Hertz-  
berg, laid on the table."

Senator Bowers moved that a committee  
of three be appointed to wait on the Com-  
manding General and notify him of the  
complete organization of the Senate, and  
its readiness for business. Adopted.

The President appointed on said com-  
mittee Senators Flanagan, Broughton and  
Grimes.

Senator Fountain moved that a commit-  
tee be appointed to wait upon and notify  
His Excellency, the Governor, that the Sen-  
ate had completed its organization, and  
was ready for the transaction of business.

The President appointed Senators Foun-  
tain, Ruby and Douglas on said commit-  
tee.

Senator Bowers moved that a committee  
be appointed to prepare rules and regula-  
tions for the government of the Senate.  
Adopted.

ers, Parsons and Campbell on said commit-  
tee.

SENATORIAL establishments are the fashion in Austin; cigars and liquor free.

THE played-out Austin ring are said to be the saddest looking fellows in Texas to-day.

THE new Legislature now in session at Austin is the youngest, best looking, most promising body ever assembled in Texas.

PLEASE withdrew from the vault of the State Treasury the tin box containing \$28,000 gold, belonging to the Central-Railroad. It is rumored that the President of that corporation is on hand at Austin.

GOVERNOR Davis is expected to visit San Antonio with his family on their way to Austin. He will be likely to remain a few days, and several prominent strangers are contemplating visiting our old town at the same time.

THE agents of the speculators of the Memphis, El Paso and Pacific Railroad are in attendance on the Legislature. They said that through false representations \$10,000,000 of the bonds of this road were sold in France at about 80 cts. Fremont has struck another Mareposas in France.

FLAKE and ourselves agree pretty much in its estimate of Gen. Reynolds and Radicalism, whether it is abstract or concrete.

The above is from the San Antonio Herald. We have always been of opinion that Flake has for years been working for the Democratic party; but the fellow was smart enough to blind his readers with his talk about loyalty and independent Republicanism. Lately he allowed the cat to slip out of the bag, and now appears as true confederate of the Democratic party. His bitterness against Reynolds and the Radicals is easily explained by his having lost the public pap.

THE Herald has it that A. J. Evans has been elected Speaker of the House. This is a mistake. The name of the Speaker is J. H. Evans, of Nueces. As he was not a member of the Convention, when Ab-initio originated, he does not claim to be nor does any body charge him with being the author of it.

A. J. Evans, who was an ab-initio man, is now member of the Senate for McLennan and Falls Counties. He was an adherent to Jack Hamilton, but has now joined the Davis Republicans, and proposes to abandon the hopeless Haynes coalition and act in good faith with the Republican party of the State.

The Situation in Georgia.

Final Organization of the Legislature—A Loyal Majority in Both Branches—Exciting scenes—Personal Altercation Between Tweedy and Bryant.

Special Correspondence Clin. Gazette. ATLANTA, January 28.

A very exciting scene occurred in the House to-day, which resulted in a triumph for the Republicans. In order to convey a clear idea of the whole matter, it will be necessary to give a brief statement of the proceedings yesterday.

As soon as the House was called to order yesterday, by Speaker McWhorter, and after prayer and the reading of the journal, a communication from Governor Bullock, addressed to the Hon. Robert McWhorter, Speaker of the House was received and read. It was to the effect that General Terry, the military commander of the district, was clearly of the opinion that according to the usage, and also the code of Georgia, the persons eligible at the time of the election, who received the next highest number of votes to those who had been declared ineligible, were entitled to the seats so vacated, and that they should be at once sworn in and take their places as members of the House; and further, that although such was the opinion of General Terry, yet General Terry preferred that the House

