Legislative Proceedings.
SEVENTH DAYS PROCEEDINGS.
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
AUSTIN, TEXAS, Feb. 15, 1870.
House met pursuant to adjournment.
Rolls called. Quorum present. The
Journal of yesterday read and adopted.
Mr. Franks offered the following report
from the committee on privileges and
elections.
Committee Rooms, Feb. 15th 1870.
To Hon. Ira H. Evans, Speaker of the
House of Representatives:
Your committee on elections to whom
was referred a contest between W. W.
Mills as contestant and I. H. Evans and
George Spencer as to the right to a seat
in the House of Representatives from the
90th district, beg leave to submit the following
report:
The contestant charges that fraud was
committed in the counting of the vote of
El Paso county, by which fraudulent count
200 votes that should have been counted
for him were counted for I. H. Evans and
George Spencer. An examination of the
tabular statement of the vote of El Paso
county as exhibited in General Orders No.
14, from Military Headquarters, shows
that in El Paso county I. H. Evans received
150 votes, and George Spencer 16 votes,
and W. W. Mills 105 votes. This statement
of facts refutes the charge of contestant.
No evidence was adduced before
your committee showing the commission
of fraud in El Paso county. On the contrary
all the evidence adduced shows that
each party exerted itself to have the election
conducted fairly and impartially, and
that no opportunity was allowed for fraud.
Your committee therefore report that the
charge of fraud in the election in El Paso
county is without foundation in fact, and
submit the following resolution and recom-
mend its adoption:
Resolved, that I. H. Evans and George
Spencer are entitled to the seats now held
by them in the House of Representatives,
and that W. W. Mills is not entitled to a
seat in this House.

1 o'clock P. M. Adopted.
Mr. Butler offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, that we proceed to ballot for
U. S. Senators on Wednesday Feb. 16th,
1870, at 12 o'clock M.
Resolution adopted.
Mr. Butler moved that a Committee of
Conference be appointed to confer with
the Senate in regard to the election of U.
S. Senators. Motion adopted.
The Speaker appointed the following
committee: Butler, Robinson and Hughes.
Mr. Abbott offered the following resolu-
tion:
Resolved, that the Chairman of the Com-
mittee on Printing and contingent ex-
penses be allowed to employ a clerk for said
committee.
Mr. Armstrong moved that the resolu-
tion be adopted.
Yeas 1. Nays 0.
The House refused to adopt the resolu-
tion.
Mr. Pierson offered to adopt the resolu-
tion, which, on motion of Mr. Butler, was
laid on the table.
Resolved, that the Chairman of the Com-
mittee on Elections be and is hereby au-
thorized and required to swear all witness-
es brought before his committee, and upon
the request of the party of parties interest-
ed, to issue process for witnesses and com-
mission to take depositions, in conformity
whenever as practicable to the laws of this
State, in addition to the taking and re-
turning evidence in cases of contested
elections in the Legislature.
Mr. Butler moved that the resolution be
laid on the table.
Laid upon the table.
Mr. McLean moved to reconsider the
vote laying the resolution upon the table.
Laid.
Mr. Cooper moved to proceed with the
business on the Speaker's table. Carried.
Whereupon the Speaker announced the
receipt of General Order No. 24, from
Military Headquarters 5th Military District,
which was read and received, and made a part
of proceedings, &c.

ence to the claim of J. K. Burnett to the
seat of A. D. Elam.

Whereas, A. D. Elam, Esq., who received
a certificate of election as one of the
Representatives elect from the 3d Sena-

manding General, ineligible to a seat in
this body; and whereas J. K. Burnett re-
ceived the next highest number of votes
for the aforesaid position in said District:
Therefore be it,
Resolved, that J. K. Burnett be and he is
hereby declared entitled to a seat in this
body as Representative from the 3d Sena-
torial District in the place of A. D. Elam
who is disqualified.

Mr. Hughes, having asked permission to
have his reasons spread on the Journal
for not voting in the affirmative on the
ratification of the Fifteenth Amendment to
the Constitution, was refused by the
House.
Mr. Franks moved to reconsider the
vote of the House, and to allow Mr.
Hughes permission to have his reasons
for voting in the negative spread upon
the Journal. Carried.
"I dissent from the ratification of the
XVth Amendment, because I oppose it on
principle, as it robs my State of the last
vestige of State sovereignty, and gives to
the Federal Government, by implication,
at least—control of that priceless jewel of
Democratic government—individual suffrage
and because, as I believe, a majority
of the people whom I represent are not
voluntarily in favor of its ratification."
"I cast my vote against it for the further
reason that the political sentiment of this
body is such as to insure its ratification
thereby in effect, reducing my delibera-
tions to the simple question of principle."

man, Schutze, Tegner, S. S. Weaver and
Zoeller. Quorum present.
The Speaker announced that nomina-
tions for State Printer were in order.

