### FIFTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

SENATE CHAMBER,  
February 12, 1870.  
Senate met pursuant to adjournment.  
Lt. Gov. J. W. Flanagan presiding. Roll  
called. Quorum present.

Absent—six members. Minutes of yester-  
day read.  
Senator Parsons suggested a correction  
therein by inserting the name of John G.  
Bell on the Committee on Federal Relations,  
it having been omitted on the previous  
day.

There being no further objections the  
minutes were adopted.  
Communications from His Excellency  
E. J. Davis, Provisional Governor of the  
State of Texas:

seats during the present session of the  
Legislature.

Adopted.  
Senator Mills moved to adjourn; which  
motion was afterwards withdrawn.

Resolution of Senator Douglass:  
Whereas, The proposed Constitution of  
the State of Texas has not yet received  
the final approval of Congress, and has  
no force or effect as law;

Be it therefore resolved by the Senate,  
That the Supreme Court Libraries, now at  
Galveston and Tyler, should not be dis-  
posed of by the State, or removed from  
those places, until after the State has been  
fully admitted, and the State Constitution  
has become binding as law.

Which resolution was objected to by  
Senator Ruby.

Whereupon, the Chair suggested that it  
cannot be entertained by this body at  
this time.

Senator Douglass appeals from the deci-  
sion of the Chair.

On motion of Senator Pridden it was  
moved and seconded to table the motion  
to appeal.

Which motion was lost.

Vote taken, and the Chair sustained in  
his decision.

Senator Evans, of McLennan, moved  
that the Senate of Texas (the House of  
Representatives concurring), proceed at  
the time and in the manner prescribed by  
the laws of Congress of the United States,  
to elect three United States Senators to  
represent the State of Texas in the United  
States Senate, as follows:

One to serve from the admission of the  
State to the 4th day of March, 1871.  
One to serve from admission until the  
4th day of March, 1872.  
One to serve from March 4th to March  
4th 1873.

Senator Fountain moved to refer said  
resolution to the committee on Federal  
Relations, which resolution was after-  
wards withdrawn.

Senator Tamm moved, as a substitute,  
that it go into the Committee of the  
Whole, which motion was adopted, and  
Senator Parsons appointed chairman.

Senator Evans proposed amendment to  
his resolution, by adding after the words  
"at the time and in the manner prescrib-  
ed by law," the words, "to-wit, Tuesday  
next, 19th Feb. 1870."

On motion of Senator Alford, Senate ad-  
journed until 10 o'clock Monday, 14th inst.  
Carried.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,  
House met pursuant to adjournment,  
Hon. Ira H. Evans in the Chair.  
Quorum present.

The minutes of yesterday were read and  
adopted.

The Speaker announced that the report  
of the Committee on Rules and Regula-  
tions of the House was now in order.

Hon. B. R. Hamley offered the follow-  
ing resolution:  
Resolved, That the rules of the Legisla-  
ture of Texas of 1869 shall be the rules of  
this House, until the same shall have been  
amended. Resolution adopted.

Hon. J. W. Johnson, of Marion, offered  
the following resolution:  
Resolved, That a committee of five be  
appointed to report on the 13th amend-  
ment of the Constitution. Adopted.

The Speaker appointed the following  
committee: Messrs. Johnson, of Marion,  
Young, Kendall, Cole and McLean.

Hon. M. L. Armstrong offered the fol-  
lowing resolution:  
Resolved, That the clerk have printed  
100 copies of the rules of this House for  
the use of the members thereof.

Hon. G. H. Slaughter moved to lay the  
resolution on the table. Adopted.

Hon. W. E. Hughes offered the follow-  
ing resolution:  
Resolved, That the Secretary of State be  
required to furnish the House 100 copies of  
the rules adopted for the government of  
the Legislature of A. D. 1869. Adopted.

Hon. Geo. H. Slaughter introduced the  
following joint preamble and resolutions:  
Whereas, It may be some time before  
Congress shall have acted upon the recep-  
tion or rejection of our new Constitution;  
and, Whereas, It is well known that the  
Judges of the Supreme Court now on the  
bench are, for reasons best known to them-  
selves, exerting their influence to secure  
an order from the Commanding General for  
the immediate removal of all Supreme  
Court Justices, sitting in the premises.

Whereas, It may be that the State Leg-  
islature, after the State becomes one of  
the Union, may never desire the removal  
of the Justices; therefore,  
Be it resolved by the Legislature of Tex-  
as, That the Commanding General is most  
respectfully, but earnestly petitioned to  
permit the books, records, papers and li-  
braries of the two branches of the Supreme  
Court to remain at their respective places  
at Galveston and Tyler—until, by action of  
Congress, it shall become the duty of the  
Legislature to act in the premises.