should, by its own action, adopt the course indicated, and admit such parties, rather than to exercise the power vested in him as District Commander for the purpose. The Governor closed his communication with an earnest recommendation that the House should avail itself of the courtesy thus extended by the military commander and at once swear in the parties in question, who were present. This communication created great excitement in the minds of the opposition, and they at once set about to defeat its intention—in which effort they were greatly aided, from the fact that the communication itself was read in so hurried a manner and so low a tone, that it was but imperfectly understood by a large number of the members present. Bryant, the "holter," now acting with and leading the Democrats, was immediately on his feet and delivered a speech against the admission of the persons referred to. He was followed by Floyd, of Scott, to the same effect. Speaker McWhorter was constantly interrupted and annoyed by the latter person, Scott, of Floyd, who in the most impertinent manner presumed to cross-examine him in relation to almost every ruling which he made upon points of order. After considerable confusion, the Speaker ruled that the parties having the next highest vote were entitled to the seats which had been filled by those who had been declared ineligible. This was appealed from, and the question was put upon sustaining the Chair, and the ayes and nays called. This vote resulted in the appeal being sustained by a vote of 65 to 63, thus showing a majority of two in favor of the enemies of reconstruction. A motion was then made in the interest of the Republicans to adjourn, which was lost by two votes. Considerable noise and confusion then arose, Bryant and Scott appearing to have everything their own way. The Speaker, yet new in his place, did not appear to feel the importance of the position, or the extent of the authority with which he was clothed. The House finally agreed to a recess until 3 o'clock P. M.; and on reassembling at that time, to a further adjournment until 12 o'clock to-day. This was on the motion of the Bryant Democracy, who feared that they were not as strong as in the morning, and dared not risk a vote. At 12 o'clock to-day, accordingly, the House convened, when, after prayer, the reading of the journal of yesterday's proceedings was directed by the Speaker. At this naturally involved the re-reading of the House of Governor Bullock's communication, before referred to, it was strongly objected to by the Democrats, led on by Bryant and Floyd, the latter of whom began the same style of disrespectful and defiant conduct and language toward the Speaker. Both these gentlemen, however, as well as the Democrats generally, were considerably taken aback, by a most unexpected exhibition of firmness on the part of Speaker McWhorter, who seemed at length, and after his experience of yesterday, determined, to maintain the dignity of his office, and to enforce his authority with both dignity, nerve and intelligence. The gavel went down with force, and all motions of speeches were declared out of order until after the reading of the journal was finished.

The reading of the journal was followed by a communication from Gov. Bullock, together with one from Gen. Terry, who expressly stated over his official signature that the communication of the Governor of yesterday, had been submitted to him and was fully approved of by him. The reading of this decision of the District Commander had a marked effect. Mr. O'Neal of Lowndes, obtained the floor, and after reminding the Democrats of the folly of longer fighting against the Government, and warning them of the disastrous results of their past conduct in that regard, moved for a reconsideration of the proceedings of yesterday. The previous question was called, and all debate cut off. Bryant and Scott, of Floyd, made persistent but futile efforts to obtain the floor and indulge in their usual strain of inflammatory and treasonable declaration. They seemed determined to trample under foot all rules of order, and to defy the Speaker; but with unshaken firmness Mr. McWhorter held the reins, and compelled them to keep the peace. Amid much noise and confusion, however, a vote was reached, and the action of yesterday was reconsidered by a vote of yeas 68, nays 58—a Republican majority of ten. Scott of Floyd, then moved to adjourn, which was lost, on the call for yeas and nays, by a vote of 66 to 56. Much noise and disturbance then arose—Scott trying to make a speech—and cries of "order, order," mixed with the loud raps of the Speaker's gavel, resounded through the House. In the midst of this din Mr. Tweedy, of Richmond, was drawn into a personal altercation with Bryant, whom he had called to order. Bryant said that Tweedy was "a miserable liar," and blows

would have been exchanged on the floor of the House, if the members immediately around had not interfered between them. At this time the rebel crowd in the lobby took part in the proceedings by their yells and cries, and it seemed for a moment that blood would be shed, and that the frantic and enraged Democracy would break up the entire legislative organization by violence. Mr. Anderson, of Cobb, here arose, and being a Democrat, obtained a hearing. With a noble and patriotic spirit honorable to himself, he rebuked the violent and disgraceful conduct of his associates, and in eloquent terms denounced it as shameful and illegal. His remarks, together with the determined stand of Speaker McWhorter, and the fact (which began to be remembered) that the military was within easy call, and Gen. Terry a man not to be trifled with, finally had the effect to restore order. A resolution was then offered by Mr. Tweedy, of Richmond, declaring the persons named in the communication of Gov. Bullock, and according to the decision of the District Commander, entitled to seats as members. This was carried under the previous question by a majority of ten votes, and they were then sworn in and took their seats. John L. Newton, Esq., was then elected Clerk, and Moses H. Baily—the latter colored—Messenger. Both these were the regular nominees of the Republicans.

