Squandering of Public Money.

Since the result of the last election has been made known and the victory of the Republican party became a fact, the leading Journals of the Coalitionists, amongst which his attousney in fact, and may be Flake's Bulletin figures prominently, have followed a policy of continually suspecting the honesty of the new Administration and Legislature, which is the more disgusting as this suspicion lacks every foundation in fact, and mainly deals in generalities and assumptions beyond measure.

It is well known that in the late Convention the squandering of publie money was a part of the policy of Hamilton and his associates; they drew double salary and were always ready to make appropriations for their friends; it is as well known and can be proven that the money of the Central Railroad and that time. other speculative corporations had, at a time, full sway over Austin and the Austin ring; the Convention tax was forced through by the votes of the Hamiltonians, and against the wishes and the votes of the Davis Republicans; the Austin Republican, the organ of the Austin ring, drew \$18,000 from the State Treasury. All these are facts, which justify the assertion that in case of a Hamiltonian victory the lavishing of the public money would have been carried on in an extraordinary manner; for a Hamiltonian victory was equivalent to a selling out of the State to certain Railroad companies, and other corporations.

Mexican Claims.

Extracts from Opinions of the Uni ted States and Mexican Joint Claims Commission,

The following is an abstract of the apinions of the Commissioners elicited by various objections filed to cases, and present certain rules of practice, which are of interest, not only to counsel in cases before the Commissioner, but to all persons in-terested in the claims now pending before the commission: No. 388. Lewis Dusenburg vs. Mex-

Wadsworth.

1. When a claimant is absent from the State of his residence, his memorial may be filed in his name by verified by such attourney.

2. The memorial and affidavit setting forth that Jonathan D. Stevenson is the attourney in fact of the claimant, this is a sufficient averment of Stevenson's authority.

A claimant must state, either in the memorial or by affidavit whether be is a native or a foreignborn citizen. The mere staten that he is a citizen is too vague

4. A claimant must disclose bis domicil in his memorial, both at the date of the injuries or losses complained of by him, and at he time of filing his memorial.

5. The statement of the claimant that he was residing in California on the 30th of April, 1855, does not show that he was domiciled there at

It requires both intention and fact to constitute domicile : residence with "an indefinite intention of re maining," residence _ "accompanied with positive or presumptive proof for continuing it for an an unlimited time," "a permanent settlement for an indefinite time," "a fixed habita tion without any present intention of removing therefrom." Claimants can state concisely the facts constituting the domicile claimed by them, or they can directly aver that at the time of the several wrongs and injuries complained of by them, they were domiciled in the United States or Mexico, in such a place, as the case may be. But the rules require that the domicile must be disclosed, at that time, as well as at the date of the memorial.

No. 119. Jules E. Caire vs. Mexico. The Commissioners per Wadsworth.

1. A claimant must disclose in his memorial his domicile, both at the time of filing his memorial and at the date of the occurrences complained of by him

He must also state whether he presented his claim prior to the 1st of February, 1869, to the Department of State of either Government, or to the Minister of the States at Mexico, or that of the Mexican Government at Washington, and to which, and at what time

No. 253. Peter Berg vs. Mexico. The Commissioners, per Wads-

Where it does not appear to the Commssioners that the claimant has a solicitor, the memorial will not be rejected because not signed by one. be rejected because not signed by one, the commissioners not wishing, by any rule of theirs to compel claimants to employ counsel.

2. Where the claimant sets forth plainly the injuries, losses, and expense for which he makes reclamation, and refers to other memorials and papers in other cases before the commission, giving full details of the

on this subject.
3. Where the memorial avers that the claimant is a naturalized citizen of the United States, and deon the 7th of May, 1855, and is claiming for injuries which he received in the tall of the same year, the memorial does distinctly show that the process of naturalization under the principal law completed after the event complained of, and plainly presents the question of character for decision at the proper time.

No. 394. George T. Knox vs. Mexico. The Commissioners, per Wadsworth.

1. The memorial avers that the claimant is a naturalized citizen of the United States. This must be taken to refer to the time at which to defeat the plans of such mev, we the memorial bears date, it is necessary that the memorial should show citizenship at the time of the occurrences complained of. The memorial in the above case is rejected under this principle. In the foregoing cases, in which the objections to the form of the memorials were sustained, leave was granted to the claimants to amend the memorials without prejudice to the merits of the cases.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonie:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, a. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit:

That all persons interested, their agents That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Autonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, a. D. 1861, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as aboyio-stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.