Mr. Armstrong moved to indefinitely  
postpone; upon which the yeas and nays  
were called for, and resulted as follows:  
Yeas 31; Nays 42. The indefinite post-  
ponement of the resolution lost.

Mr. McLean moved to proceed with the  
business on the Speaker's table. Lost.

Hon. J. P. Butler offered the following  
resolution:  
Resolved, That we proceed to ballot for  
United States Senators on Tuesday, Feb-  
ruary 15, at 12 M.

Hon. G. H. Slaughter moved to suspend  
the rules and take up the resolution. Yeas  
32, Nays 40. Motion lost.

Resolved, That that portion of the rules  
requiring a four-fifths majority to sus-  
pend the rules be repealed, and that the  
vote of a majority be sufficient to sus-  
pend the rules for the second and third  
reading of any bill or resolution.

The resolution was ruled out of order by  
the Speaker on the grounds that it re-  
quired one day's notice before making any  
changes in the regulations governing the  
House.

Hon. J. H. Butler then gave notice that  
he would offer a resolution to repeal that  
part requiring a four-fifths majority to  
suspend the rules on the second and third  
reading of any bill or resolution, on Mon-  
day next.

Hon. Mr. Franks moved that the House  
adjourn until Monday, the 14th inst., at  
10 o'clock a. m. Carried.

NEW ORLEANS has a German Veteran Republican Club.

BOTH houses of the Legislature have yesterday ratified the 15th Amendment.

THE seat of Nelson Plato, Representative from Nueces county, was taken from him and given to a seat-lawyer by the peculiar name of Schlickum.

Letter From Austin.

AUSTIN, Feb. 15th 1870.

Purging the House—Election of Public Printer—Senatorial Contest—Gen. Reynolds' Position.

The passage of the Constitutional Amendments by the Legislature has taken place without scarcely a ripple of the gently flowing current of Reconstruction.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Feb. 18, 1870.

Editor San Antonio Express: Joined action on Amendments; both houses ratified finally.

Hotels and Prices.

There is not a great difference in the cost of hotel living in different parts of the Continent of Europe; all are cheaper than the English hotels.

In Paris the rates are less, except, perhaps, at such "swell" establishments as the Grand Hotel.

In a joint session of the Legislature to-day, J. G. Tracy, of the Firm of Tracy, Siemering & Co., was elected State Printer, which will furnish a fresh text for all the sore-heads to preach from.

Since my last communication General Clark has arrived, ostensibly to run for the United States Senate, and to the discredit of the General rumors reached here in advance that he intended to buy his way into that high position, no doubt the work of his enemies.

General Clark would certainly show more modesty, and in the opinion of the best men in the State, more good sense and propriety by not offering himself as a Candidate in the face of the people, who have just elevated him to the splendid position of Representative to Congress.

General Bate's name has also been mentioned in connection with the Senatorship and he would certainly honor the State and is well deserving the confidence and gratitude of the loyal people for his role in East Texas.

Mr. Glenn is still prominent for a Senatorship, but his recent coming to the State and some doubts of his eligibility because of his having served the Confederacy, are strongly urged against him.

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TEXAS ITEMS.

AUSTIN is to have a joint stock Hotel.

R. O. Love of Houston, formerly of the Rusk Hotel, is suggested as the landlord.

The Galveston Dramatic and Musical combination is to perform in Austin.

One hundred cavalry recruits arrived at the Capitol on Sunday last.

The La Grange New Era says: "The stage from Brenham came in on Wednesday, and the driver coolly announced 'no mail'."

On the night of the last day of January, Santa Rita, ranch, six miles from Brownsville, was visited by a band of nine Mexicans armed with breach loaders and six shotguns.

The Indianola Bulletin acknowledges the receipt of a cabbage weighing 28 pounds, and of a turnip 10 pounds.

The Gonzales Index has the following record: "Some months since a party of Texans were practicing with six shooters at a target, when a wager was proposed that a piece of silver should be placed on a cork, on the head of the company, and the cork shot out, leaving the coin to rest upon the head of his friend, the wager was made, and at a distance of five paces the parties were placed in position, a target adjusted, and the feat performed without injury to the brave supporter of the target. fast sixty cents, dinner one dollar, service twenty-five cents a day; the whole amounting to from two dollars and sixty-five to three dollars and five cents a day, without wine. In Switzerland, room rent is very cheap, and a good chamber does not generally cost more than sixty cents a day; and dinner varies from sixty cents to one dollar, and you can make an agreement for any length of time to live comfortably at from seven to ten francs a day, or from one dollar and forty cents to two dollars a day.

At Rome, a clergyman of my acquaintance, who has refined tastes and a wife with good Boston notions of comfort, took rooms near our hotel, and assured me that he estimated his expenses at not more than one dollar and a half a day for each member of his family of seven persons. He hired pleasant apartments, and had his meals served and his work done by servants of his own.