A. H. Gaston, the regular nominee for Doorkeeper, was defeated by R. F. Lineburger, who is a one-armed Union Soldier, and run as an independent candidate. He is a Republican. Gaston, the defeated candidate, is "colored." The House then adjourned until to-morrow.

I regret to have to state that the altercation between Messrs. Tweedy and Bryant resulted in a personal encounter, soon after the adjournment and in the hall of the building but entirely outside of the Legislative Chamber. I have taken great care to get the facts from eye witnesses, and was not far from the spot myself. The statement which is here given may be relied upon as correct. The parties met in the hall, and Mr. Tweedy, who is much smaller in stature than Bryant, but "full of pluck," requested Bryant to take back the language used in the House, and to make an apology for it. "You have called me a miserable liar, and I wish you to take it back, and to make an apology." These were the words of Tweedy. Bryant refused to take the words back or to make an apology. Tweedy then struck him with his fist in the face. Bryant then raised his cane and struck at Tweedy. The latter also had a cane, which he now used, giving Bryant a blow upon the forehead, which drew blood. At this time Bryant's courage oozed out, and he turned and fled into the Representative Chamber, dodging about among the empty chairs, calling "help me from that man." Tweedy did not follow him up or pursue him. He, however, soon after walked in a deliberate and quiet manner into the legislative chamber where Bryant was and through the chamber and out at the other door, thus giving Bryant opportunity to resent the blow he had received and renew the combat if he saw fit to do so. Bryant, however, seemed completely cowed down, and without either spirit or courage.

I presume that Bryant and his Democratic allies will try and make political capital out of this. The facts however, are as above stated. Bryant was the aggressor. People who use such language on the floor when the rules of the house and privilege of the place protect them from deserved personal chastisement must expect to hold themselves responsible outside afterward. The organization of both branches of the Legislature is now complete with a loyal majority—and Georgia may now soon be expected to be admitted into full fellowship with the other States of the Union. GEORGIA.

It has been decided at the Internal Revenue office that the beer consumed by the employees at breweries is not subject to tax, inasmuch as section 49, act of July 13, 1866, provides for the payment of tax on malt liquors when sold or removed for consumption, and as such liquor is neither sold for consumption, it is not subject to tax.

TAKING a walk over the lands adjoining the eastern part of the city, towards Dignowity's property, we noticed large heaps of rubbish together with carcasses of dogs and other animals within the limits of the city, close enough to poison the air of San Antonio with its pestilential scent.

Instead of enjoying our walk, we were so disgusted with the sight and smell of this place that we returned at once.

Is there no provision in our charter which authorizes our city fathers to remove the carcasses and prohibit further nuisance of this character? If so, let us have an ordinance and punish offenders severely. The hot season is drawing near and everything ought to be done to keep the city and its neighborhood clean.

**ADJOURNMENT OF THE DISTRICT COURT.**—AN INTERESTING TERM. The District Court, Judge Van Antwerp presiding, adjourned on Saturday the 19th instant, after a session of two months—the term having commenced on the 13th of December, with a recess barely sufficient to cover the holidays. When the term opened, there were 630 civil suits upon the docket, with a few criminal cases—most of the latter having been transferred to the Criminal Court of the city of San Antonio.

Of the 630 civil suits above alluded to, covering some 53 pages of the docket, over 400 were regularly called, and action, in some way, taken upon each one of them. The docket was cleared finally and forever, of about 130 of these cases, either by dismissal, or judgments rendered in them, through verdicts of either juries or the Court—by agreement. Of the large remaining number, many were continued over till the next term, upon affidavits or agreement; while the arguments in quite a number of others, upon motions and demurrers, occupied a great deal of time—a fourth, if not a third, of the entire term. For example, in the "quadrilateral" case—as it has been not inaptly styled—that of *McLane vs. McClara*, (a Paymaster in the U. S. Army, and whose property here was sequestered during the rebellion, upon the ground that he was an "alien enemy.") Waelder and Leigh—in this case alone, some four or five days were consumed, in arguments upon motions and demurrers, when finally, it went over to the next term, on the affidavit of one of the parties.

