PARIS, February 16.
All the Journals consider the speech of
the King of Prussia as menacing.
The Continental banks generally are re-
ducing the rates of interest.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16.
Orders are issued to stop all enlistments
for the army, the force being full.
The Naval committee agreed to give ter-
ritorial matters attention.
In the Senate nothing of importance
transpired.
Revenue \$242,000.
The small pox is raging among the Mon-
tana Indians.
The Ways and Means committee by 5 to
4, voted to make the Revenue Bureau a
department with a seat in the Cabinet.
Senate—A resolution of the Alabama
Legislature, favoring the postal telegraph,
was presented.
A bill introduced providing artificial
limbs for soldiers, which provoked a long
discussion.
Sayers offered an amendment excluding
from its benefits, soldiers of 1812, or the
Mexican war, who aided the rebellion
without action.
The Mississippi bill was resumed. An
amendment was introduced repealing the
fundamental conditions of the Virginia
bill.
The debate was quite strong. Adjourned
without action.
House—A petition remanding Missis-
sippi to a territorial condition, for disloyalty,
was referred to the reconstruction com-
mittee.
Banks introduced a resolution author-
izing and instructing the President to main-
tain absolute neutrality between Spain
and the Cubans. Referred to the com-
mittee on foreign relations.
Van Wyck has been finally seated, 119
to 51. House adjourned.

from Europe.
MADRID, Feb. 16.
Prin assured the Cortes of a visit from

OFFICIAL
LAW
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Second Session of
the Forty-first Congress.
[PUBLIC RESOLUTION—No. 8.]
A Resolution authorizing the Passport
Clerk at the Department of State to ad-
minister oaths and affirmations on ap-
plications for passports.
Resolved by the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives of the United States of America in
Congress assembled, That the clerk in the
Department of State who may from time
to time be assigned to the duty of exam-
ining applications for passports, is hereby
authorized and empowered to receive and
administer, but without charge to the applicant,
all oaths, affidavits, or affirmations which
are or may be required by law, or by the
rules of the Department of State, to be
made before granting such passport or
passports; and such oaths, affidavits, or
affirmations shall be deemed to be made
under the pains and penalties of perjury.
Approved, February 3, 1870.
[PUBLIC—No. 9.]
An act to protect officials in government
employ.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of
Representatives of the United States of America
in Congress assembled, That no officer or
clerk in the United States government em-
ploy shall at any time solicit contributions
of other officials or employees in the gov-
ernment service for a gift or present to
those in a superior official position; nor
shall any such officials or clerical superiors
receive any gift or present offered or pre-
sented to them as the contribution of those
in government employ receiving a less sal-
ary than themselves; nor shall any officer
or clerk violating any of the provisions of
this bill shall be summarily discharged
from the government employ.
Approved, February 3, 1870.

THE Country Gentleman (Al-
bany) has an article on the drain-

age of cellars. Taking a sanitary
view, it says:
"When we reflect what the cellar
bottom has absorbed, in a half
century's use, of the juices of tur-
nips and onions, of cider and brine,
not to mention cats, rats, and mice,
and a thousand nameless horrors,
we may imagine what sort of a
soup is produced by the rising of
the water to the depth of a few
inches, and its stagnation beneath
the floors of our parlors, dining-
rooms, and kitchens."
We have no doubt but that if
the statistics of death in the houses
where water in the cellar is common
if not constant, could be carefully
given, some problems would be
solved that have puzzled physicians
and neighborhoods for many a year.
Why people should die in one
house, apparently before time, and
live in the surface circumstances
seemed the same, has been in many
places a grave question. A good
drain from the cellar or a coating
of cement on the bottom and sides
might satisfy public wonder by
making two houses within twenty-
yards of each other equally healthy,
which in numberless localities is
not the case to-day.

The Working Farmer (New York),
in talking about family gardening,
remarks:
"It is surprising to notice how
much of pleasure and profit a me-
chanic or a merchant, by an hour or
two of pleasant labor, before or
after his day's work, will derive
from an insignificant patch, hardly
worthy to be called a garden. And
yet many farmers seem to think a
garden not worth their attention.
This is a mistake; for it can cer-
tainly be shown that no part of a
farm repays labor better, as a
rightly conducted garden."
A good garden is an appendage
to a farm that no farmer can afford
to be without, and in looking
forward to the next summer-time,
we suggest that each tiller of the
soil plan to have one spot where a
half hour at eventide spend among
long rows of luxuriant vegetable
growths shall give him a joy rarely
found elsewhere.

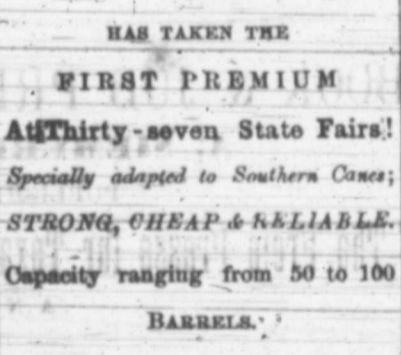

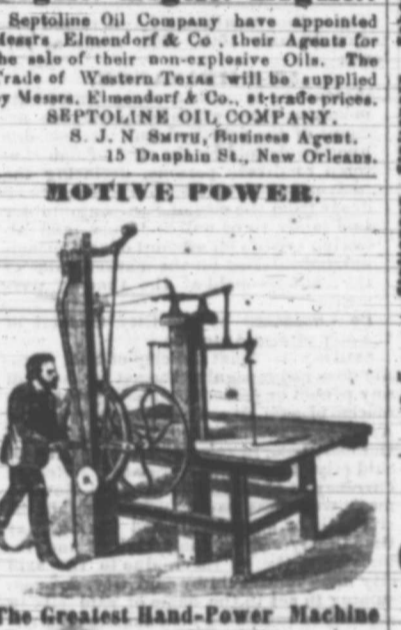