I may as well say that in Europe everybody seems to drink wine at dinner, and the stomach is thought to be protected by it from the doubtful purities of most of the water. My experience favors the general impression that the water is often debilitating, and that a moderate allowance of light wine is proper, as it is common a frugal and temperate man may add from twenty-five to fifty cents to his daily expense for this item, or many substitute beer at half, perhaps quarter, the cost.

Of course we may greatly increase or lessen our expenses by our habits of frugality or extravagance. I am speaking of the moderate outlay for one person. If one has a private parlor, the amount is nearly doubled, and the presence of ladies always brings more formality, delicacy, attendance, and delay. If husband and wife travel together, the expenses are in most respects more than doubled, and even if they do not indulge in the luxury of a private parlor, they must expect to be subjected to the red-tape regulations which wait on all coaches, and which try to make out every lady to be a queen. It is not well to overlook any causes that change our rate of expenses. Thus, if we travel in a country where we have many friends who ask us to visit them or dine with them, our hotel bill may be less, but the cost of carriages and other incidentals may be more.

Rev. Dr. Grogan, who has recently returned from his European tour, gives, in the Evening Post, some practical notes on travel and life abroad, which will be of interest to those who are meditating a journey outre mer.

In traveling in America, he says, a large part of the expense is for transit from point to point, between hotel or house, and steamboats and stations. Thus you are usually charged a dollar and a half, and sometimes more, for a carriage to take you from your house in New York to the railway station, not a mile distant. In Europe the cost for such service is very little, and you find good conveyances within half at very low rates.

In London you can have a cab for a mile for twenty-five cents, and for greater distances at reduced rates. In Berlin you can have a cab for twenty minutes for twelve cents, and for half an hour for seventeen cents; and you can take your luggage with you for twelve cents additional. In Paris you have a good vehicle, with two seats, for forty-five cents an hour by day, and sixty cents at night, with a few cents extra charge for baggage, and about ten per cent. less if you take the vehicle in the public street, instead of ordering it at the stable. In Switzerland you can have a man and horse, or mule, a day for two dollars or two and a half, even in places where travellers are numerous; and in Germany seventy cents, or a German dollar, is thought fair pay for an intelligent guide in the city or country. In Venice, Florence, and Rome, a dollar secures you a well-informed guide; and Mr. Bruno, at the Hotel Angletterie, Rome, who is a most courteous as well as intelligent man, was most happy if he earned five francs a day for conducting strangers among the ruins and arts of that city.

The bridge on Paso street being badly damaged by the last flood, the Mayor gave orders of its unsafety, and warned all laden wagons not to cross it. A bridge is ordered and expected here shortly.

A new bridge for the street will be assumed too long, as the small has too short. This short notice is for special benefit of his Shortness, the eared fool of the Herald, with bridges of his brain.

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An Ordinance.

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to the persons, A. D. 1865.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so-called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to wit: That all persons interested, their agents or attorneys, be hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, and which said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated, are placed for settlement and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the final title to said parties.

SECTION 2. That all persons who own interests in lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same, are hereby notified that the amount hereinafter mentioned, by the City of San Antonio, to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1870, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

The ordinance above referred to and passed on January 16th, 1866, reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE. Concerning payments made in Confederate money or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio, to the persons, A. D. 1865.

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the set or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, until the ninth day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of said city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or currency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time, or other of them, in discharge of any lands sold by said city, or in assuming to act in the name of said city in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

SECTION 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have faithfully and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861. All such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, or currency, or scrip on account of the principal and interest, due to the city on lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts, for such payments, that such persons shall, at the same time execute and deliver to the Mayor, an instrument of writing, wholly cancelling and annulling the writings heretofore executed and delivered to such person or persons by persons acting in the name of this city, as aforesaid, and putting this city in the same position, with the same price and charge upon such lands as before such payments.

SECTION 3. That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing; then in that case the Mayor shall deliver such receipts, and persons, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

SECTION 4. That it shall be the duty of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provisions hereof, and for the recovery of the principal and interest, due to this city upon such bonds.

SECTION 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

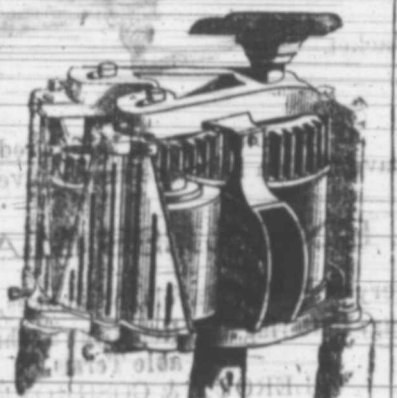