In many of the cases, judgments were rendered, and decrees entered up, fixing the titles to valuable lands and lots in and about the city of San Antonio; while in others, damages for pretty heavy amounts, were given, or refused, by verdicts of juries or the Judge.

Three peculiarly interesting cases, growing out of the late war of the rebellion, were acted upon, to wit: the "quadrilateral," above referred to—and certain facts connected with which, still remain to be decided by a jury; the case of *Murphy vs. Twohig*, growing out of a very large nitre and cotton transaction with the rebel government, in 1862-3—through which, profits to the amount of \$300,000 or \$400,000 are alleged in the petition to have been made; but in which case, the plaintiff, *Murphy*, was thrown out of Court, on the plea of his partner, (the defendant *Twohig*), that his own contract with the rebel government was illegal and original—as was the fact; and lastly, the case of *Danby vs. Schmetz*, involving the question of the destruction of the "Alamo Express" newspaper establishment, in May, 1861—proven to have been an act of the rebellion. Each one of these three cases excited, naturally, considerable interest.

Then, there were ten divorce cases, in which, upon verdicts rendered by juries, decrees of divorce, including the disposition to be made of children and property, were ordered by the Court.

On the whole, the term has been one during which a great deal has been accomplished; vastly more, certainly, than during any term that has been held here since the commencement of the war; and quite as much, probably, as at any term ever held here prior thereto.

It is safe to say, moreover, that if parties and counsel had been found ready when their cases were called, at least double the number might have been finally disposed of that were; for the delay caused by tedious examinations into papers, with other causes, frequently occupying as much time as a trial should have done; and then, after all this delay, the case was found to be "not ready for trial." This, under all the circumstances, seemed to be unavoidable—caused by the loss of papers, the deaths, in a large number of cases, of

parties to the suits; nay the death, or removal hence, in quite as many, perhaps, of the original counsel in the cases. Many instances of this sort, were partially cleared up, by such examinations into them; new parties made; counsel assigned, &c., &c.; and thus, it is hoped, they will be ready to be disposed of at the next term of the Court—now but three weeks off. Every case on the "Motion Docket," and all but two of the criminal cases, were disposed of, within the last four or five days of this term of the Court.

### An Ordinance,

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to divers persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit:

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SEC. 2. That all persons who owe interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

SEC. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

The ordinance above referred to and passed on January 16th, 1866, reads as follows:

### AN ORDINANCE,

Concerning payments made in Confederate money or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to divers persons, declaring the instrument of writing purporting to be deeds from the city of San Antonio for said lands, to be null and void, and allowing credits on account of said principal and interest for the market value of the amounts paid at the time of payments.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the act or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, until the 31st day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of said city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or currency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time in payment of the principal and interest, or either of them, due to the said city upon lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SEC. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861. All such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts, for such payments, together with such instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from this city, within three months after the passage of this ordinance, and shall at the same time surrender such instruments of writing for cancellation, shall receive from the Mayor of this city a receipt on account of the actual market value of the bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip so paid by such person or persons at the time of the payment thereof; provided, that such person or persons shall at the same time execute and deliver to the Mayor, an instrument of writing wholly cancelling and annulling the writings heretofore executed and delivered to such person or persons by persons writing in the name of this city, as aforesaid, and putting this city in the same position, with the same price and charge upon such lands as before such payments.

SEC. 3. That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing; then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that thenceforth such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provisions hereof, and for the recovery of the principal and interest, due to this city upon such bonds.

SEC. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

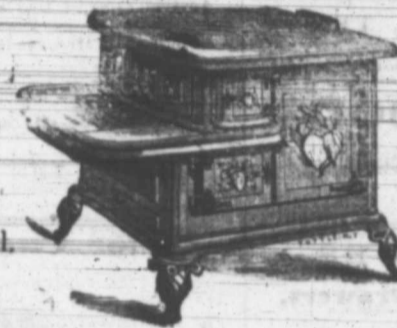