Mr. Morrison nominated Mr. J. G. Tracy.
Mr. Chambers nominated Mr. Hamilton
Stewart. Mr. Grothaus nominated Mr. W.
R. Davis. Before the vote was taken, Mr.
Grothaus withdrew the name of W. R. Davis.
The result of the joint vote was as fol-
lows: J. G. Tracy 57 votes; Tracy & Sim-
mering 6 votes; Charles D. Morse 22 votes;
C. F. Garland 1 vote; Hamilton Stewart 1
vote.
Mr. J. G. Tracy having received a majori-
ty of all the votes cast, was declared duly
elected State Printer.
The Senate retired to its Chamber.
Mr. Grothaus moved that this House ad-
journ until to-morrow at 10 o'clock, A. M.
Carried.

Senator W. R. Pyle is entitled to a seat in
that body by taking required oath; and
papers relating to contested seat, accom-
panying.
On motion of Senator Ruby the papers
were referred to committee on contested
elections.
Report of committee on Federal Rela-
tions recommending the immediate consid-
eration and passage of the 15th Amend-
ment to the U. S. Constitution.
Senator Flanagan moved the adoption of
the report. Carried.
Committee from the House to confer
with Senate in relation to election of U. S.
Senators at 12 M., Wednesday 16th, 1870.
Senator Douglas moved that a commit-
tee be appointed to confer with House
committee. Carried.
Communication from the Speaker of the
House inviting the Senate to meet the
House in the Hall of Representatives, at 1
o'clock P. M., February 15, for the purpose
of electing a State Printer.
Senator Bowers moved the communica-
tion be received and laid upon the table.
Carried.
The committee appointed to confer with
the House committee, to exchange views
in relation to the election of United States
Senators, recommending the reconstruction
of the action of the Senate in the premises.
Senator Gaines moved the adoption of
the report:

and 14 nays. Lost.

Senate that they had performed their duty.

took a recess until 1 o'clock P. M., the hour
appointed to meet the House in Joint
Session.

UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Second Session of
the Forty-first Congress.

(PUBLISHED BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.)
AN Act repealing so much of the act of
August eighth, one thousand eight hun-
dred and forty-six, as declared the Des
Moines river, in the then Territory of
Iowa, a public highway.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of
Representatives of the United States of Amer-
ica in Congress assembled, That so much of
the act of August eighth, one thousand
eight hundred and forty-six, entitled "An
act granting certain lands to the Territory
of Iowa to aid in the improvement of the
navigation of the Des Moines river, and
Territory," as makes said river a public
highway be, and the same is hereby re-
pealed.
Approved, February 20 1870.

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper...

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1866, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so-called Confederate currency...

That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy, within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance...

SECTION 2. That all persons who are interested for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay the same...

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed, January 31st, A. D. 1870. Published February 2, A. D. 1870. WM. C. A. THURLEPAPE, Mayor of the City of San Antonio.

AN ORDINANCE. Concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to divers persons...

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the act or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city...

SECTION 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1863...

SECTION 3. That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts, and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credits allowed him or them by the Mayor...

SECTION 4. That it shall be the duty of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provisions hereof...

SECTION 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed Jan. 16th 1866. Mayor's Office San Antonio Jan. 16th 1866. (Signed) D. CLEVELAND, Mayor.

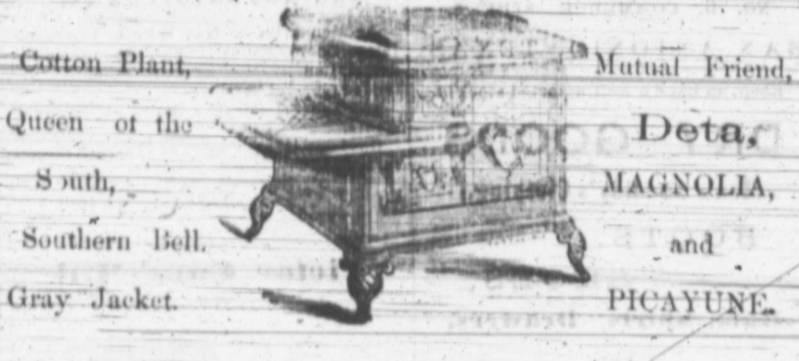
